### NOT ONE FAIR TRIP.

#### In the Three Salt Bank Fares Here Today.

#### Captains Say It Is a Sample of What Is To Come.

Three salt bankers, schs. W. E. Morrissey, Henry M. Stanley and Madonna, arrived from their second trips of the season this morning with only small fares. The skippers report that scarcity of bait had bothered during the summer and that of late the weather had been exceptionally bad and fish very scarce, so scarce that vessels would not get more than four or five tubs to a set. The three crafts together have only about 190,000 pounds, which is not even a fair trip for one vessel in good fishing seasons.

Capt. Hiram Forbes of sch. W. E. Morrissey who has for years been one of the leaders of the salt bank fleet and who always gets more than a share of fish, says that the past season has been the worst he ever experienced in all the years he has been going to the Grand Banks. He says that the three fares here today are a fair sample of what the rest of the fleet will bring. With the exception of a very few vessels which have made fair catches, the great majority of the salt bankers have only from 25,000 to 80,000 pounds.

#### Found Few Mackerel.

The little netting sloop Orient came in this morning with 200 fresh mackerel which sold readily at 24 cents each.

## SCH. SMUGGLER QUICK TRIP.

### Brings First Herring Cargo from Bay of Islands.

### ONLY 28 DAYS ON VOYAGE.

### Had a Long Hard Beat All the Way Home.

Sch. Smuggler, Capt. Jerry Cook, arrived last evening from Bay of Islands, N. F., with a fine cargo of 1500 barrels of salt herring, being the first of the salt herring fleet to arrive home this season. Capt. Cook has evidently hustled things, for he has been gone only 28 days on the entire voyage, leaving here October 3. The craft made a good run to Bay of Islands and at first found herring scarce, but she went up into the Humber and there found what she sought.

Capt. Cook finished loading his craft a week ago today, and notwithstanding that the wind was dead ahead, started for home just before nightfall. The vessel was scuppers in the water, and as the wind held ahead and blew almost a gale for the next two days, the craft had no easy time of it. A heavy breeze was encountered the following day while crossing the Gulf, and the schooner was obliged to heave to for several hours. A favorable s'ant let her up from St. Paul's island to Scatteri in good shape, and then it was close by the wind again all the rest of the way home with heavy weather most of the time. Yesterday the wind died out and the vessel lay-becalmed all day in sight of Thacher's island and later got a little wind and made port last evening.

Capt. Cook is no novice in making quick Newfoundland trips, as last year he made the quickest voyage of the season, and the record that he has set for this season will be hard to beat. It means much to the owners of a craft to have the first cargo of salt herring home, so Capt. Cook, with this in mind, lost no time from start to finish.

Capt. Cook reports that when he left the Humber there were about ten American and a few Lunenburg vessels there, some at Woods Island and others in the Arms. When he came out the herring were rather scarce in the Humber, but he thought they had moved around into the Arms. The weather had been mild with no frost.

A Bay of Islands dispatch dated October 28 states that schs. George Parker, Arbitrator, Carrie W. Babson, Dauntless, Golden Hope, Robin Hood, Bessie M. Devine and Talisman had arrived there since last report and also that herring were very plentiful in the Humber, Middle Arm and at Wood's Island and that sch. Kentucky would finish loading next day.

A Bonne Bay dispatch of the same date stated that herring were now scarce there. Only two vessels were there, schs. Tattler and Edna Wallace Hopper, and the Tattler would finish loading next day. The weather was mild.
