BIG BANK FARE.

Sch. Hazel R. Hines Has Big Trip of Salt Cod.

Sch. Hazel R. Hines, Capt. Lovitt E. Hines arrived this afternoon from a salt bank trip with what is probably the largest salt cod fare of the season. Capt. Hines has not yet made his haul but probably will be heard from Monday morning. In the meantime the wise ones are setting the fare in the neighborhood of 290,000 or 300,000 pounds. It is only natural for Capt. Hines to have a big trip and every body looks for a 300,000 pound trip or more when he comes home.

BANNER DAY ON MACKEREL.

Eight Seiners at Boston All with Big Fares.

STRUCK FISH SATURDAY.

Fleet Believed To Have Clear Weather at Last.

This is the biggest fresh mackerel day that the wharf, Boston, has seen for a long, long time. The mackerel fleet struck fish on the southeast part of Georges and having fair weather Saturday, some very big hauls were made. This morning there are eight seiners at the wharf and all with big fresh trips, as follows:

Sch. George Parker, Capt. Rufus McKay, 25,000 fresh mackerel in count and 60 barrels salt mackerel.

Sch. Victor, Capt. John W. McFarland, 25,000 fresh mackerel in count.

Sch. Kernwood, Capt. Thomas Cromwell, 20,000 fresh mackerel in count.

Sch. J. W. Bradley, Capt. William Foley, 15,000 fresh mackerel in count.

Sch. Corsair, Capt. George G. Hanner, 18,000 fresh mackerel in count.

Sch. Mattakesett, Capt. John O'Brien, 15,000 fresh mackerel in count.

Sch. Patrician, Capt. C. Weslev Farmer, 15,000 fresh mackerel in count and 75 barrels salt mackerel.

Sch. Annie Greenlaw, Capt. M. D. McKown, fare not yet reported.

The Parker was spoken last night by the Diana, which arrived at this port this morning, and Capt. McKay reported getting all his big fare of fresh mackerel in one school.

The fish are selling at Boston at from 14 to 17 cents each.

Sch. Emerald, Capt. Albert T. Greenlaw, which arrived here this morning, reports that there was a good showing of mackerel off Race Point yesterday, but that they were wild. He

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had a set at one fine looking school, but they escaped the twine.

The arrival of so many large fares in Boston raises the hope that the fleet may do something now. It has been known that for many days that there has been a large amount of fish on the southeast part of Georges, but since July 3 up to the last of last week, none of the fleet had seen the sun, the fog having been extremely dense and hanging on day after day so that it was impossible to see the schools unless a vessel ran right upon one. Now it appears from the many big trips at Boston that the fog has probably lifted and the vessels are having a chance at the schools which they know have been in that vicinity. What we would now like to hear is news of some of the fleet salting.

Capt. Hamor of sch. Corsair is doing finely. A week ago yesterday he arrived at Boston with a fare of 18,000 fresh mackerel from the southeast part of Georges. He went right back there and as a result got a couple more sets and yesterday arrived at Boston again with another fine fare.

Sch. Mary E. Harty, Capt. Eben T. Lewis, arrived from seining yesterday, and after a very successful season, with a stock which puts him among the leaders of the fleet, Capt. Lewis will relinquish command of the craft and spend the rest of the summer at his home at Boothbay Harbor. On this last trip, Capt. Lewis will stock about \$5000. Capt. Charles H. Harty, the well known mackerel catcher, who has been at Newport all the season thus far, will now come home and take command of the vessel and continue in the mackerel catching business.

FROM THE FUNKS.

Sch. Cavalier Arrived This Noon with a Good Fare.

Sch. Cavalier, Capt. Robert Porper, arrived this noon from the Funks with a good trip of 45,000 pounds of fresh halibut, 10,000 pounds of flitched halibut and 10,000 pounds of salt cod. This is the second trip this season from the Funks and the first one of the season landed here.

Capt. Fred. Morrissey Makes a Big Stock.

Sch. A. E. Whyland, Capt. Fred. Morrissey, weighed off 254,000 pounds of salt cod as the result of her recent salt bank trip, making the splendid stock of \$8196, which is one of very largest of the season. Capt. Morrissey is well known, both afloat and ashore, and has a reputation as a codfish catcher second to none.

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BIG AND QUICK TRIPS.

Several of Them on the Market Here Today.

Fleet Includes Salt Bankers, Shackers and Halibuters.

This has been quite a day for big and quick trips and in spite of the large receipts, there has been no drop in the prices of fish out of the vessel.

Sch. Lelia E. Norwood, Capt. Alfred Johnson, after being out only two weeks on a Georges halibut trip, arrived this morning with a fine fare, 60,000 pounds of fresh fish, 30,000 pounds of salt fish and 10,000 pounds of halibut. Capt. Johnson is a hustler and right at home at this hard and exacting kind of fishing.

Sch. Paragon, Capt. William Hermon, also arrived from a Georges halibuting trip with a big fare, 120,000 pounds of fresh fish and 6000 pounds of halibut. Capt. Hermon has made several trips in very quick time recently and was only a day or so over two weeks on this one.

Sch. Thalia, Capt. Ernest Eugstrom, arrived from a Georges halibuting trip this forenoon with a good fare, having 80,000 pounds of fresh fish, 5009 pounds of salt fish and 4000 pounds of halibut.

From the Funks, the far northern fishing ground up among the icebergs, sch. Tacoma, Capt. Adelbert Nickerson, brings 35,000 pounds of fresh halibut. Capt. Nickerson reports being on fine fishing, but the ice came down on them and fairly drove them off their good spot and materially lessened the size of their trip.

Sch. Bohemia, Capt. Ormby Seeley, arrived today from a salt bank cod fishing trip with a fine fare, 230,000 pounds of salt cod. As the high price still holds on these kind of fish, Capt. Seeley will make a fine large stock and share.

From the deep water of La Have bank, Capt. James Goodwin has brought sch. Ella M. Goodwin home with a big load of fresh fish, 160,000 pounds at least, and may be more, and 3000 pounds of fresh halibut. Capt. Goodwin is certainly there with the goods.

The new Boston schooner Susan and Mary is also at this port this morning with her second fare, 120,000 pounds of fresh fish. Her young skipper is starting in in fine style.

From the hake fields of the Maine coast the pretty schooner Richard Nunan arrived yesterday with 80,000 pounds of fresh fish, a big trip for a craft of her size.

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THROUGH DORY BOTTOM.

Swordfish Nearly Struck One of Sch. Eva Mildred's Crew.

Sch. Eva Mildred, which arrived at T wharf, Boston, Saturday morning, brought in 75 swordfish and a piece of a swordfish sword, there being attached to the latter a tale of a very narrow escape of one of the crew.

Edward Estes is the name of the fisherman who is congratulating himself on the bad aim of the swordfish. It was the last one taken on the trip. It was late Wednesday afternoon when the lookout at the foretopmast sighted the fish floating on the surface of the water. He hailed the deck, and the man at the wheel steered for the fish, the spearman making ready to strike at him. It proved a very big one, and the spearsman sent the lily iron into him with all his force.

The man on the deck holding the buoy attached to the lily iron rope had scarcely time to cast it overboard, so sudden was the dive of the surprised fish. It fell to Edward Estes to take the dory, and go after the fish with a rowing mate. Estes caught up the buoy, and planting himself at the stern of the dory, began to pull in the line. As soon as the fish felt the first tug on the line he turned in the direction of the dory, and came for it like a flash. Diving within 10 feet of it, he came up under it, and drove the hard, bony sword nearly two feet through the bottom within a few inches of where Estes stood.

The sword caught fast, and the fish nearly overturned the dory in his attempts to get free. Estes cut the intruding sword off at the bottom of the dory, and the fish freed itself, and later was killed. The piece of sword cut off by Estes was kept on board as a trophy.

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STOCKED NEARLY \$15,000.

Capt. Eben T. Lewis Has Done Well This Season.

Will Now Give Up Command of Sch. Mary E. Harty.

Sch. Mary E. Harty, Capt. Eben T. Lewis stocked \$5093.16 as the result of her recent seining trip, the crew sharing \$120.27. Since starting in the Harty this spring, Capt. Lewis has stocked \$14,500 which is certainly a record of which to be proud. Always up among the leaders and several years the high line of the fleet, Capt. Lewis has for years been one of the leading figures in the mackerel fishery.

Many big stocks he has made and many big trips he has landed, and yet he shows no sign of the strain of years of hard endeavor. Those who know him best claim that he has discovered the fountain of perpetual youth, and certainly it seems so, for he always looks the same, no older as the years have rolled by, and today could easily be mistaken for one of the young skippers just beginning the business of seining mackerel.

"Eben," as everybody calls him, will now go home to Boothbay Harbor for the rest of the summer, but his many friends here hope to see him again next season.
