Mackerel Notes.

Skibbereen, Ireland, under date of May 4, reports that not until the commencement of this week have we had any fish (mackerel) on this part of the coast, when there was moderate takes of large fish. This has not been continued. The weather has been too fine and calm. So far this is the worst season we remember, and it is not likely to much improve being now so late. There is only about five weeks more in the spring season when the very hot weather and dogfish will stop the efforts of the fishermen.

Very spasmodic mackerel fishery up to date is reported at Dingle, Ireland, and all fish sold fresh. Some very fine fish, but a small sample, showing occasionally. Taken on the whole the season is very satisfactory. Some vessels have landed 10,000, others blank from the same grounds.

The Dominion Fisheries Intelligence says that there are signs of mackerel off Ingonish.

HIGH LINE SOUTH.

Sch. Helen Miller Gould Stocks Nearly \$10,000 Net.

NO FISH SEEN SINCE SATURDAY.

Several Vessels Here to Fit For Cape Shore.

Schs. Helen Miller Gould, Latona, Marguerite Haskins, Oliver Wendell Holmes and Senator Saulsbury returned from their southern seining trips this morning and will fit and hurry away to the Cape Shore, where mackerel have been reported for over a week.

[Capt. Solomon Jacobs of sch. Helen Miller Gould reports that the large fleet has broken the southern schools all up and driven them off shore. No fish had been taken by the fleet or none seen since last Saturday, and when the schools were last sighted they were between Block Island and No Man's Land and going rapidly to the eastward. Capt. Jacobs left the fleet to come this way, Wednesday noon. It was a fine day but no schools were showing.

Capt. Jacobs is high line out south, his craft, sch. Helen Miller Gould, having stocked \$9600 net, which will net her big crew a share of about \$200 each. This is big work and puts Capt. Jacobs in a fair Continued on 4th page.

way to equal or excel his record stock of last season.

He reports that the big school which he had in his seine when the fish rushed and sunk seine and boat, as previously fully reported in the TIMES, was probably the biggest raft a seine ever got round. He and several other leading seining skippers estimated that there were between 2000 and 3000 barrels in the seine at the time.

The captain reports that while at New York he had a very pleasant visit from the private secretary of Miss Helen Miller Gould, for whom his vessel is named. She brought the set of colors from Miss Gould and inspected the craft, expressing a wish to make a trip on her.

Capt. Jacobs will now hustle to the Cape Shore. He will run his present gasoline engine this season and have a new and improved one put in this fall, one of the same make, the Globe.

In speaking of the fleet, he thinks the number of vessels out south was altogether too many for the body of fish, and that it had the effect of breaking up the schools and drawing the fish off shore.

Netters at New York.

The first mackerel arrivals at New York this week came in this noon, the netter Olive May having 1300 and the Ellen Oliver 1500 fresh mixed mackerel.
