**LUNENBURG FISHERIES.**

**Shore Fishermen Reaped Richest Harvest for Thirty Years.**

A Lunenburg, N. S., despatch, in speaking of the fisheries of that port, which is called the "Gloucester of Nova Scotia," says:

"While the bank fishermen have not made a very profitable year's work, the shore fishermen have reaped a rich harvest from the sea. This beats any record for the past 30 years. Usually every seven years shore fishermen do well; but this year, although coming within the rule, has excelled the brightest hopes of the fishermen themselves.

"During the summer mackerel were principally caught, over 10,000 barrels being taken in and around the town of Lunenburg. Cash has been paid mostly for the fish and consequently there has been good times all summer. Now these men are at the herring fishing, which are reported very plentiful. At Tancook over 1000-barrels were taken last week."

**FREEZER AT NORTH SYDNEY.**

**Gloucester Capital Interested in Structure Now Building.**

The Sydney C. B., Post of Wednesday, printed the following dispatch from North Sydney:

"At last some of our enterprising citizens have awakened to the importance of a bait freezer being erected at North Sydney. Today construction work on the building was begun, the promoters securing a lease for twelve years of part of Salter's lumber wharf. No better location could be found and it will be in close proximity to the anchorage of the Gloucester and other fishermen coming here. The freezer will have a capacity of one hundred tons and will cost in the vicinity of \$7000.

"Gloucester fishing firms have taken stock in the new concern, which realizing the importance of the building being erected at once has employed a large force of men who are pushing the work along rapidly. It is the intention of the promoters of the industry to have it completed and stocked with Newfoundland bait this fall.

"What the erection of a bait freezer in North Sydney means not only to the large fleet of fishermen who yearly come to this port for shelter, supplies, ice, bait, etc., can only be appreciated by those who have an idea of the vast sums of money spent by the fishermen who find it impossible to secure bait here."

**NEWFOUNDLAND FISHERY.**

**St John's Despatch Substantiates Times Article.**

**Modus Vivendi Negotiation Regarding Fishery.**

The following despatch from St. John's, N. F., under date of yesterday will be read with interest:

"Representatives of the American, British and Newfoundland governments are negotiating a modus vivendi regarding the winter herring fishing about to open on the coast of Newfoundland.

"The Americans claim the right to use purse seines, which are forbidden by the laws of Newfoundland because of the destructive effect of these appliances. The British government, it is understood, qualifiedly admits the justice of the colonial protest that the use of purse seines threatens a destruction of the herring schools.

"American Commissioner Alexander suggests a compromise by which the American fishermen would be accorded the privileges heretofore enjoyed by them.

"Should the Newfoundland government be unwilling to concede this point, it is feared that the British government will conclude an agreement with the Americans over the heads of the colonial commissioners."

The tenor of this despatch is in line with what has appeared in the Times on several occasions for the past three months, and shows that the Times is in a position to give its readers news on the Newfoundland herring situation which can be depended upon as being reliable and correct.

**LAST OF THE FLITCHERS.**

**All of the Far Northern Fishing Fleet Are Now Home.**

Sch. Pinta, Capt. James Hayes, arrived late Saturday afternoon from the far northern fishing grounds with the largest flitched halibut fare of the season, 130,000 pounds. Capt. Hayes struck a big spot of fish and had the weather been good in August would have had even a much larger fare.

Sch. Arbutus, Capt. Charles Flygore, arrived home this morning, being the last of the flitchers. She has 90,000 pounds of flitched halibut and 30,000 pounds of salt cod.

This morning, the captains and owners of the vessels of the flitched halibut fleet together with the large users of these fish are having conference regarding the making of a price for the same.
