HERRING STRIKE IN.

Large Quantities at Bonne Bay and Trout River.

Good Signs of Fish Also at Bay of Islands.

Advices from Newfoundland state that herring have struck in at Bonne Bay and Trout River in great abundance, and vessels there are loading.

Other advices state that at Woods' Island, Bay of Islands, there is a very good sign of herring—three barrels to a net. The great body of fish has not yet struck in at the latter place, owing no doubt to the weather conditions and the abundance of dogfish, which have destroyed much valuable fishing gear. Several of the American vessels have their crews engaged and are ready to load when the herring strike in. Not more than half a dozen vessels have arrived as yet, but many vessels are either on the coast or will arrive soon.

Instead of risking large sums of money on the vessels going to Bay of Islands to purchase herring, as was the case in other years, the American firms are now using the Bank of Montreal. The masters of the vessels will pay their fishermen by check.

American vessels arriving here report terrific weather on the passage. Many of them had to put into Sydney for shelter.

TO WINGAERSHEEK BEACH.

Party in Town Looking Over Field for Street Railway.

A well-known street railway man is in town today looking over the field for a street railway from West Gloucester to Wingaersheek Beach. The idea, if the project materializes, is to have a summer resort at the beach, with a large casino and other attractions. Communication will at once be made with E. C. Hawkes of Buffalo and J. D. Hawkes of Detroit, who are the principal owners of the beach property, through which the railroad would pass to go to the beach.

The plan is to run the railroad from the Essex branch of the Boston and Northern street railway on Essex avenue, along the highway to the beach.

It is said that the parties mean business if they are treated right by the abutters in selling land reasonable instead of jumping the price way up.

The gentleman in town today said to a TIMES representative this noon, "I have enough money behind me to close the deal in two weeks providing things go along smoothly."

LOOKS BETTER.

100 Barrels Herring Haul at Ipswich This Morning.

A special dispatch to William H. Perkins this noon brings good news from the herring fishery at Ipswich. The dispatch is from his son Oscar B., and states that with his seine and gasoline launch, he got 100 barrels of the largest kind of herring this morning. The dispatch also states that the prospect there now is very bright.

Report That Seiners Are Doing Something on the Cape Shore.

Several seiners are in port this week and, according to the captains are all doing well on the hook, close in shore prospects are now excellent to secure trips, if the weather will permit on dark nights. Captain Lehman, of the schooner Scythia is high liner with one hundred barrels. Other seiners have not done much yet, and few have over twenty-five or thirty barrels of mackerel. There has not been a school of mackerel seen off Halifax yet this fall.—Sydney Record, Oct. 31.
