**BROKE THE RECORD.**

**Sch. J. J. Flaherty Made Remarkable Salt Herring Trip.**

**ONLY 17 1-2 DAYS ON THE TRIP.**

**Capt. Jerry Cook Secures the Much-Coveted Honor.**

The arrival of sch. J. J. Flaherty, Capt. Jerry Cook, early this morning, broke all records for quick trips in the salt herring fishery. The best previous record of 19 days for the voyage was left behind by this trip of Capt. Cook, for from the time the vessel left this port until she returned this morning only 17 1-2 days have elapsed. In this time the Flaherty has sailed 1600 miles and loaded 1900 barrels of salt herring.

The vessel left here about noon two weeks ago last Monday and the next Thursday found her, after a fine passage, at Bay of Islands, and next day Capt. Cook began to secure his cargo. Herring were fairly plentiful and the 1900 barrels were soon secured, and last Saturday the sails were again hoisted and the craft was off on her 800 mile run for this port. Things worked well and the craft was hustled along as fast as Capt. Cook and his crew could drive her, with the result that she reached port a day and a half ahead of the best previous record.

Capt. Cook has made an enviable record for himself in the Newfoundland herring fishery during the past two years. Last year he made the quickest voyage of the season, and this year he started in by bringing home the first cargo of salt herring of the season from Bay of Islands, arriving on the evening of October 31, having been only 28 days on the round trip.

After being ashore but a few days he took command of the Flaherty and started off again for another trip, with the result noted above. Such a record as this in two seasons speaks for itself and the credit which has been given Capt. Cook by his fellow master mariners and vessel owners is sufficient praise for any man.

Capt. Cook, in speaking of the recent trip, said that he had a fine passage, both going and coming, and that herring were fairly plentiful when he left.

HIGHER STILL.

Large Bank Cod Sell at \$4.75 Per Hundred Weight.

Highest Price Paid for These Goods Since 1891.

The fare of salt bank cod of sch. Hazel R. Hines, Capt. Lovitt E. Hines, sold to Slade Gorton & Co., at \$4.75 per hundred weight for large and \$4.25 for small. This is not only the highest price paid for trawl bank fish this season but is also the highest price paid since 1891.

Bay of Islands Herring News.

The following herring items are from the Bay of Islands, Western Star:

The prospects of a successful herring fishery still continue bright, although up to Saturday the fishery had been confined to the Humber and Middle Arms. This week but very little has been done in this arm, and there is not much doing in North Arm; but in Middle Arm there is an abundance of fish, and all the vessels are doing well. Those that were there the early part of last week have loaded, and others will finish this week. Schs. W. E. Morrissey, Terrance, D. Lockwood, Lizzie Griffin and Judique have arrived since last issue, and the following vessels have cleared: A. M. Nicholson, American, Maryland, Golden Hope, Corsair, L. H. Giles, J. J. Flaherty, Hattie M. Graham, Blanche, Smuggler, H. M. Stanley, Arkona, Atalanta, Haevard and Annie M. Parker. Capt. Norman Ross is in Middle Arm superintending the loading of three vessels with frozen herring by "panning" them.

While the express was delayed at Birchy Cove on Monday, Mr. H. D. Reid and Mr. B. F. Pearson, secretary of the Timber Estates, visit the American fishing vessel Annie M. Parker. The vessel was almost filled to the hatches with herring, and the visitors were greatly interested in what they saw, even taking away a dozen fresh fish for their supper.

QUICK TRIP.

Sch. Arkona Only 27 Days Absent on Herring Voyage.

Several More Salt Herring Trips Have Arrived.

Sch. Arkona, Capt. George Peoples, arrived from Bay of Islands, N. F., yesterday afternoon with a full fare of salt herring, having made the round trip in the fine time of 27 days, the second quickest trip of the season.

Capt. Peoples is in the first class for making quick herring trips, and is living right up to his reputation. He reports a homeward passage of seven days, starting with sch. J. Flaherty and being only a few hours behind her in arriving here. Both Captain Cook and Capt. Peoples drove their crafts for all there was in them, and it is indeed remarkable, and shows how finely fishing vessels are designed today and how skillfully they are sailed, when two splendid crafts like these are only separated by about five hours at the end of an 800 mile passage.

Since the last report, schs. American, Electric Flash and Dora A. Lawson have also arrived from Bay of Islands with full cargoes of salt herring.

WEEKLY FISH MARKET.

Nothing has occurred the past week to disturb the fair trade which the dealers have been enjoying since the first of the month. But one change in price is noted, a fare of salt bank cod selling at an advance on the large fish, the figure being \$4.75 per hundred weight, an advance of 10 cents over the previous sales. The price on medium bank cod remains at \$4.25, so that the price for the fare in question is the highest paid for a trawl salt bank cod trip since 1891. All the salt bankers are now home but one and the receipts for the season show a marked decrease from the season of 1903.

Salt mackerel remain dull, although new Irish are a little firmer than for some time. The mackerel season here is over, the last vessel of the New England fleet arriving this week. The catch shows a discouraging decrease from even the small catch of 1903, being about 28,400 barrels against 43,800 barrels in 1903.

The trade in smoked bloater herring continues brisk, and although the receipts of salt herring promises to be larger than for several seasons, the indications are that the market will be just about able to handle the anticipated total.

TEN MILES FROM LAND.

Crew of Sunken Sch. Golden Hope Had Long Row.

Had Just Started for Home with Full Cargo.

Golden Hope, states that the vessel sprang a leak when 10 miles from South Head, Bay of Islands, just after starting for home with a full cargo of salt herring, and that Capt.
