HIGHEST EVER PAID.

Salt Tinker Mackerel Brought Twenty Dollars a Barrel.

Large Salt Mackerel Sold at \$20 3-8 This Forenoon.

Salt tinker mackerel were in demand this forenoon, when the fare of sch. Blanche F. Irving sold to George Perkins & Son at \$20 per barrel. This is said to be the highest price ever paid for salt tinker mackerel in the history of the mackerel fishery.

The prices of large salt mackerel are also soaring skyward. This morning the fares of schs. Speculator, A. D. Story and Rival sold to George Perkins & Son for \$20 3-8 per barrel. This is the highest price paid for salt mackerel this season, and one of the highest paid for years.

GOOD STOCKS.

What the Fitchers Did on Their Northern Trips.

Sch. George Parker of Boston, Capt. Albert Flygore, weighed off 197,828 pounds of fitched halibut as the result of her northern trip, stocking \$14,000, the crew sharing \$360.75. This is the best stock and share made on a fitched halibut trip since the vessels used to go to Iceland and Greenland.

Sch. A. E. Whyland, Capt. Charles Young, stocked \$12,000 on her recent fitched halibut trip. The fare weighed off 170,000 pounds.

Sch. American, Capt. Matthias Clausen, stocked \$11,120.48 on her recent fitched halibut trip, the crew sharing \$300.56.

Sch. Mystery, Capt. Forman Lord, stocked \$6116.50 on her recent fitched halibut trip, the crew sharing \$147.28.

BREAKS ALL RECORDS.

Steamer Alice M. Jacobs Has Thus Far Stocked \$41,000.

AND SEASON IS NOT OVER.

Magnificent Work a Credit to Capt. Jacobs.

Capt. Solomon Jacobs of the steamer Alice M. Jacobs has good reason to feel happy, for he has again broken the high line mackerel record, which by the way was held by himself.

In 1883, Capt. Jacobs made the remarkable stock of \$39,700, which stood as a record until in 1900, when in sch. Helen Miller Gould, he made the record stock of \$40,600. This season, when he started in his new steamer Alice M. Jacobs, many wisecracks shook their heads and doubted if he could make this method of seining profitable. An answer is the stock of the Jacobs thus far this season, which amounts to \$41,000, with more than a month yet before the season closes. The crew have shared \$762 each. Thus Capt. Jacobs has already set a new record and has lots of time to add several thousand dollars to it before the mackerel say good bye.

Such work as this is phenomenal and but strengthens Capt. Jacobs' position as king of mackerel fishermen, and all congratulate him on his success.

Herring Outlook Dubious.

"The herring outlook just at present is little dubious," said a well known Portland fish dealer yesterday morning. "We have just received a fare from the schooner M. J. Sewe of 250 barrels, which were caught to the eastward, and we are expecting another schooner in next week with another fare. These, however, are the only arrivals which have been reported for some time, and are small in comparison to what they should be at this season of the year.

"Last year was a failure in the herring business, and it is to be hoped that this season will be good, as it means much money to fishermen in this vicinity. There are hundreds of men engaged in the herring fishing industry from Harpswell to Wood Island, and to have a good season means the necessities and many of the comforts of winter which they could not otherwise have. It is about three years since the large herring left this vicinity, and we have seen only a comparative few of them since. Before that time there used to be immense schools around the bay.

"We are, however, looking for a run of fish before the season is over, and are getting everything in readiness for a big rush if comes."

HERRING WAR AT BEVERLY.

Fishing Vessels Reap Benefit of Lower Prices.

The Beverly fishermen who go after herring are in the midst of a merry price war. Splendid catches have been made thus far this season. Monday Thomas McAdams went out for the first time in his new naphtha dory and the war began when he tried to sell his catch. Prices were forced down from \$2 to 75 cents, and the Gloucester and Boston fishing vessels were baited at from \$1.50 to 75 cents a barrel. McAdams says he is in the fight for keeps and will continue even if he has to give his fish away.
