GOLD MINE NEAR HOME.

Pollock Fleet Has Been Working It with Great Success.

Catch Far and Away Beyond Any and All Previous Records.

It is doubtful if, excepting the fish dealers themselves, the general public has any idea of the magnitude of the pollock fishery of this port. The fishery begins in the fall, this year some of the fleet starting in September, but the main fleet did not get fishing until October. It is estimated that fully 60 sail of vessels are included in this fleet, and these crafts make from two to three trips a week.

The price started at about \$1 per hundred weight and then went to 90 cents, where it has remained most of the season, and a very fair price it has been too, considering the large amount of fish that has been landed. Lately the price has dropped to 80 cents and at present is 70 cents and even this figure brings good returns. The season generally lasts until well into December and the present season will be far and away the best on record.

Up to the present time this year the fleet has landed about 13,000,000 pounds of pollock, and nearly all of this has been landed this fall, making the catch about double what it was last year at this time. This is an enormous amount of one kind of fish to be brought in here in so short a time and shows that the vessels as a whole have been doing well, and also that the firms have had to do a hustle to take all the trips in and find room for them on their wharves.

As illustrative of how well the vessels are doing, it can be stated that the cook of one of the crafts of the fleet, which craft by the way, is probably the highliner, has made \$500 since the latter part of September. The highliner of the crew of this same craft has shared \$350 and two others of the crew are very close to him. This is certainly remarkable work.

One skipper, who is in an old craft and doing perhaps a little better than the average, told a TIMES man that he was doing fairly. "Our crew have averaged \$35 each per week since we started in the latter part of September, and

have been home two or three times a week," said he, "and that aint so bad." And surely it is mighty good pay.

Some of the vessels have done extra well, among them schs. Valentina, Catherine D. Enos, Gladys and Sabra, Marguerite Haskins, Edward A. Rich, Maple Motor, Astor, James A. Garfield, Aphelion, Olympia, Jubilee, Volcan, and several others.

The fleet has continued to fish and it is expected that the catch of pollock will be beyond any previous year ever heard of.

HAS 70,000 POLLOCK.

Sch. Valentina Arrives with Record-Breaking Fare.

Sch. Valentina, Capt. Charles O'Neil, which sailed from here Sunday morning, arrived this morning with the largest pollock trip of the season and one of the largest, if not the largest fresh pollock trip on record, the craft hauling her fare for 70,000 pounds. The fare sold to Reed & Gamage.

The Valentina is the high line of the pollock fleet, the cook having in the neighborhood of \$600 to his credit, while the high line share is over \$350. This is certainly big work for seven or eight weeks of fishing.

THE POLLOCK FISHERY.

Considering Gloucester's business enterprises and industries, very few people have any idea of the great extent which the pollock fishery has been conducted here this year. There is but little doubt if a manufacturing plant had been induced to locate here and transacted an equal amount of business, the good tidings would have been boasted of and upon nearly everybody's lips. Another indication that we do not appreciate and make the most of what we have in the industrial line. The pollock fleet of this port this season comprises some 60 sail of vessels, and although the season does not terminate until well into December, the grand total of 13,000 pounds have been landed here this fall, or about double that of last year. In round numbers this represents a monetary value of \$115,000.

As an illustration of the good that it has done the city from a financial standpoint, a cook of one of the schooners has made \$500 in the business since the last of September, and the crew have shared \$350, which certainly for the length of time engaged is exceptionally good wages. Surely the pessimist, who is always looking on the hard side of Gloucester's business interests, will have difficulty in becoming reconciled with these facts and figures. These strides in the business of Gloucester are what we want to increase that grand showing of a total business in 1904 of over \$10,000,000.

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LUCKY FIND.

Sch. Titania Picks Up Sch. Mary E. Smith's Whole String of Nets.

Sch. Titania, Capt. Archie Selig, which arrived from Georges haddocking this morning, brought in the whole string of nets, 65 in number, belonging to sch. Mary E. Smith of Portland, which the craft lost about 20 miles off Thacher's island a few nights ago. The nets contained 606 large mackerel.

Capt. Selig reports picking up the nets 18 miles off Thacher's island, and he also saw several schools of fish, which he took to be mackerel in the vicinity.

Two cars of fished halibut, about 70,000 pounds, arrived here Saturday from the Pacific coast for market here.

The Trouble Is in Newfoundland.

The fishery trouble in Newfoundland, says the St. Johns N. B. Sun, is not so much between Newfoundland and the Gloucester fishermen as it is between the Colonial Government and her fishermen. What has been going on in Newfoundland has occurred in New Brunswick. It is understood that fish are constantly bought on the Bay of Fundy coast of New Brunswick by Maine people and entered through the custom houses of the United States as the catch of the purchaser.

The seller knows that he cannot himself take the fish to a United States port and enter them free of duty. The purchaser knows that he is obtaining a free entry of fish which the law declares to be dutiable. It is well known to the officers who pass the entry to their superiors at Washington, and to Congress, that this is a regular practice. But it goes on. It gives to the United States parties interested all the free trade they want, and no more.

Serious Condition of Affairs at St. Pierre.

A despatch from St. Dney, C. B., says: "Advices reaching here from the island of Miquelon indicate that a serious condition exists in the French colony which forms the city of St. Pierre. The fisheries, which constitute the chief and almost the sole industry of the colony, were so unproductive during the past season as to be considered a practical failure. This misfortune has been reflected in the entire business life of the island, and the result is that the inhabitants feel that they are to face with starvation during the coming year.

With this discouraging prospect hundreds of the colonists are leaving the island and proceeding either to Canada or to France. Over 600 already have arrived in this city.

It is expected that an appeal will be made to the French government."

Taking Prompt Action.

The St. John's, N. F. Free Press says: "It is gratifying to note that the government are dealing with the matter of the fouling of the herring grounds in Bay of Islands. It is notorious that the herring fishery on the Labrador and in Placentia and Fortune Bays, has been killed by this means, and advices this year state that large quantities of herring have been thrown overboard in Bay of Islands, threatening destruction to the fishery there. The government has appointed the following men to see that this thing is not carried on any longer.—J. Barry, Summer-Meadow point; B. Bernard, Woods' Is-side; S. Allen, Birchy Cove; Ed.
