GOT FISH ON GEORGES.

Good Mackerel Hauls Made There on Saturday.

GOOD LOT OF SCHOOLS SEEN.

Three Vessels Known To Have Done Well.

The seining fleet of Georges struck fish last Saturday and three vessels are known to have done well. A number of vessels were there and some got small hauls, but schs. Ralph L. Hall, Natalie J. Nelson and Diana made are known to have done better than the rest and made good catches.

The crew of sch. J. W. Bradley, Capt. William Foley, shared \$50 as the result of the fresh mackerel fare landed at Boston yesterday.

One hundred and fifty barrels of fresh mackerel are due at Boston today from Nova Scotia.

IN BAY OF FUNDY

Sch. Corsair Gets Good Haul of Mackerel.

SALT MACKEREL PRICE RAISED

Sch. Rival Brings in Fine Fare From Georges.

Sch. Diana, Capt. James McLean, arrived from Georges yesterday, with 159 barrels of salt mackerel taken on the southeast part of Georges last Saturday. Capt. McLean reports quite a lot of fish there and very large schools, but they were exceptionally wild, and it was almost impossible to stop them.

On Saturday last some fish were taken, most of the fleet of 12 sail which were there getting small hauls, while schs. Navahoe, Ralph L. Hall, Natalie J. Nelson, Grayling and Diana did better than the others. After this the fish appeared to elude the seines as before and nothing had been done since although the fleet, which increased to 37 sail, banged away at them till Wednesday, when most of them appeared to give it up and kept off to the north-east.

So wild were the schools that the method of "doubling up" the seines, first tried years ago by Capt. Hans Joyce, was tried by many of the vessels, but was fruitless of results. In this "doubling up" set, two seineboats would drop their kegs on opposite sides of the school they hoped to catch and then the boats would circle out around the school, and make for each other's kegs and on reaching them take each other's purse line and proceed to purse. By this method a seine would reach over half a mile in circumference, but even this method failed to stop the fish, although it was tried many times.

This report of Capt. McLean and his arrival with a good fare confirms the exclusive report on mackerel published in yesterday's

TIMES, in regard to the hauls on Georges and the vessels which made them.

Capt. George Peoples of the swordfisherman Lafayette reports speaking Capt. John Holland of the sworder N. A. Rowe on Georges recently, who told him that for three days on the far southeast part of the bank, about east southeast from the big shoal in 45 and 50 fathoms of water, the latitude being 41.10 to 41.15 north, he never saw the like of mackerel before. Great schools played there for three days and not a seiner was in sight.

Sch. Corsair, Capt. George Hamor, of this port, was at Southwest Harbor this morning with 175 barrels of salt mackerel on board. Capt. Hamor telephoned that he got part of his fish on Georges, but took the most of them recently on German Bank, west of Seal Island, in the Bay of Fundy. He said there did not appear to be any large body of fish but they showed occasionally, appearing to act about the same as the schools in Boston Bay. Schs. Barganza, George F. Edmunds, Marguerite Haskins and Natalie B. Nickerson were there and all took some fish, but the Corsair was the more fortunate and did better than the others. These are the first hauls made in the Bay of Fundy this year.

Sch. Constellation was at Boothbay Harbor this morning, Capt. Morgan reports that the big schools on Georges were so wild that he could do nothing with them.

Sch. Amos Cutter, Capt. Joseph J. Lyle, stocked \$1443.81 as the result of her recent fresh mackerel trip, landed at Boston recently.

Some fresh mackerel are at Boston today from the traps at North Truro.
