FISH HOUSES BURNED.

**Several Vessels Endangered at Fair-
haven Last Night.**

Fire last night destroyed the office building,
packing house and icehouse belonging to A.
Kelly & Son, wholesale fish dealers at Fair-
haven, Cape Cod. The loss is estimated at
\$5000. The firm had just stored \$3000 worth
of fish, and several schooners which were in
winter quarters at the wharf where the build-
ings were located were in danger of destruc-
tion.

The rigging and sails of the large two-
masted schooner Urita became ignited and
were considerably damaged. A brave act was
that of Manuel Perry, who climbed to the top-
mast and, nearly surrounded by flames, cut
away the topsail. Owing to the isolated loca-
tion of the building there was considerable de-
lay in giving the alarm.

It is not known how the fire started. Mr.
Kelly carried a small amount of insurance.

**EIGHT ARE
IN THE ICE.**

**Bad News from Bay of Isl-
ands Fully Confirmed.**

LIST OF VESSELS CAUGHT.

**May Not Get Out Until Spring
Comes.**

As stated in the first edition of today's
TIMES the situation of the herring fleet at Bay
of Islands, N. F., is most serious. A dispatch
was published showing that seven loaded ves-
sels belonging to this port were unable to sail
from there on account of ice in the bay. This
telegram was taken by those familiar with the
herring industry and that locality in particular
as an equivalent for saying that the vessel
were caught in the ice.

The receipt of this news occasioned much
concern among vessel owners this morning
and strenuous efforts were made to ascertain
particulars and who the unfortunate crafts
were.

This noon Cunningham & Thompson were
successful in securing the much-wanted infor-
mation, receiving a message from Benj. F.
McGray of their vessel, the Talisman.

Capt. McGray wired this forenoon from
Birchy Cove as follows:

"Talisman, Claudia, Dauntless, Arcadia,
Sceptre, Lewis H. Giles, Golden Rod and T.
M. Nicholson in the ice."

The Talisman is owned by Cunningham &
Thompson, the Claudia and Arcadia by Syl-
vanus Smith & Co., the Sceptre by John Pew
& Son, the Lewis H. Giles and Golden-Rod by
Orlando Merchant and the T. M. Nicholson
by Thomas M. Nicholson of Bucksport,
Maine.

It will be seen by Capt. McGray's telegram
that nothing is said of the chances getting out,
and skippers who know the place well, say
that when vessels, get caught there at this
time of the year, they seldom get clear before
March or April.

Should this be the result in this case, the loss
both of time and money will be very great, as
all these crafts are loaded with cargoes of fro-
zen herring, which on the market here would
be worth from \$6000 to \$8000 each.

Then there is the loss of time beside the
fact that captains' and crews' wages are
going on all the time, as well as the expense of
living. An enforced exile of two or three
months in this dreary place is greatly dreaded
by all who go for frozen herring, and taking the
situation as it appears on the face of the most
recent news it is one of the most serious that
has befallen the fishing fleet for years.

Of course there is a possibility of the vessels
getting out, but those acquainted with the lo-
cality and the conditions there fear that the
crafts are fast in the ice field.

Further particulars are anxiously awaited
and all are hoping for word from the crafts
that the ice embargo is only temporary and
that the vessels may soon be free.

Another dispatch received says that nine of
the fleet are in the ice.
