## Three Netters Arrive This Morning with Mackerel.

## How Capt. Jacobs' Big Haul Was Made.

A special to the TIMES reports the following mackerel netters at New York this morning with fares:

Sch. Altama, of this port, Capt. George Peeples, 400 large fresh mackerel.

Sch. Lydia A. Harvey, of Boston, 500 large fresh mackerel.

Sch. Angie and Emma, of New York, 700 large fresh mackerel.

Two of the crew of sch. Lena and Maud arrived home from New York on Wednesday. They report that since the first vessels arrived out south, the weather has been terrible and about the worst ever experienced by the southern seining fleet. They report that about all the fish which have been caught have been taken just at sunset or just before sunrise. There have been plenty of fish, but the bad weather has been a serious drawback in catching them. The big haul of sch. Helen Miller Gould was made just before daylight. The fish were heard flipping and the crew rowed out and made a set right in the middle of what is reported to be one of the largest rafts of mackerel ever heard of.

## Animosity Against the French.

Newfoundland animosity against the French is illustrated by the urging of a St. John's paper to use every effort to prevent the French getting bait at St. Pierre as by curtailing their bait supply for the first and second trips to the Banks, it is possible to reduce their catch of cod so that they (the French) would have but very little for outside consumption. The paper referred to seemed to voice popular sentiment in advocating everything possible in that line.

## The Eggs Hatched Themselves.

Capt. G. S. Wilson reports an unusual occurrence at Bailey's Harbor this spring. Last fall or winter a number of trout were cleaned at that place and the offal, among which was a large quantity of eggs, was accidentally dumped along side the dock. This spring when the ice went out of the harbor the fishermen were surprised to see the water in the vicinity of the place where the refuse had been deposited literally alive with trout fry, the eggs having hatched.

## Fishing Facts and Fancies.

The Norwegian fishery is drawing to a close. This year the catch is very large as compared with past seasons and the total is 29,500,000, of which Lofenden alone contributed 18,500,000, and Finmark 1,000,000. Last year the total catch was but 21,000,000, so that the increase is looked upon by mercantile houses as detrimental in many ways to this season's business. Still the price of the product will remain as last year with a prospect of increasing if the French fishery is less than the average.
