PLENTY OF FISH.

Off Shore Vessels at Boston All Have Good Fares.

Price of Haddock Dropped to \$1.25 Per Hundred Weight.

The plentiful supply of fresh fish at T wharf continues and this morning finds eleven of the off shore vessels there with fine fares of from 40,000 to 70,000 pounds each, mostly haddock.

Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday were the three liveliest fish days that T wharf has had this winter. On account of the large supply, haddock dropped to \$1.25 per hundred weight. Among the vessels there today with big trips are schs. Speculator, Matchless, Flora S. Nickerson, Mildred Robinson, Romance, Quonnapowit, Benj. F. Phillips, Metamora, Terra Nova and Alice M. Guthrie.

FIRST OF THE SEASON.

Salt Bankers Arethusa and Smuggler Will Sail Today.

Two More Crafts Fitting and Will Soon Follow.

The advance guard of the New England salt bank codfishing fleet sailed today, sch. Arethusa, Capt. Clayton Morrissey, and sch. Smuggler, Capt. Fred Morrissey, getting away this forenoon.

Last year the first vessel to sail was sch. S. P. Willard, she going February 14, followed February 21 by sch. Helen F. Whitten; schs. Arkona and Eleonor sailing February 26 and sch. Arcadia a year ago today.

Capt. Newman Wharton has arrived and is fitting sch. Arkona and Capt. Charles Rudolph is fitting sch. Harry A. Nickerson.

Superior Court.

In the criminal term of the superior court at Salem on Wednesday, Frank R. Neal of Boston was fined \$50 for violating the automobile law in Manchester, he having pleaded "no further contend."

Benjamin Raizin was fined \$35 yesterday for buying stolen property, the sentence of the lower court being affirmed.

Last week, the case of Melvin Ingalls, one of the lads who broke into the crossing house at Manchester, was disposed of by placing him on probation until the May term. He will be under the surveillance of Inspector Sullivan.

A bill before the legislature, which practically has for its object the prohibiting of torching herring in Hull bay, Quiney bay and Hingham harbor and adjacent waters is of considerable interest to Gloucester and the fishing interest in general.

A hearing is shortly to be held on the bill, and it is expected that it will meet with strong opposition from both T wharf and Gloucester. The bill is regarded as an entering wedge and if it passed would only open the way for more acts of the same nature, until the whole coast of Massachusetts would practically be closed to the torching of herring.

Even now certain people are endeavoring to have the Lynn board of health take steps to have an amendment to the present bill so that the waters in the vicinity of that place and Nahant may be brought within the territory where torching will be prohibited.

The fishing interest cannot be benefited by such a bill; on the contrary, its passage would work great injury to our fleet, not only would it throw out of employment many fishermen who now engage in this dangerous calling of torching herring in dories and motor boats and depend on that work for their living, but it would also seriously curtail the fresh bait supply.

Anything which would tend to shorten the fresh bait supply or make it harder to secure, cannot but be detrimental to the vessel owners, skippers and fishermen.

An act like the one proposed would effectually close most prolific herring torching waters and confine the torchers to waters along the shores from Newburyport to Salem. As before stated, the bill will undoubtedly meet with strong opposition.

THE SEAL QUESTION.

Ottawa, Feb. 28.—Speaking on the subject of pelagic sealing in the north Pacific ocean, it was suggested in the house that reference of the whole question to The Hague tribunal and a total prohibition of sealing for ten years to prevent the extermination of seals be made. Japan is not bound by the Paris award and is fishing in season and out of season in the islands and on the high seas.

COLD STORAGE PLANT.

Consumers Fish Co. To Build One at Newburyport at Once.

The Consumers' Fresh Fish Co., is to begin next month the construction of a cold storage plant in connection with their local fish business. The building is to be 60x60 feet built on Stanley's wharf and on the site now occupied by the old building on the wharf under lease of the company and the little blacksmith shop, used lately as a smoke house.

These buildings are to be torn down to give place to the new plant, which is to be up-to-date in every respect.

To Be Built by John Bishop at Yard on Vincent Street.

Will Be of Knockabout Design and for Boston Parties.

Mr. John Bishop, the Vincent Point vessel builder, has contracted to build four fishing crafts for Boston parties.

Keels for two of the vessels have been laid and the other two will be started when these two are completed and launched. The two now building are for Capt. George Perry of sch. Teresa and Alice and Capt. Forbes of sch. Flavilla, who are among the leaders of the fleet. The crafts will be of the progressive knockabout model, the design being made by Thomas F. McManus of Boston. The crafts will be practically the same, 112 feet over all, 22 feet beam and 10 feet depth of hold, and are designed to be model market fishing vessels.

The order is a large one, and will give work to quite a number of men, as in addition to being built here, they will also be rigged and fitted at this port.

March 3 RECORD HALIBUT.

One Weighing 450 Pounds Brought In by Steamer Spray.

Believed To Be Largest of This Species Ever Caught.

The steam otter trawler Spray, Capt. Oliver Thomas, was at Boston this morning, from Georges with a big fare, having 80,000 pounds of fresh fish, 40,000 pounds of which are scrod haddock. Besides haddock and cod, the craft has a few flounders and one of the largest halibut ever landed, for it is claimed that the monster which the Spray scooped upon her big net weighs 450 pounds.

Capt. Thomas reports stormy weather and iced up considerably coming in. She spoke sch. Fame recently with 30,000 pounds of fish on board.

Only one halibut is recorded in the history of the Gloucester fisheries which exceeded this weight, one being brought in about 1869 which weighed in the neighborhood of 530 pounds, and which was so large that it was impossible to pack in an ordinary fresh halibut box, and a special box had to be constructed. The fish was bought by Messrs. Stockbridge & Smith, wholesale fish dealers, and was sent to Robinson Bros., Alton, Illinois, the latter firm being composed of Hon. David I. Robinson and William L. Robinson, now of this city.

The largest fish of this species of recent years have rarely gone about 350 pounds, and this weight is accounted most unusual.
