FRENCH STEAM TRAWLERS

Why Have They Been So Successful on the Grand Bank?

Newfoundland Sees Great Menace in Large Fleet of Them.

In speaking of the success which has attended the operation of the three French steam trawlers on the Grand Banks, the St. John's, N. F., Herald, says:

"It is a remarkable thing that the French should be so successful in this nature in view of the ill-luck which has marked the experiment when tried from this side of the water. Every body here is familiar with the disappointing result which followed the work of the steam trawler Magnific, operated from this port a few years ago by Bowring Brothers."

"Prior to that a Yarmouth, N. S., concern employed a steam trawler with equally indifferent effect, and the past two years a steam trawler, the Spray, has been operating out of Boston, but her work has not been such as to encourage the employment of others of her class."

"In the light of these facts, the alleged success of the French boats, which seems to be admitted in Lunenburg and Gloucester, suggests the reflection whether it is a mere temporary condition or whether some change has taken place in the movements of the fish which enables the beam trawls to be worked more advantageously than heretofore."

"At any rate, the problem is one of more than passing interest to our merchants of fishfolk, because the crossing of a large fleet of French trawlers to the Grand Banks might represent a great menace to the future ascendancy of Newfoundland in the world's fish markets."

DYNAMITING OF FISH SHOULD BE STOPPED.

It is gratifying to read that strenuous measures are being taken on the Maine coast to stop the reprehensible practise of dynamiting of fish.

Should this practice be allowed to pass unnoticed there, it would soon grow to great proportions and rapidly spread to all the states along the Atlantic seaboard. It is not only a most mean kind of a way of taking fish, but it also works irreparable injury to the schools of fish and the fishing grounds as only a small percentage of the fish killed are secured, the rest going to bottom and fouling the ground, thus preventing the fish from returning to the place again in goodly numbers.

Fishery Commissioner James Donahue of the state of Maine, whose home is at Rockland, and who is a practical fisherman as well as a large fish dealer, is after these dynamite pirates in good earnest and has already had several of them in court, where they have been fined heavily. It is certainly for the good of the Atlantic fisheries that he keeps up his good work until the practice is stamped out.

It is a positive fact, so claimed by expert fishermen, that submarine explosions are a great injury to the fish business, wherever practised, both the large and small fish being more or less destroyed and frightened from their old familiar haunts, the present scarcity at Eastport, Me., claimed to be largely due to the same. Commissioner Donahue has asserted his determination to suppress it, and the sooner those engaged in the illegal practice realize this and discontinue, the better it will be for themselves and all concerned.

TALES OF THE DEEP.

Lobster Man Fined \$1255; Crustacean Travelled Some.

One of the heaviest penalties ever imposed in Rhode Island for violation of the short lobster law was imposed Saturday when Ellis Wilbur of Little Compton was fined \$1255 at a special session of the district court.

When arrested Wilbur is said to have had 251 of the crustaceans which were under the legal length. Wilbur pleaded not guilty and gave bail.

A despatch from Portland says:

At Seal island, Nova Scotia, a few days ago, was captured a lobster the middle flipper of whose tail bore an identifying mark made by the Maine fish commissioner two years ago, when a number of seed lobsters were liberated in Maine waters.

The distance between the place where the marked seed lobsters were placed and the lobster in question was found is about 120 miles.
