Stetson left for Bucksport yesterday. Capt. Nicholson will return in the spring.

GOING TO WASHINGTON.

President Carroll To Confer with Congressman Gardner.

President Thomas J. Carroll of the Board of Trade will depart for Washington on Monday, where he will be in conference with Congressman Augustus P. Gardner in relation to the pure food bill. This bill has been the subject of much correspondence between fish dealers in this city and the authorities at Washington, and committees of the board of trade have visited Washington and laid their views on the subject before the congressional committee which had the bill in charge and were very much assisted in their efforts by Congressman Gardner, who has always placed his services at the disposal of his Gloucester constituents. This visit to the capital by President Carroll will no doubt be the means of clearing away any uncertainty relative to the methods of preserving the fish and the manner of placing them on the market.

UP AGAINST IT.

Sch. Juno Again Ashore in Boston Harbor and Floated.

The fine Boston sch. Juno, Capt. Doggett, seems certainly to be up against it as far as going ashore is concerned. On the trip before the present one, the vessel struck in Boston harbor, but got off and then was run into by a scow and obliged to come here for extensive repairs.

Then again yesterday morning while working up Boston harbor, bound for T wharf with 60,000 pounds of fresh fish in, she struck the rocks at the northerly end of Georges island, and as it was rough at the time she began to pound. The life savers went to her and tugs H. A. Mathias and Betsy Ross got lines to her but failed to move her.

The tide was on the ebb, and as it left her she heeled sharply to starboard, making her position a good one. At 1 o'clock yesterday afternoon the same two tugs made another attempt and succeeded in floating her. She was towed to T wharf and will go on the railways today for examination and repairs.
