


PRELIMINARY REPORT ON HURRICANE DAISY
AUGUST 24-29, 1958

Hurricane "Daisy", intense but small in area, was detected as a tropical storm about 300 miles east-northeast of Miami, Florida on Sunday, August 24, 1958. A report from the ship "Alamar" indicating low pressure and strong winds provided the first clue to the developing storm. A Navy reconnaissance flight into the area subsequently confirmed its existence.

The tropical storm developed into a hurricane on August 25. From August 24 to August 27 it drifted very slowly northward. Then its forward speed up the coast increased. It skirted the Atlantic seaboard and finally moved out into the Atlantic off Nova Scotia on August 29. Hurricane "Daisy" reached its maximum intensity late Wednesday, August 27 and early Thursday, August 28 while moving northward off the Georgia and Carolina coasts. The strongest winds near the center were then about 125 miles per hour and the central pressure about 935 mb. or 27.61 inches.

Although the center of Hurricane Daisy passed within about 75 miles of Cape Hatteras and Nantucket, the area of hurricane winds was so concentrated that neither the North Carolina nor New England coasts felt the full effects of the storm. The Hatteras station reported as its highest wind NNW 27 mph. with gusts to 36. Block Island, R. I. reported a "fastest miles" of 40 mph. with a gust to 45. A "Texas tower" located 120 miles east of Cape Cod reported gusty winds of 87 mph. and steady winds of 69 mph. as the hurricane center passed nearby. Available post-storm reports show no appreciable damage or loss from this severe hurricane.

Over much of its course along the coast, "Daisy" was in range of shore-based radar. From the time it approached Hatteras until it passed Nantucket, the center was under almost constant radar observation. Reconnaissance coverage by Air Force, Navy, and National Hurricane Research Project aircraft was also excellent, and the slow movement of the storm near the Florida coast during the first several days of its existence offered an unusually good opportunity for investigation by aircraft of the National Hurricane Research Project based at West Palm Beach.

DAISY IS FORECAST TO MOVE TOWARD THE NORTHWEST OR NORTH NORTHWEST RATHER SLOWLY FOR THE NEXT 12 HOURS. A GRADUAL TURN TOWARDS THE NORTH AND A SLIGHT INCREASE IN FORWARD SPEED IS EXPECTED THEREAFTER. THERE MAY BE SOME SLIGHT ADDITIONAL INTENSIFICATION.

WHILE EVENTUAL RECURVATURE TO THE NORTH IS STILL INDICATED ALL INTERESTS IN COASTAL AREAS FROM NORTH FLORIDA TO THE CAROLINAS SHOULD KEEP IN TOUCH WITH ALL FUTURE ADVISORIES UNTIL CURVATURE AWAY FROM THE COASTLINE IS DEFINITELY ESTABLISHED.

SMALL CRAFT WARNINGS STILL DISPLAYED FROM EASTPORT MAINE TO BLOCK ISLAND RHODE ISLAND FOR ROUGH SEAS AND GUSTY BUT DIMINISHING NORTHERLY WINDS ALONG THE NEW ENGLAND COAST. ROUGH SEAS WILL SUBSIDE DURING NEXT 24 HOURS BUT SMALL CRAFT ARE CAUTIONED TO REMAIN IN PORT UNTIL SEAS HAVE SUBSIDED.

THE THREAT OF HURRICANE DAISY HAS DEFINITELY ENDED FOR THE NORTH ATLANTIC COAST OF THE UNITED STATES BUT SHIPPING IN THE PATH OF THE HURRICANE SHOULD CONTINUE TO EXERCISE EXTREME CAUTION.

HURRICANE DAISY AT 5 PM EST...2200Z...WAS LOCATED BY RECONNAISSANCE AIRCRAFT NEAR LATITUDE 42.3 NORTH AND LONGITUDE 65.6 WEST OR ABOUT 260 STATUTE MILES DUE EAST OF BOSTON. THE STORM IS MOVING IN A NORTHEASTERLY DIRECTION AT ABOUT 32 MPH. IT APPEARS TO BE LOSING TROPICAL CHARACTERISTICS BUT IS STILL AN INTENSE STORM WITH HIGHEST WINDS NEAR THE CENTER ABOUT 100 MPH. HURRICANE WINDS EXTEND OUT 60 MILES FROM THE CENTER. GALES EXTEND OUTWARD 100 MILES FROM THE CENTER IN THE WESTERN SEMICIRCLE 150 MILES IN THE NORTHEASTERN QUADRANT AND 225 MILES IN THE SOUTHEASTERN QUADRANT.

AT 3 PM EST THE TEXAS TOWER LOCATED 120 MILES EAST OF CAPE COD REPORTED GUSTY WINDS OF 87 MPH WITH STEADY WINDS OF 69 MPH.

HURRICANE DAISY IS EXPECTED TO CONTINUE MOVING NORTHEASTWARD ABOUT 32 TO 35 MPH DURING THE NEXT 12 HOURS GRADUALLY TURNING TOWARD THE EAST NORTHEAST THEREAFTER WITH SOME INCREASE IN FORWARD SPEED. IT IS EXPECTED TO RETAIN ITS INTENSITY DURING THE NEXT 12 TO 24 HOURS.

THE NEXT ADVISORY ON HURRICANE DAISY WILL BE ISSUED FROM THE WEATHER BUREAU AT BOSTON AT 11 PM EST.

HURRICANE DAISY HAS RAPIDLY LOST ITS HURRICANE CHARACTERISTICS IN THE PAST 6 HOURS AND AT 11 PM EST... 0400Z...STORM DAISY WAS LOCATED BY RECONNAISSANCE AIRCRAFT AT LATITUDE 43.0 NORTH AND LONGITUDE 62.2 WEST. THE STORM WAS MOVING EAST NORTHEASTWARD AT 32 MPH. IT IS EXPECTED TO MOVE IN THE SAME DIRECTION AT 32 TO 35 MPH IN THE NEXT 12 HOURS.

HIGHEST WINDS IN STORM DAISY ARE NOW ONLY 70 MPH NEAR THE CENTER AND GALES EXTEND OUTWARD 250 MILES IN THE SOUTHERN SEMICIRCLE AND 100 MILES IN THE NORTHERN SEMICIRCLE. STORM DAISY WILL CONTINUE TO DIMINISH IN INTENSITY.
