Sch. Edward A. Rich Brings In 70,000 Pounds.

Sch. Edward A. Rich, Capt. James Goodwin, arrived yesterday afternoon, with the largest pollock fare of the season, 70,000 pounds.

The price on round pollock advanced yesterday from 70 to 75 cents per hundred weight.

About the whole pollock fleet arrived yesterday with fares of from 15,000 to 45,000 pounds.

SCH. VICTOR IS HOME.

Brings 200 Bbls. Salt Mackerel From Cape Shore.

THE FLEET HAS DONE POORLY

A Big Catch Alone Prevented by Bad Weather.

Sch. Victor, Capt. John W. McFarland arrived this forenoon from a late seining trip to the Cape Shore with 200 barrels salt mackerel.

The Victor is one of the fleet of a dozen sail of seiners, who late in September made the usual trip to the Cape Shore in quest of the Fall run of mackerel off Sydney and Halifax.

Reports of the fleet from time to time have indicated small catches, the worst kind of weather and plenty of mackerel, and these reports are borne out by the story which Capt. McFarland brings.

The captain has no hesitation in saying that but for bad weather, while the body of fish was passing off North Sydney, the whole fleet would easily have loaded in one night. Such bodies of fish he never saw before in those waters, great rafts of them and regular walls of mackerel which would extend from the Fort to Eastern Point.

On these fish the fleet got a part of two night's fishing. They did not get on the body of the fish the first night and only a few small hauls were made. The next night it blowed heavy and nothing could be done, but the fish were going by just the same.

The next night most of the fleet were there and those who set early made hauls, the Victor getting a good catch. All the time however it was breezing steadily and this increasing breeze nearly cost the lives of the crew of one of the seiners, the Lena and Maud. Capt. Graham had made a set and rounded up a school of fish, estimated at fully 1000 barrels, more than one crew could handle on a smooth day, but doubly difficult and dangerous to secure on a night such as that. Before anything could be done toward saving the school, it breezed up so hard that it seemed as if the seine boat must be swamped, but fortunately the twine burst letting the fish cut and relieving the strain at the same time letting the sturdy fishermen out of a bad predicament. Previous to this the Corsair got round a big school and burst her seine.

Later on the fleet came up off Halifax and there was a spurt of mackerel there, but no hauls made. The nets at Canso made big hauls, indicating a good body of fish in that direction, but a heavy south-easter came soon after and none of these fish showed off Halifax.

Capt. McFarland reports leaving 10 sail there and some of the skippers said they were going to hang on until Nov. 25. The Victor has 200 barrels of salt mackerel which is the most of any of the fleet. The Grayling had 105 barrels, Natalie J. Nelson 85 and the others, from 50 down to 10 barrels. The Victor's fish are of good quality and go about 140 count to the barrel.

In speaking of the accident when the Victor sunk the towboat Hoover in Halifax Harbor, as previously fully reported in the TIMES, Capt. McFarland said the towboat was so much to blame that her owner willingly and voluntarily paid the bills for the damage sustained by the Victor in the collision.

FROM BAY OF ISLANDS.

Five Cargoes of Salt Herring Now on Way.

Sch. Dauntless and Nourmahal Loaded and Sailed.

Sch. Dauntless has loaded with a full fare of salt herring at Bay of Islands, N. F., and sailed on Saturday for home. Sch. Nourmahal has also loaded and sailed for home. This makes five vessels now on the way home from Bay of Islands with full cargoes of salt herring, schs. Independence, Atlanta, Diana, Nourmahal and Dauntless.

Sch. Senator Gardner, recently reported bound home from Notre Dame Bay with a full cargo, is now at Bay of Islands to complete her cargo, having secured but 700 barrels at the former place.

Salt Herring News.

A dispatch from Birch Cove, Bay of Islands, N. F., yesterday, states that schs. Senator Gardner, Smuggler and Dauntless sailed Saturday with full loads of salt herring. Sch. Atlanta sailed Monday and schs. Diana and Bessie M. Devine are loaded and waiting a chance to sail. Schs. Annie M. Parker and George Parker have 700 barrels each.

Salt Herring Cargo Sold.

The fare of salt herring of sch. Independence which is now due to arrive sold to Slade Gorton & Co., at \$3.62 1-2 per barrel, the same figure as the first cargo brought last season. The above firm will accommodate several others with herring from this fare.
