A REVIVAL OF THE WHALE FISHING.

The Toronto Globe, in an exceedingly interesting article, notes the revival of the whaling industry by the people of Newfoundland, presenting a strong contrast of the old-time tales of voyages and thrilling adventures with that of catching the Leviathans of the deep in their own immediate locality. It says:

"Instead of two and three year voyages in which ship's boats are used in capturing the giants of the deep, the Newfoundland industry is prosecuted in the immediate waters of the island by the use of small but handy steamers of about 100 tons burden, with a speed of about thirteen knots. The "strike" is made with a bomb fired from a gun at the bow of the steamer. A successful shot results in almost immediate death, and three, four, and even five whales a day have been taken by single crews. One steamer brought to the shore five whales each day for three days in succession, and another one killed twenty-three in a single week. That is the purely commercial side of the industry, and is quite as dull and prosaic as digging potatoes.

"But there is another side which is full of thrill and excitement. Taken as a sport, it bears about the same relation to the most exciting salmon or tarpon fishing that those sports bear to the pursuit of the shore clam. One day last March, a 91-foot bull whale, struck but not vitally injured, towed the Puma around and across and up and down Placentia Bay for three days before a killing shot could be sent into his huge body. Reversed engines throughout the fight failed to tire the monster. Again and again he charged the little vessel, and ramming was avoided only by the quickness of the steamer. After seventy-four hours of this, there came the opportunity for a killing shot.

"The Hum'er had a twenty-eight hour struggle with another off Cape Spear. The Cabot had a nineteen-hour fight with an 88-footer. Six to twelve hour runs with danger in every minute of them are frequent. When killed, the whales are taken to shore stations where the oil is tried out; the whalebone, now worth about \$12,000 a ton, is extracted, and the refuse ground up for fertilizer.

"Four steamers are now at work in the coastal waters of the island. Their catches for last year were: Puma, 260; Humber, 215; Cabot, 211; Viking, 177—a total of 863, a record breaker in the history of whale fishing."

Big Codfish.

H. Lyman Beaman, while fishing off East-ern Point on Monday, caught a large codfish which weighed 85 pounds and measured five feet and seven inches in length.

LITTLE LOBSTERS.

Expected That Yield of Fry Will Exceed All Previous Years.

Sch. Grampus of the U. S. fish commission arrived at Portland Tuesday from a trip along the coast to Boothbay collecting seed lobsters for the hatchery at this port.

It is expected that the yield of fry for this year will surpass all previous years, and is estimated at about 100,000,000. The success thus attained is attributed to the assistance of the fishermen collecting the seed lobsters in the pounds since last fall, where they were easily obtained by the commissioners. It is said that nearly one-half of the fry that has been planted along this coast of the state were put into the waters of Casco Bay.

With the completion of the hatchery at Boothbay, the work of the commissioners along this coast will be greatly benefitted as the fry will then be taken to Boothbay instead of to Gloucester, as is necessary at present. The new hatchery, when finished, will be under the charge of Capt. Hahn, formerly commanding the sch. Grampus.

Capt. Jacobs Has Another Fine Mackerel Fare.

About twelve barrels of large mackerel were taken at Coffin's Island, Monday morning. About 200 of the fish were sold in town at 15 and 20 cents apiece.—Liverpool, N. S., Advance.

Wednesday was the first really fresh mackerel day Portland has had, for early in the morning trips aggregating over 4300 fish were landed for local dealers. Sch. Mabelle E. Leavitt had 2500 and sch. Wesley W. Sinnett 1500, both of whom sold to John Lovitt & Co., W. M. Griffin in his small boat brought in 400 count for J. W. Trefethen.

Mackerel have fairly struck in off Cape Elizabeth and are said to be good in size and are running fairly plentiful. Much trouble is reported from the dogfish which are close in near shore.

A dispatch from St. John's, N. F., says: Newfoundland fishing vessels having occupied station on the treaty coast in the mistaken belief that the treaty ratifications had been exchanged, the Frenchmen appealed to the British commodore, who dispatched a warship to the scene to warn the offending colonial vessels from the coast.
