#### A new life boat, for use

**LIFE BOAT** on shipboard, which is **LAUNCHING** designed with the special **DEVICE.** idea in part, of doing away with the cumbersome methods of launching now in vogue, which has caused at times great loss of life, has been invented, which on trial seems to come up to the expectations of the inventor. There are no davits or tackling used in the launching, but in case of need, the boat is raised on rollers by a simple device, and being released, shoots into the water from any reasonable height, carrying its occupants to possible safety. The boat in being launched strikes the water bows first, and although submerged in doing so, her occupants find themselves in a moment floating on top of the waves, in a perfectly dry boat, which cannot be capsized by ordinary means and is unsinkable.

Several successful trials have been had both in launching the boat from piers and from decks of vessels, and in no case has there been a failure in the boat to right herself after striking the water.

It is estimated that **OIL AS FUEL** the use of oil as fuel on board of a big ocean-going steamship reduces the boiler room force eighty per cent. There are, moreover, other subordinate but very important advantages arising from the use of fuel oil, such, for instance, as the great ease and cleanliness of taking the fuel on board, for it would flow into the double bottom through pipes by gravity, and there would be none of the objectionable dust and dirt which is inseparable from coaling a vessel. As to its convenience for a ship on an extended journey, there are at present over thirty localities throughout the world where the fuel is
