NO WARSHIPS ASKED FOR.

Says Congressman Gardner in Speech at Salem.

Treaty Questions Not Now in Dispute.

Congressman Gardner spoke before the Republican Club of Salem, last Friday evening, and in the course of his speech he said: "I see by the papers that a battleship has been asked for, for the benefit of the Gloucester fishermen on the Newfoundland coast. It is about time to put a stop to such foolish talk. No one that I know of has asked for a warship, either now or at any other time.

"Great Britain has on the spot the Latonia, Newfoundland has the Fiona and the United States has the fish commission schooner Grampus. I think that they are fully capable of settling any questions that may arise.

"With regards to the newspaper reports that the Fiona has stopped a vessel from the Bay of Islands with Newfoundlanders on board who wish to ship on our vessels, I know nothing about it. I see no reason why the Newfoundlanders haven't the right to demand such clearance papers from our vessels as are in accordance with the local law of the colony. I cannot see how the treaty rights have anything to do with the question."

A Whale's Jawbones.

The jawbones of a whale are sometimes twenty feet in length, and the mouth, when wide open, is 12 by 18 feet. The throat, however, is so small as scarcely to admit a hen's egg. The whale gets his living by straining the animalculae and small fish out of the water he takes into his capacious mouth. It must be slow work, but then he has plenty of time and nothing else to do, so he attends to his eating so regularly that he often accumulates a ton of oil in his bulky system.

ANOTHER GOOD FARE.

Capt. Clayton Morrissey Bobs Up Serenely as Usual.

Sch. Elector, Capt. Clayton Morrissey, came along yesterday with her second salt bank cod fare of the season, and as usual, Capt. Morrissey has a good one, 220,000 pounds, he calls them, and he generally has what he calls for and a little more. On his first trip he had a big fare, so with the result of this one he will pull out another of his big season's work. He has won the high line honor for several seasons and will not be far from it this year.

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GARDNER DEFENDS LODGE.

Heavily Scores Osborne Howes in Beverly Speech.

Says Latter's Knowledge of Treaty Matter Was Never Great.

Congressman Gardner was the principal speaker at the republican rally at Beverly Saturday evening. He was given a demonstrative reception and his speech was well received. He talked mainly on the attack of Osborne Howes upon Senator Lodge, and in the course of his remarks got after Mr. Howes in the following manner:

"This morning Mr. Howes comes out with an open letter which may be divided into four parts, as follows: First, that Senator Lodge wrote and perhaps suppressed a previous letter committing himself to the treaty. Second, Howes states that he knew little about the Hay-Bond Newfoundland treaty until December, 1902, when he became actively interested in it in consequence of the conversation in which he alleges that Secretary Hay denounced Senator Lodge's treachery. Third, Howes gives the public to understand that no friendship existed at that time between Secretary Hay and Senator Lodge for the reason that the former profoundly mistrusted the latter. Fourth, the incomprehensible argument that Senator Lodge must have written the alleged forgery because it would have been impossible for Mr. Howes to have known that any letter had existed unless Secretary Hay had shown it to him.

"Division one of Mr. Howes' letter is absolutely disapproved by Secretary Hay's communication of October 17, 1902, written after he had signed the treaty. In this letter he distinctly states that the provisions of the treaty are a matter for Senator Lodge's future approval. If Senator Lodge had committed himself previously, Secretary Hay's letter would be absurd.

"With regard to the second division, I believe that Mr. Howes speaks the truth when he says that he knew little about the treaty

until he saw Mr. Hay in December, 1902. In fact, any one who has read his evidence on the subject before the senate committee on foreign relations, must realize that his knowledge of the subject was never extensive. Perhaps Mr. Howes speaks the truth when he says that he was not actively interested in the question until this interview with Secretary Hay. If so, is evidence at the same session of Congress is false. The second sentence of his statement before the senate committee on foreign relations reads as follows: "I have been interested in the making of a trade treaty with Newfoundland and have been through Newfoundland and studied the question."

"Third—Secretary Hay's distrust and contempt for Senator Lodge is somewhat difficult to disprove in view of the fact that Secretary Hay is dead. I have a bit of evidence of a personal nature to offer on this point. I myself was known to Secretary Hay merely as Senator Lodge's son-in-law. He had no interest in me other than his friendship for the senator. At the time when Mr. Howes says that Secretary Hay profoundly mistrusted and despised Senator Lodge I had just been nominated for Congress after a very strenuous campaign. I hold in my hand a personal hand-written letter from Secretary Hay, written in October, 1902, two weeks before the date of the above mentioned letters, which ends with the following sentences:

"But I will run the risk and say how gratified we all are on your recent signal success. We wished and hoped for it, but had no idea it would be so splendid and so complete. We are particularly glad that you will fill an existing vacancy, so that we shall see you in Washington at once. Faithfully yours, (Signed) John Hay."

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"Either Mr. Howes must admit that this was a singular letter for the secretary of state to write at that time to the son-in-law of his enemy, or else he too must denounce this letter as a forgery.

Fourth—It has always been a matter of current knowledge in Washington, and never denied, that Senator Lodge gave his approval to the Hay-Bond treaty under certain conditions, which were not, however fulfilled. It is very possible that Mr. Howes, as an editorial writer for the Boston Herald, was conversant with this fact through the despatch of the Herald correspondent in Washington.

"To me, personally, the existence of this letter was well known. I remember distinctly hearing President Roosevelt, in the presence of Senator Lodge, three Gloucester gentlemen and myself, state that the senator in his approval of the treaty, had distinctly made it conditional according to its bearing on the fishery question.

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SALT HERRING COMING.

Sch. Dora A. Lawson on Way with a Full Load.
