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**STRUCK GOOD FISHING.**

In common with most of the handline fleet, Capt. Geel had been finding codfish scarce and as the haddockers were thicker around the two-hookers than flies around a molasses barrel, he decided to go in on the bank and try the shoal water. He sounded in eight fathoms and in this ticklish place got 3000 pounds of halibut the first day, on the handlines. The next day's fishing made up 9000 weight, one of William A. King's Georgesmen and one other being in the vicinity. Next day a storm gave indications of its approach, so there was nothing to do but leave the shoal spot and run off the bank, leaving good fishing behind.

**Sch. Eglantine In from Maine Coast Seining Trip.**

**First Voyage of Kind Made in Regular Fishing Vessel.**

Sch. Eglantine, Capt. George Smith, came in this morning and if ever a vessel had a full fare of fish she has, for she is full below the hatches and even has some on deck. She has 175,000 pounds of fresh pollock, dressed.

A week ago Monday, Capt. Smith started on what was a new voyage, pollock seining, in a large vessel, on the Maine coast. He believed that pollock schooled in the early spring around Matinicus and Monhegan, and believed that big trips could be taken with a seine.

He fitted out quickly and sailed and the proof of his judgment is the quick trip he has made and the full fare the vessel has. Every pen is full and even in the dory and on deck he has fish. These fish are in demand at the present time and the fare will be discharged quickly, and Capt. Smith will get away again.

This is the first time that this method of fishing has been conducted at this season of the year in a regular fishing craft on the Maine coast.

**BOND GOES TO ENGLAND.**

**Will Attend Session of Colonial Conference There.**

Sir Robert Bond, premier of Newfoundland, left St. John's N. F., yesterday for Halifax, on his way to London, to attend the conference of officials of British colonies. Premier Bond, while in England, will hold a conference with the secretary of state for the colonies regarding the existing fisheries dispute between the colonial government and the United States. Among those who will accompany Premier Bond across the Atlantic will be Sir Wilfrid Laurier, premier of Canada.

**Nice Halibut Trip.**

Sch. Theodore Roosevelt, Capt. James McHenry, arrived from the southern edge of Grand Bank late yesterday afternoon, with a fine fare of 35,000 pounds of fresh halibut. The fare is yet unsold. Capt. McHenry reports very bad weather up to Palm Sunday, but since then it had been good for fishing. The vessel shipped one sea during a gale in the middle of March which swept away her gurry kid and also started her house.

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TO GOVERNOR.

Bay of Islands People Sent Petition and Address.

Presented Sentiment Regarding Present Herring Laws.

A mass meeting of fishermen and citizens of Bay of Islands, N. F., was held a week ago Tuesday evening in the Church of England hall, when strong resolutions and an address against the enforcement of Sir Robert Bond's herring fishery regulations were unanimously adopted.

The chair was occupied by Mr. Thomas Perrott, a worthy representative of the bone and sinew of the country. He explained that the object of the meeting, and pointed out the great injustice that had been done the fishing interests of the country by the introduction of Sir Robert Bond's fishing policy.

The secretary, Mr. J. A. Barrett, then addressed the meeting, and proposed the resolution and address, which Mr. J. H. Baggt ably seconded. Other speakers took the floor, and freely expressed themselves on the fishery question, and clearly showed their indignation over the action of the Bond government in enforcing such stringent regulations on the fishermen.

"Whereas, we, the people of Bay of Islands, view with alarm the policy of the government of this colony regarding our herring fishery; and

"Whereas, in the interests of our families, we feel that it becomes necessary for us to protest against said policy, and to appeal to our Gracious Majesty the King for protection and preservation; be it therefore

"Resolved that the annexed address to His Excellency, the Governor is a correct and true expression of our feelings on this matter; and that our chairman and secretary sign same on behalf of this meeting, and forward same, together with this resolution, to His Excellency, with a respectful request that he give the same his consideration."

The address to Gov. MacGregor, which were annexed to the resolutions, went over the whole herring situation in a most exhaustive manner. The following paragraphs are extracts from the address:

"For many years past the principal support of the people of this bay has been obtained from the prosecution of the herring fishery in this neighborhood, and from the industries incidental to said fishery.

"In the past a ready market has been found for this catch by selling to American schooners, which have come down to the coast at this season, and purchased our herring for cash, and at rates satisfactory to our people.

"Without this American market, the fishery would be of little or no benefit to us, as the demand for the fish in other directions, on the same or as good terms, is comparatively nothing.

The address then cites the obnoxious Acts of 1905 and 1906 and shows what burdens they placed upon the Newfoundland fishermen. It also touched on the Nova Scotia vessels chartered by Americans and concluded:

"In the meantime, official statements have been made in the House of Assembly and elsewhere to the effect that the majority of the people of this coast are in favor of the Newfoundland government.

"We beg to state most emphatically, that that the people of this coast are unanimous in condemning this policy as one which is injurious to the best interests of the colony as a whole, and ruinous to the livelihood of the people of this Western Coast.

"For the reasons, therefore, that (a) the American market is the only adequate market available to us in which to dispose of our herring; (b) no substitute sufficient and immediate is provided for this market, and without it we shall be compelled to abandon our fishery and take our families elsewhere to seek a living; and (c) the policy of the Newfoundland government is, in our opinion, contrary to natural justice to the best interests of the colony.

"We respectfully pray your Excellency to submit this statement to His Majesty-in-Council through the proper channels; and we further pray that His Majesty-in-Council will be pleasee to take such action as will enable us to enjoy our fishery as we enjoyed same prior to the legislation of 1905 and 1906."


