HAS SECOND TRIP.

Sch. Clintonia at New York with 8000 Mackerel.

Schs. Esperanto and Hattie M. Graham Also There with Trips.

A special to the Times this morning from New York announces the arrival at Fulton Market of sch. Clintonia, Capt. Ralph Webber, with 8000 fresh medium mackerel.

This is the second trip for Capt. Webber this season, he having landed one last week at Fortress Monroe, and is the second one to make two trips thus far this season. Capt. Solomon Jacobs of sch. A. M. Nicholson being the other.

Fresh medium mackerel brought 20 cents each, from the vessel, at Fulton market yesterday.

In the fare of sch. Alert, landed at New York on Tuesday were quite a number of tinker mackerel.

A special to the Times this forenoon announces the arrival at that port of two more mackerel fares, sch. Esperanto, Capt. Charles Maguire, with 135 barrels of mediums and bloaters, and sch. Hattie M. Graham, Capt. Roy Kimball, with 80 barrels of the same kind of fish.

A special to the Times states that the fares of schs. Esperanto and Hattie M. Graham, were taken off Cape Henry, in about the same spot as the other fares recently landed. Capt. Charles Maguire of the Esperanto reports seeing but few schools. He took his fare Tuesday night.

Sch. Hattie M. Graham had 1000 large mackerel in her fare, which brought 30 cents each.

The fare of sch. Esperanto included 9750 medium mackerel and 400 bloaters.

FOULED ATLANTIC CABLE.

Sch. Hattie M. Graham Had To Slip Her Whole Chain.

To Prevent Dragging or Parting the Atlantic Wire.

A special to the Times from New York states that owing to the heavy wind last night, sch. Hattie M. Graham did not go up New York harbor to Fulton dock, but anchored south of Governor's island, and in dragging her anchor, picked up the Western Union Atlantic cable and was forced to slip her own cable to avoid breaking or damaging it.

It is supposed that the Graham had a chain anchor out, instead of a cable anchor, as about all the southern mackerel fleet carry chain instead of manila rope cable.

VERY GRATIFYING.

Spring Mackerel Catch Largest for

Light Nights and Blowy Weather Now Bothering Fleet.

There were no mackerel arrivals at New York or Fortress Monroe up to 9 o'clock this morning. The light nights are now on, so the seiners have little or no "darks" to work on. Some of the skippers think however that if there is any body to the schools of medium fish that they will show in the daytime. If they do, some good catches will result. The fleet, since it went out south, has been hampered by very blowy weather.

Imports of salt mackerel at Boston to date, of the catch of 1907 are 24,451 barrels against 41,522 barrels of the catch of 1906.

SEALING STEAMER SUNK.

St. Johns, April 13.—Bringing tidings of the sinking of the steamer Grand Lake of the sealing fleet, sealer Newfoundland limped into port, leaking badly. The Newfoundland's bows and stern were crushed by ice, and her crew of 200 men were forced to stand by for thirty hours pumping and bailing to keep the vessel afloat. The Grand Lake was shut up in the jaws of the two great ice floes, until her sides gave way, and even her engines were crushed. Her crew of 214 men escaped to the steamer Vanguard, which was close by. A catch of 20,000 seals went down with the Grand Lake.

SPLENDID CRAFT.

Now Building at Essex Shipyard for Orlando Merchant.

Semi-Knockabout and Is Expected To Be a Flyer.

Orlando Merchant has contracted with
Tarr & James of Essex for a new clipper
fishing schooner which, when completed will
be a splendid addition to Gloucester's already
fine fleet.

The new craft was designed by McManus
of Boston and will be a semi-knockabout,
with a stub bowsprit. She will be some-
what similar to the fast and handsome sch.
Clintonia, also owned by Mr. Merchant.

feet longer than sch. Clintonia, thus making
her one of the longest vessels in the fishing
fleet. She is designed to carry well and be

will be launched July 1, and will be rigged
and fitted in the most complete and up-to-
date manner.

A London despatch of yesterday says:

"The state department at Washington has
made representations to Great Britain through
Ambassador Reid with regard to the seizure
of two American fishing schooners off New-
foundland. The complaint has been forward-
ed to Sir Robert Bond, premier of New-
foundland, but he has not yet replied."

F., while their skippers were fined \$100 each
for infraction of local Newfoundland fishing
