Archibald Devine, with the same amount. The trip of sch. Mary E. Harty is the largest of the season from the Cape Shore.



# MADE BIG CATCHES.

## Two Seiners Strike Medi- um Mackerel.]

### FORTY CAPE SHORE CRAFT IN:

Cape Shore Season About Over  
with 4000 Barrels Catch.



Since last report a fleet of 40 seiners have arrived from the Cape Shore and that fishery has been brought to a close for this season. The vessels as a whole had small fares, sch. Avalon, Capt. Charles Maguire, having the largest amount, 215 barrels of salt mackerel. Some of the vessels had in the neighborhood of 100 barrels, many had less than that and several had no fish at all. The season was the poorest for years.

So numerous were the arrivals that they covered the whole blackboard at the Board of Trade and the various fish dealers and mackerel buyers were there yesterday morning discussing the situation, price to be paid, etc., when most unexpectedly came the best news of the mackerel season. A rumor was out that sch. A. M. Nicholson, Capt. Solomon Jacobs, was at Boston with a good fare.

The Times called up Mr. William E. Dennett, the Fort wharf fresh fish dealer, on the telephone and learned that Capt. Jacobs was really there with 117 barrels of large fresh mackerel and 50,000 fresh medium mackerel in count. The news was quickly posted on the bulletin board and in half an hour the good news was well circulated about the city.

A message to the Times from Boston soon after stated that the fresh mackerel of the Nicholson were taken off Cape Sable Friday afternoon, while the vessel was on the way home from the Cape Shore with her salt mackerel.

Immediately everybody on the corner and in the Board of Trade began to discuss the possibilities of the fish going into the Bay of Fundy and to speculate on what the fleet would do if it struck them there later. The most cheering fact of all was that the medium fish, which disappeared so suddenly out south last spring, had been located again in large numbers, for the despatch to the Times from Boston stated that there was a very large body of fish where Capt. Jacobs got his haul.

Before the excitement of this large catch and the arrival of the large fleet here from the Cape Shore had died away, Mr. Hugh Parkhurst received a telegram from Capt. C. Wesley Farmer of sch. Patrician announcing his arrival at Boston with 30 barrels salt medium mackerel and 400 barrels of fresh medium mackerel. This was enough to keep the mackerel excitement to the highest pitch all the rest of the day.

Capt. Jacobs and some of the crew of the Patrician came down from Boston during the day and all were besieged by vessel owners, mackerel buyers, seining skippers and fishermen, all anxious to know the particulars of the big hauls, how, when and where they were taken, how the fish were working and what the prospect was of trips if the fleet went to the eastward.

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From all that could be learned, sch. A. M. Nicholson got her fish Friday afternoon 20 miles south by west from Cape Sable and sch. Patrician, also bound home from the Cape Shore, and with no fish, struck the schools Saturday morning. There were schools everywhere, great red rafts of fish. Capt. Jacobs got his fresh fish all in one school and Capt. Farmer both. As soon as the Patrician made her set, the Nicholson was kept off for market, but even 20 miles to the westward of where they made their haul they saw large schools of fish.

The haul of the Patrician was a big one, filling her ice house and 242 barrels beside, the fish going about 216 to an iced barrel, but large as was the haul, it was but a small portion of the school they set at. They had a hard time getting their seine back. The dory went down and the boat, also, and the corks went out of sight, the fish all the while boiling out over them in a steady red stream. At last so many went out that the crew were able to handle the twine and the small part left in the seine was enough for a big trip.

The fish are the same size as those taken out south this spring, which disappeared so suddenly. The stories regarding which way the fish were working are not exactly clear. Some thought the fish were going east north-east, out by the Cape, while others were of the opinion that they were not going in any particular direction, but seemed to be lying there. The majority of the skippers now in port believe that the fish will be found soon in the Bay of Fundy, and if they do go there, some splendid trips will certainly result.

Both vessels will get fine stocks, as the price, 5 1-2 cents per fish, is a good one for that size of mackerel, pound fish.

There was an absence of any lively bidding on the trips. The last sales, \$13 per barrel, was offered, and after a few hours most of the trips had been sold and eventually all went at that figure.

Sch. Effie M. Prior arrived at Newport Sunday night with 33 barrels of fresh mackerel. All the southern seining fleet were at Newport yesterday for harbor, the weather being very bad, heavy southeast wind with rain and fog. The vessels still report lots of fish to the westward of Montauk Point, but that they are very wild.

Thus far 59 vessels of the Cape Shore seining fleet have arrived out of the entire fleet of 71 sail which went there this spring. But very few more are expected here direct, as most of the balance are known to have kept on and gone to the southward in hopes of getting a trip before coming home. The 12 vessels yet to come have little or no salt mackerel, so the Cape Shore reason can practically be said to be over today, with a catch of 4065 barrels. The catch is very light and as compared with the catch of 14,000 barrels there last year amounts to a real failure.

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The medium fresh mackerel at Boston this morning are selling at 5 1-2 cents each.

The fare of sch. Helen G. Wells, brought in here Monday, which are medium fish, sold to the Gloucester Fresh Fish Company.

The medium fresh mackerel brought in by sch. Mary E. Harty were shipped to Boston and sold at five cents each.

No sales of salt mackerel were reported at Boston this morning.

The new sch. Terra Nova, of Boston, Capt. John Hickey, arrived at T wharf from the Cape Shore, Sunday, from her maiden trip with 185 barrels of salt mackerel, one of the best fares that has come from there this season.

Heath's trap took 1300 mackerel yesterday, the fish running mostly small, with a few large ones among them.
