On Track of Missing Blond Rock Buoy.

The Blond Rock buoy, worth \$16,000, and for which the Canadian government has been frantically searching since its escape from its mooring to the westward of Cape Sable, was met in its runaway course by the big coal steamer Mystic, which reached Boston Thursday afternoon from Louisburg, C. B. Capt. Cain on his arrival reported that he saw the giant beacon thirty-two miles west-southwest of Seal Island at 5 Wednesday afternoon. As soon as Capt. Cain could get to a telegraph office he sent a message to the Department of Marine and Fisheries at Ottawa. The Canadian revenue cutter Lady Laurier has been scouring the seas for the buoy for many days and the information will doubtless be received with joy at Ottawa. The lamp alone on the buoy is worth \$3000.

ON LOVELL'S ISLAND.

Sch. Yakima Went Ashore Early This Morning.

HEAVY RECEIPTS.

Over One Million Pounds Landed at Boston Yesterday.

Some of the Fish Will Come to This Port To Split.

The receipts of fish at T wharf, Boston, yesterday, were the largest for a long time, there being 45 crafts with over 1,000,000 pounds of fresh fish, mostly haddock.

As a result many of the off shore trips were held over until this morning, and when the bell rang, several more big fellows were there, so there is more than fish enough there today and some of the fares will come to this port to split.

At this port, this morning, are two fine trips, sch. Effie M. Prior, Capt. Elroy Prior, with 80,000 pounds of fresh fish, and sch. John Hays Hammond, Capt. Horace Wilde, with 55,000 pounds of fresh fish, both fares going to the Gloucester Fresh Fish Co.

GOOD-SIZED FLEET.

Newfoundland Will Have 21 Seal Steamers This Spring.

There will be 21 steamers engaged in the Newfoundland sealing industry next spring. The port or ports from which the steamers will sail this spring are not yet decided on, because much must depend on arriving at a decision in this connection on the winds and ice conditions between this date and March 12. The vessels, if any, that will go in the gulf are not yet known, or at all events their owners are not yet desirous of publishing their names.

PAID FINES.

Claim That British Government Settled for Fishermen.

A despatch from St. John's, N. F., says: "It has developed that the British government paid the fines of the colonial fishermen who shipped on board the Gloucester schooner Ralph L. Hall, off Bay of Islands in 1906, in defiance of the Newfoundland laws.

The proposition of these fishermen was made at last in the celebrated controversy between the colonial government and the American fishing interests.

"As the whole fishing question now goes to the Hague tribunal, no trouble is expected next season."

Sch. Ellen C. Burke Absent Five Weeks on Account of Bad Weather.

FIRST OF THE SEASON.

Salt Bankers Arethusa and Smuggler Will Sail Today.

Two More Crafts Fitting and Will Soon Follow.

The advance guard of the New England salt bank codfishing fleet sailed today, sch. Arethusa, Capt. Clayton Morrissey, and sch. Smuggler, Capt. Fred Morrissey, getting away this forenoon.

Last year the first vessel to sail was sch. S. P. Willard, she going February 14, followed February 21 by sch. Helen F. Whitten; schs. Arkona and Eleonor sailing February 26 and sch. Arcadia a year ago today.

Capt. Newman Wharton has arrived and is fitting sch. Arkona and Capt. Charles Rudolph is fitting sch. Harry A. Nickerson.

Superior Court.

In the criminal term of the superior court at Salem on Wednesday, Frank R. Neal of Boston was fined \$50 for violating the automobile law in Manchester, he having pleaded "no further contend."

Benjamin Raizin was fined \$35 yesterday for buying stolen property, the sentence of the lower court being affirmed.

Last week, the case of Melvin Ingalls, one of the lads who broke into the crossing house at Manchester, was disposed of by placing him on probation until the May term. He will be under the surveillance of Inspector Sullivan.

A bill before the legislature, which practically has for its object the prohibiting of torching herring in Hull bay, Quiney bay and Hingham harbor and adjacent waters is of considerable interest to Gloucester and the fishing interest in general.

A hearing is shortly to be held on the bill, and it is expected that it will meet with strong opposition from both T wharf and Gloucester. The bill is regarded as an entering wedge and if it passed would only open the way for more acts of the same nature, until the whole coast of Massachusetts would practically be closed to the torching of herring.

Even now certain people are endeavoring to have the Lynn board of health take steps to have an amendment to the present bill so that the waters in the vicinity of that place and Nahant may be brought within the territory where torching will be prohibited.

The fishing interest cannot be benefited by such a bill; on the contrary, its passage would work great injury to our fleet, not only would it throw out of employment many fishermen who now engage in this dangerous calling of torching herring in dories and motor boats and depend on that work for their living, but it would also seriously curtail the fresh bait supply.

Anything which would tend to shorten the fresh bait supply or make it harder to secure, cannot but be detrimental to the vessel owners, skippers and fishermen.

An act like the one proposed would effectually close most prolific herring torching waters and confine the torchers to waters along the shores from Newburyport to Salem. As before stated, the bill will undoubtedly meet with strong opposition.

THE SEAL QUESTION.

Ottawa, Feb. 28.—Speaking on the subject of pelagic sealing in the north Pacific ocean, it was suggested in the house that reference of the whole question to The Hague tribunal and a total prohibition of sealing for ten years to prevent the extermination of seals be made. Japan is not bound by the Paris award and is fishing in season and out of season in the islands and on the high seas.

COLD STORAGE PLANT.

Consumers Fish Co. To Build One at Newburyport at Once.

The Consumers' Fresh Fish Co., is to begin next month the construction of a cold storage plant in connection with their local fish business. The building is to be 60x60 feet built on Stanley's wharf and on the site now occupied by the old building on the wharf under lease of the company and the little blacksmith shop, used lately as a smoke house.

These buildings are to be torn down to give place to the new plant, which is to be up-to-date in every respect.

Clam Digging Legal.

Sunday clam digging is now legal, Gov. Guild having signed the bill allowing fishermen to dig clams on the Lord's day, besides the other measure which permits icing of fish upon the same day.
