**Sch. Mary E. Cooney's Men Share Over \$500 in Three Months.**

Almost unnoticed among the big fares of shack and mackerel that have been landed during the past three months, the little shore fishing sch. Mary E. Cooney, Capt. Frank Cooney, has bobbed into T wharf every Monday morning and sometimes again later in the week; but always there for that good Monday morning market.

The Cooney has been fishing all the time in South Channel and her fares have ranged from 15,000 pounds to 50,000 pounds, but none of these has she had to bring here to split, because the major part of these fares has been haddock, and there have been very few days when haddock has not been a good price.

So, Capt. Cooney, all unnoticed, has been doing some big fishing. During the month of May his crew shared \$165 and again in June they shared \$160. In July they did even better and wound up the month in fine style, with a share for 31 days of \$190, thus making the remarkable record of share of \$515 to a man, in the summer time and at market fishing.

The share of the crew of the Cooney since January 1 is now drawing near the \$1000 mark and the chances are that when the last day of December comes the stock and share to her credit will be a record-breaker for market boats.

Everybody that has anything to do with fishing, either here or Boston, knows Capt. Frank Cooney of Rockport. For 33 years he has been at it, and always with great success, but speaking of all these 33 years, he told a friend the other day that never at any time, had he done as well as he is doing at present. Let us hope he will keep it up.

**SCOURED MAINE COAST.**

**But Saw Not the First Sign of a Mackerel School.**

**Sch. S.H. Pinkham, Capt. Solomon A. Rowe, Came Home Today.**

The little seining sch. S. H. Pinkham, Capt. Solomon A. Rowe, arrived home this morning from a thorough and careful cruise along the Maine coast in search of mackerel. For some time mackerel have been reported at Boon island and off Portland or down off Monhegan, so Capt. Rowe determined to have a look down that way. He found nothing but kyacs and herring and plenty of these, but not a sign of a mackerel. Not a school was seen and the traps along the shore were taking none. The Pinkham stopped off Isle of Shoals, Boon Island, Wood island, Halfway Rock, Monhegan, Matinecus and Seguin and searched in vain for the desired fish.

The seiners arriving today state that most of the fleet have come in from Georges, where it is impossible to do anything with the wild schools, and yesterday afternoon the most of them were off Chatham. Three were some small dory pods showed and four of five vessels made small hauls, sch. Natalie J. Nelson having the most and going to market with them.

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**BANKER GOES DOWN.**

**Sch. Helen F. Whitten Struck Rock in Belle Isle Strait.**

**Then Slid Off and Sank in 12 Fathoms of Water.**

A telegram to the Gloucester Mutual Fishing Insurance Company yesterday afternoon states that sch. Helen F. Whitten, one of the salt bankers of the Gorton-Pew Fisheries Co.'s fleet, commanded by Capt. Charles Upshell, is ashore at Blanc Sablon, way up in the straits of Belle Isle, on the Newfoundland side.

Beyond the fact that the vessel is full of water no particulars are given in the despatch.

The captain has been instructed to confer with Job Bros., who have a fishing station there, in regard to floating the vessel.

A late telegram states that the Whitten had slid off the rock on which she was lying and had sunk in 12 fathoms of water. The vessel lies with only her topmasts out of water.

The vessel is undoubtedly a total loss. She had nearly a full fare, having 250,000 pounds of salt cod on board, and was going only one more baiting before coming home.
