BUSY DAY AT T WHARF.

Fifteen Off Shore Haddockers at Boston with Trips.

Aggregate of a Million Pounds of Fish To Take Out.

The fish dealers on T wharf, Boston, are having one of their busiest days of the season today, because of the arrival of 15 of the off shore haddocking fleet with fine fares, and also 11 of the shore or market fleet with fair trips. Add to this that it is Monday and that fish are in good demand and the hustle and bustle can well be imagined.

The off shore trips range from 50,000 to 70,000 pounds, and some of the vessels were out less than a week, so they have prime stock. Sch. Natalie J. Nelson, Capt. Albert Larkin, is one of the high ones. Sch. Flirt, Capt. Alfred Green, has 51,000 pounds. Capt. Green and Capt. Larkin are "running the mail." The former is credited with being high line of the Gloucester fleet this winter and there is not more than one or two vessels ahead or up with him in the whole haddock fleet this winter season.

Sch. Romance, Capt. William J. Corkum, has another good trip, 70,000 pounds, and 2500 pounds of halibut to top off with.

Sch. Conqueror, Capt. Robinson Griffin, has 65,000 pounds and is another who is close to the head of the column this winter.

Sch. Slade Gorton, Capt. George E. Heckman, has been out but a few days, and has 70,000 pounds. Capt. Heckman has been ashore all winter, this being his first trip out.

The otter trawler Spray has 55,000 pounds and 2500 pounds of flounders.

The other big trips are sch. Thomas A. Cromwell 60,000 pounds, sch. Mildred Robinson 45,000 pounds, sch. Lillian, 60,000 pounds, sch. Francis J. O'Hara, Jr., 55,000 pounds, sch. The skin of an eel may have a future before it, to be used as leather, now that all kinds of common leather are increasing fast in price. This belief is asserted by a Lynn exchange and thus a possible new vocation may be open for the Cape Ann residents. It would be a very good industry if a livelihood was offered those who desired to seek the slimy "critters" for eel skin leather. Eels may be caught at all seasons of the year in the winter by spear and summer by bob.

If the fisherman knows how to handle the eel, he may quickly take off his skin. This pelt, properly cured in the sun, makes a tough leather, with a grain that looks as if the skin might be made into a very salable piece of fancy leather.

A Salem fisherman has been getting many eels out of the flats this winter particularly along the Marblehead shore of Salem harbor, and he has been selling the eel meat at a profit, and has been drying the skins into leather. The harbor eels are of good size and a bunch of eel skins average about two feet long.

The eel skin leather looks like snake skin leather, and this might be expected, for some people consider the eel a member of the snake family.

Skins of certain snakes are now of much value. At times the snake skin hunters have been unable to supply the demand for snake pelts. So it many turn out that the pelts of eels will come into demand as a substitute for rattlesnake skins.

No Changes in Prices. The fisheries committee of the Board of Trade met this morning, but made no changes in the prices of salt or fresh fish.

SCOTCH TRAWLERS, TOO.

Several Are Expected with French Fleet on This Side of Atlantic.

Besides the fleet of French steam trawlers which is expected to make this port their headquarters next summer in the prosecution of the bank fisheries, it is said that several vessels of the same type will also come out from Scotland in the spring to engage in the same industry. The French trawlers are now being prepared for the season's work and it is expected that in about a month's time the first of the fleet will reach this side.
