

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PRELIMINARY REPORT ON HURRICANE CINDY,  
JULY 7-11, 1959

The small Atlantic tropical cyclone which was given the name "Cindy" formed off the coast of South Carolina and reached tropical storm intensity on July 7. Highest winds in squalls near the center were then estimated at 60 to 65 miles per hour. The first advisory on the storm was issued at 6:30 p.m. EST July 7 by the Hurricane Warning Center at Miami. Gale warnings and a hurricane watch were ordered for the coast south of Cape Hatteras to north of Charleston, South Carolina.

The storm remained stationary at first, with its center about 190 miles east of Charleston, S. C. During the night of July 7-8 it began moving slowly westward toward the South Carolina coast, under close surveillance by Navy reconnaissance aircraft operating from Jacksonville and Air Defense Command land based radar located near Charleston, S. C. and Wilmington, N. C.

Hurricane watch and gale warnings were extended southward to Beaufort, S. C. at 11:00 a.m. EST July 8 as the storm showed evidence of intensifying and continued to move toward the coast. It barely reached hurricane force July 8, with highest winds in squalls near the center of 70 to 75 miles per hour. Hurricane warnings were ordered for the coast between Georgetown, S. C. and Beaufort, S. C. at 2 pm EST July 8. The center moved inland near McClellanville, S. C. (between Georgetown and Charleston) about 9:30 p.m. EST July 8 attended by winds of whole gale force, tides up to about 4 feet above normal, and heavy rain.

After moving inland and decreasing somewhat in strength, Cindy turned northeastward over the Carolinas, continuing to produce heavy rains. When the storm passed over southeastern Virginia and northeastern North Carolina during the afternoon of July 10, it was attended by several tornadoes. It then skirted the middle Atlantic seaboard and passed along the New England coast and into the Gulf of St. Lawrence.

One man was killed in the storm when his automobile collided with a fallen tree near McClellanville. Property losses from wind and tide have been reported as relatively minor. Wind damaged some roofs and blew down trees and power lines in South Carolina. The tornadoes which accompanied in North Carolina and Virginia caused some damage to buildings. Flooding occurred in several streams in the Carolinas. For the most part, however, the widespread storm rainfall fell over an area where it was badly needed.

THE LOW PRESSURE AREA WHICH HAS BEEN UNDER OBSERVATION FOR THE PAST 24 HOURS HAS ASSUMED TROPICAL CHARACTERISTICS AND INTENSIFIED DURING THE DAY. AT 630 PM EST...2330Z...THE CENTER OF TROPICAL STORM CINDY WAS LOCATED BY AIRCRAFT RECONNAISSANCE AT LATITUDE 32.2 NORTH LONGITUDE 76.9 WEST OR ABOUT 190 MILES EAST OF CHARLESTON ESSENTIALLY STATIONARY. HIGHEST WINDS OVER A SMALL AREA AROUND THE CENTER WERE ESTIMATED AT 60 TO 65 MPH WITH GALE WINDS EXTENDING OUTWARD 125 MILES IN THE EASTERN SEMICIRCLE AND 60 MILES IN THE WESTERN SEMICIRCLE. LOWEST PRESSURE REPORTED WAS 997 MILLIBARS OR 29.44 INCHES.

THE STORM IS EXPECTED TO REMAIN NEARLY STATIONARY DURING THE NEXT 12 HOURS. A SLOW INCREASE IN INTENSITY IS INDICATED PROBABLY REACHING HURRICANE FORCE DURING WEDNESDAY.

STORM TIDES UP TO TWO FEET ABOVE NORMAL HAVE BEEN REPORTED FROM POINTS ON THE NORTH CAROLINA COAST AND A FURTHER INCREASE OF A FOOT OR TWO IS LIKELY DURING THE NEXT 24 HOURS. RAINS WILL BE HEAVY ON THE NORTH CAROLINA COAST FROM CAPE HATTERAS SOUTHWARD. VESSELS IN THE VICINITY OF THE STORM CENTER SHOULD EXERCISE CAUTION.

ALL SMALL CRAFT FROM SAVANNAH TO HATTERAS SHOULD REMAIN IN PORT AND VESSELS IN THE VICINITY OF THE STORM AREA SHOULD EXERCISE CAUTION.

AT 11 AM EST...1600Z...THE CENTER OF TROPICAL STORM CINDY WAS LOCATED BY AIRCRAFT AND LAND RADAR AND BY AIRCRAFT PENETRATION AT LATITUDE 32.4 N LONGITUDE 78.4 W OR APPROXIMATELY 110 MILES EAST OF CHARLESTON. DURING THE LAST FEW HOURS THE STORM APPEARS TO HAVE BEEN MOVING RATHER STEADILY WESTNORTHWESTWARD AT 5 MPH.

HIGHEST WINDS OVER A SMALL AREA AROUND THE CENTER ARE ESTIMATED AT 60 TO 70 MPH WITH GALE WINDS EXTENDING OUTWARD 125 MILES IN THE EASTERN AND 60 MILES IN THE WESTERN SEMICIRCLE. THERE HAS BEEN NO INTENSIFICATION DURING THE NIGHT BUT AN INCREASE TO JUST ABOUT HURRICANE FORCE IS POSSIBLE DURING TODAY. THE STORM IS EXPECTED TO CONTINUE WESTNORTHWESTWARD AT ABOUT THE SAME SPEED DURING THE NEXT 12 HOURS WITH THE CENTER REACHING THE SOUTH CAROLINA COAST NEAR BUT PROBABLY SOMEWHAT NORTH OF CHARLESTON THIS EVENING.

STORM TIDES AVERAGE 1 TO 2 FEET ABOVE NORMAL ON THE CAROLINA COASTS AND SHOULD CONTINUE TO INCREASE ALONG THE SOUTH CAROLINA COAST FROM CHARLESTON NORTHWARD SOME 60 MILES REACHING A MAXIMUM OF APPROXIMATELY 4 FEET ABOVE NORMAL THIS EVENING. WINDS AND RAINS SHOULD GRADUALLY INCREASE IN THE AREA OF GALE DISPLAY THIS AFTERNOON AND THIS EVENING WITH GUSTS OF NEAR HURRICANE FORCE ON THE CENTRAL SOUTH CAROLINA COAST AS THE CENTER MOVES INLAND EARLY TONIGHT. PERSONS IN THIS COASTAL AREA FLOODED BY A 4 FOOT TIDE SHOULD EVACUATE.

THE NEXT ADVISORY ON TROPICAL STORM CINDY WILL BE ISSUED FROM THE MIAMI WEATHER BUREAU AT 5 PM EST WITH INTERIM BULLETINS. ALL PERSONS IN THE AREA OF THE HURRICANE WATCH AND PARTICULARLY ON THE SOUTH CAROLINA COAST SHOULD KEEP IN TOUCH FOR THE LATEST ADVISORIES AND BULLETINS.

CHARLESTON SC NEWS BULLETIN ON TROPICAL STORM CINDY... 1 PM 8 JULY 1959

THE CENTER OF THIS SMALL TROPICAL STORM IS NOW LOCATED ABOUT 90 MILES EASTSOUTHEAST OF CHARLESTON. IT IS MOVING WEST NORTHWEST AT ABOUT 5 MILES PER HOUR. SINCE THIS STORM IS SO CLOSE IN TO THE SOUTH CAROLINA COAST AND SINCE A SPEED UP IN FORWARD MOVEMENT IS QUITE POSSIBLE AND ONLY A SLIGHT INCREASE IN WIND SPEED WOULD BRING THIS STORM UP TO FULL HURRICANE STRENGTH IT IS ADVISABLE FOR ALL COASTAL RESIDENTS OF SOUTH CAROLINA ESPECIALLY THOSE IN EXPOSED PLACES SHOULD MAKE PREPARATIONS TO RECEIVE FULL HURRICANE WINDS AND HIGH TIDES AND SINCE THE TIDE IS ALREADY RUNNING TWO FEET OR MORE ABOVE NORMAL IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT ALL EXPOSED AREAS BE EVACUATED BEFORE 6 PM THIS AFTERNOON BEFORE THE RISING WATER COVERS EXIT ROADS.

THIS STORM IF IT SHOULD COME IN AT HIGH WATER BETWEEN 8 AND 11 PM TONIGHT COULD PRODUCE A TIDE OF 10 FEET ABOVE MEAN LOW WATER. HOWEVER ALL AREAS EXPOSED TO WAVES MUST EXPECT MUCH HIGHER HEIGHTS OF WATER.

THE LEAST CHANGE IN FORWARD SPEED OR DIRECTION OF THE STORM WOULD CAUSE A REVISION IN THESE ESTIMATES. AT THE PRESENT TIME IT IS EXPECTED THAT THE HIGHEST WATER WILL OCCUR IN THE CHARLESTON BULLS BAY AREA WITH LESSER HEIGHTS TO THE SOUTH IN THE EDISTO AREA AND TO THE NORTH IN THE GEORGETOWN AREA.

AT 1 PM EST TROPICAL STORM CINDY WAS LOCATED ABOUT 90 STATUTE MILES EAST SOUTHEAST OF CHARLESTON MOVING AT LEAST AS FAST AS INDICATED THIS MORNING. THE HIGHEST WINDS REPORTED BY AIRCRAFT RECONNAISSANCE DURING THE PAST 2 HOURS WAS ABOUT 70 MPH WHILE ONE SHIP IN THE STORM AREA REPORTED HURRICANE WINDS.

THE STORM IS EXPECTED TO CONTINUE WESTNORTHWESTWARD DURING THE NEXT 12 HOURS AND THE CENTER SHOULD REACH THE SOUTH CAROLINA COAST EARLY THIS EVENING NEAR BUT PROBABLY SOMEWHAT NORTH OF CHARLESTON.

WINDS AND TIDES ALONG THE SOUTH CAROLINA COAST SHOULD BEGIN A STEADY INCREASE SHORTLY WITH GUSTS OF NEAR HURRICANE FORCE AND STORM TIDES 4 FEET ABOVE NORMAL NEAR THE STORM CENTER AND SOME DISTANCE TO THE NORTHEAST AS IT REACHES THE COAST. SEAS ARE VERY ROUGH AND SMALL CRAFT ARE ADVISED TO REMAIN IN PORT UNTIL WINDS AND SEAS SUBSIDE. TIDES THIS AFTERNOON WILL BE 1 TO 2 FEET ABOVE NORMAL ALONG THE MAINE COAST. TIDES ELSEWHERE WILL BE NEAR NORMAL. RAINFALL WILL BE OCCASIONALLY HEAVY OVER EXTREME SOUTHERN MAINE UNTIL EARLY THIS AFTERNOON. HEAVY RAINS HAVE OCCURRED OVER RHODE ISLAND SOUTHERN CONNECTICUT AND EASTERN MASSACHUSETTS DURING THE NIGHT. BOSTON REPORTED 2.37 INCHES DURING THE PAST 12 HOURS. BEDFORD HAD 2.85 INCHES FOR THE SAME PERIOD. 24 HOUR AMOUNT SHOWED THAT PROVIDENCE HAD 2.06 INCHES BLOCK ISLAND 2.20 AND NEW HAVEN 2.00 INCHES. WHILE THIS WILL PRODUCE SOME RISE IN THE RIVERS OVER SOUTHEASTERN NEW ENGLAND NO FLOODING IS ANTICIPATED. STORM CINDY WAS LOCATED ABOUT 10 MILES TO THE WEST OF PROVINCETOWN AT 8 AM EST AND MOVING NORTHEASTWARD AT 25 MPH. THE STORM SHOULD CONTINUE TO MOVE NORTHEASTWARD WITH SOME INCREASE IN FORWARD SPEED. RAIN WILL END AND WINDS WILL SHIFT TO NORTHWEST AND DIMINISH SLOWLY ALONG THE NEW ENGLAND COAST AS THE STORM PASSES NORTHEASTWARD INTO THE BAY OF FUNDY THIS AFTERNOON.
