KINDNESS APPRECIATED

Good Words Spoken for Consul General at Ottawa.

Canadian Officials Also Treated Gloucester Men Finely.

In speaking of securing the release on payment of a nominal fine of the schs. Parthia of this port and Raymah of Boston, which were seized off Cape North recently, the particulars of which are familiar to all, Messrs. E. Archer Bradley and Capt. Henry Atwood, who went to Ottawa to secure the release of the crafts, if possible, express a deep sense of appreciation of the good work of United States Consul General John G. Foster, who is located at that city.

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The gentlemen say that from the start, Consul Foster took a deep interest in the cases, both from a governmental and personal standpoint, and left nothing undone which would help in securing the release of the two crafts.

He placed his wide knowledge of affairs at the disposal of them and not only suggested and advised, but acted. His intimacy with the method of Canadian procedure and his acquaintance with high officials smoothed the road for them in many instances, and he was ever ready, night and day, to assist them. In fact, he was a United States consul in fact as well as name and conclusively proved his worth.

Since arriving home, Mr. Bradley and Mr. Atwood have lost no opportunity in letting our representatives at Washington, as well as the owners of our fishing vessels, know of the good work of Consul Foster and of all he did for them in the cases they had at hand, and it is safe to say that the whole fishing interest joins with them in appreciation of the services so generously and successfully performed.

It is understood that Consul Foster is a diplomat of considerable note, and it is safe to say that when the time comes for his advancement to some more important post, he will have what assistance there is in the united strength of the Gloucester fishing interest.

As there have been some cases of local experience with other United States representatives, so markedly different than that of Mr. Bradley and Capt. Atwood with Consul Foster it is a pleasure to record their feeling in this case and to publish their sentiment of appreciation and gratitude to that gentleman for his services.

An acknowledgment of this kind would not be complete without mention of the uniform courtesy and consideration with which both gentlemen were treated by the Dominion officials with whom they came in contact. From each and all they were received in the pleasantest manner, and on every hand nothing but the kindest feelings were expressed for the Gloucester fishing interest. Of course they claimed that these were their laws and that like those of other countries they should be observed, but throughout the whole negotiations, which ended in the release of the vessels on a nominal fine, they displayed unflinching courtesy and considered the matter at hand in a most calm and non-prejudiced manner.

Both Mr. Bradley and Capt. Atwood certainly have reason to feel that their visit to Ottawa has been productive of much good. All that they learned, the splendid manner in which they were treated by Consul Foster and the Canadian officials and the evident desire of the latter for pleasant relations between the two countries, together with the satisfactory outcome of the cases at hand, they have told to the fishing interest as a whole, and the good results of the visit will be manifest in the future.

HERRING DECISION.

Appraisers Decide Sch. Olympia's Cargo Was Dutiable.

The following decision of local interest has been handed down by the United States Board of Appraisers, sitting at New York: No. 11,348.—Herring, American Fisheries. —Protest 194,112 of Nathaniel P. Smith against the assessment of duty by the collector of customs at the port of Gloucester. Before Board 1 (Lunt, Sharretts and McClelland, General Appraisers), May 16, 1906. Opinion by Lunt, G. A.

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Certain frozen herring were claimed to be free of duty under paragraph 626, tariff act of 1897, as the product of American fisheries.

Lunt, General Appraiser, decides: "The importers have filed a letter in the case in which it is stated that the fish were caught by the crew of the American registered vessel Olympia, assisted by some of the inhabitants of Grand Manan, New Brunswick, and a letter of the collector seems to indorse this as being entitled to credit. We are in possession of a communication from the United States consular agent at Grand Manan, together with a statement signed by a number of British subjects dwelling there, from which we are led to the conclusion that the herring in question were taken from the water by British subjects and by them taken ashore and frozen and afterward sold to the captain of the Olympia. From all the evidence in the case, we are forced to the conclusion that the herring were not the product of American fisheries and the protest is therefore overruled."

Found Stray Men of Sch. Olga Near Their Own Vessel.

Took Them to Magdalenes and Claimed Money for Rescue.

The North Sydney, C. B., correspondent of the Cape Breton Enterprise of Saturday says:

"Sch. Olga, Capt. Wilde, sails today for the Magdalens. One thousand barrels of fresh mackerel are due at Boston by steamer from Yarmouth, N. S., the fish being taken in the traps in that vicinity. UNIQUE FORMATION.

Iceberg Seen with Outline of Human Face.

Capt. Neil McCallum of the big Leyland line steamer Bohemian, which arrived at Boston from Liverpool yesterday, sighted an enormous iceberg on June 2, in latitude 52.00 north and longitude 48.56 west. It measured 220 feet high and 600 feet long and had three distinct peaks. The centre one was conspicuous from the fact that on each side its formation suggested the outlines of a human face.
