## Fishing Facts and Fancies.

The two-mile net at Washington Park, the biggest seine on the Delaware river, made its first haul of the season, Tuesday morning. In variety and quality the first catch exceeded the records of past seasons. The following miscellaneous assortment was taken out of the net: Eighty shad, 5 logs, 43 mussels, a baby crab, 13 crawfish, 3 rockfish, 2 carpet sweepers, 9 cutfish, 4 corsets, 13 carp and one complete set of bedsprings.

No sooner had the tidings of the rapid decline in the lobster crop, as indicated in the annual report of the shellfish commissioners for Massachusetts, reached the Rhode Island legislature, than \$7,500 was appropriated for lobster culture in that state.

# UNDER BAIT RESTRICTIONS.

## Newfoundland and Canadian Vessels Must Be Careful.

## NEW REGULATIONS ISSUED.

### Step is to Prevent Sale of Bait to Americans.

A cable from St. John's, yesterday, says:

The colonial government today issued a series of regulations under which Newfoundland and Canadian vessels will hereafter be allowed to procure bait in colonial waters, restricting the quantity permitted them and imposing severe penalties for any violations of the rules.

This action by the government is designed to prevent the native fishermen from obtaining excessive stocks of bait from which they might supply American fishing vessels, excluded from these waters under the new Bond bait act. The regulations are very comprehensive. They include the treaty coast and Labrador and show the government is determined to enforce the anti-American law.

A Halifax despatch says:

The bait act passed by the legislature of Newfoundland to prevent American fishing vessels from obtaining supplies, applies only to the territorial waters of that colony and is of no force in Canadian waters, Newfoundland not being a party to the confederation.

It will not prevent Nova Scotia fishermen from supplying American vessels with bait, which can be obtained in large quantities at Canso, where a bait freezer of the most modern type is in operation. A proposal is also on foot to establish a large freezer at North Sydney.

### BONANZA FOR CANSO.

#### Many American Vessels Obtaining Bait There.

#### Benefits Already Derived from Newfoundland's Act.

A despatch from Halifax yesterday says: Action of the Newfoundland government in refusing to allow United States fishing vessels to buy bait in Newfoundland waters is having its effect upon the Gloucester fleet already. During the past three days 30 American vessels have arrived at Canso from fishing grounds seeking bait. Fortunately a good supply awaited them, herring in unusual quantities being taken in nets.

Shore fishermen have benefited by the unusual demand. Competition among buyers has advanced price to netters, and herring that usually sell at \$1 a barrel have been bringing as high as \$5. These American vessels are paying from \$200 to \$400 each for their baits, which is a bonanza for net fishermen. This is likely to continue throughout the season, as this fleet will be obliged to depend upon Nova Scotia bait supply now that they are shut out of Newfoundland.

A number of Lunenburg vessels have arrived from the fishing grounds during the past week. They took a supply of bait and returned. They report fish scarce and dogfish in large quantities. When the Canso Cold Storage Company gets its large bait freezer filled with frozen bait, in addition to the varying supply of fresh bait, Canso will have the most important bait supply on the coast.

#### Prices Low.

Owing to the large amount of fresh fish landed at Boston yesterday, prices have remained low. Yesterday over 800,000 pounds were brought in, while today there are several more trips aggregating about 500,000 pounds.

### STRUCK STERLING ROCK.

#### Sch. Mabel D. Hines Floated with Little Damage.

#### Buoy Was Not in Position to Mark Danger Spot.

Sch. Mabel D. Hines of Beverly, Capt. Charles Rudolf, while entering Canso, N. S. harbor on Sunday, struck on Sterling Rock, and sustained some slight damage. On the rising tide, with the assistance of a tug she was floated.

Capt. Rudolf was fortunate in getting a billing of sixty barrels of fresh herring and sailed for the fishing grounds at daylight.

Buoys had not been placed in position on this rock this spring, or the accident would not have happened. Capt. Rudolf condemns the unmeasured terms the authorities who collect from him harbor dues, but fail to place buoys in position to render navigation safe. He lodged a complaint with the collector of customs.
