The salt mackerel catch to date is 17,153 barrels against about 22,500 barrels last year. The fresh mackerel catch to date is practically the same as last year, 51,000 barrels against 51,800 barrels at this time last year.

MACKEREL OUTLOOK DRY

Herring Seen Everywhere But Not Desired Fish.

VESSELS SEARCHED THE COAST

Few Fish Are Showing Off Race Point.

The mackerel prospect at present is about as poor as can be imagined. Lots of reports of mackerel schooling at different points can be had, but examination proves the fish to be either herring or pogies.

The mackerel fleet are strung out from Georges to Bay of Fundy and no good reports are heard. Some fish are on the southwest part of Georges, but they are travelling 20 miles a day to the eastward and are hard to catch.

Sch. Dauntless, Capt. Albert Hudder, which arrived here Saturday afternoon, reports a most exhaustive search with no results. Capt. Hudder had a good look over every part of Georges without results and then went to the Bay of Fundy. Off the Lurcher buoy he fell in with sch. Kentucky, and these two vessels in company scoured the Bay of Fundy and the Maine coast to Boon island, and saw not a sign of mackerel, but anywhere along and over the whole fishing grounds, they fell in with the biggest schools of the largest kind of herring. There were herring everywhere, but no mackerel.

A large number of seiners fishing off Race Point put in here Sunday during the storm. They have seen some fish and believe the schools have not yet left the bay but will show later.

Steamer Ultonia, which arrived at Boston yesterday had 203 barrels of Irish mackerel on board.

Mackerel are reported schooling between Seacomet and Gray Head.

A letter received here Saturday from Brier Island, N. S., state that mackerel have been schooling in St. Mary's Bay and Bay of Fundy or a week.

Western Halibut Due.

A large lot of Pacific halibut is due at Boston and New York on Monday.

The fare of sch. Edward A. Perkins, which arrived here today, remains as sold.

FROM GEORGES.

Sch. Nourmahal Arrived This Noon with Mackerel Fare.

Capt. Parsons Reports Schools Going East and Very Wild.

Sch. Nourmahal, Capt. Wallace Parsons, arrived from seining this afternoon with 113 barrels of salt mackerel, taken on Georges last Sunday.

Capt. Parsons reports a fleet of ten vessels on the southeast part of Georges, among them steamer Alice M. Jacobs, schs. Braganza, James S. Steele, Golden Hope, Edna Wallace Hopper and Richard Wainwright. Some had made small hauls, none having over 50 or 60 barrels.

The fish were exceptionally wild, it being almost impossible to catch them and they were going to the eastward very fast.
