ST. PIERRE VESSELS LOST.

Nine Fishing Schooners Sunk, but No Lives Lost as Yet.

A despatch from St. Pierre, Miquelon, says that the fishing season of 1908 has opened disastrously for the French fishing fleet, and although the operations began only recently nine vessels have been sunk. So far as known there no lives have been lost this spring. Last season ten vessels foundered, 251 fishermen perishing. The three-masted schooner Bernadotte of Bayonne, France, arrived here yesterday with the crews of the schooners Galathee and Neptune, which foundered on the Grand Banks during one of the recent severe gales. The Neptune and Galathee were near each other when the Galathee sprung a leak and began to fill. Just before she went down her crew was taken off by the Neptune. The next day the Neptune, which had been damaged, slowly settled. The Bernadotte came along and rescued both crews, the Neptune foundering in the heavy sea. The Galathee and Neptune both hailed from St. Pierre.

FISH SHOWING IN SMALL PODS

Schs. Norma and Effie M. Prior at New York Last Night.

Schs. Effie M. Prior, Capt. Elroy Prior, and Norma, Capt. Benjamin McGray, which were reported by Capt. Vautier of sch. Monarch as taking fish when he did and whose arrival was looked for eagerly at Fulton Market, as reported in yesterday's Times, reached there just before 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon.

Sch. Norma had 4200 medium mackerel and a few large ones, and sch. Effie M. Prior had 3500 mediums.

Sch. Monarch, which arrived at the dock yesterday noon, sold her mediums at 20 cents each.

A special to the Times late last night reported the arrival at Fortress Monroe, Va., of sch. Dauntless, Capt. John Matheson, with 42 barrels of large and medium mackerel. The fare was landed at William Baulch's big plant and shipped to New York by express. Capt. Matheson reports getting his fish southeast of Cape Henry and that no vessels were near him.

The fares of schs. Monarch, Effie M. Prior and Norma were taken 60 miles east by north one-half north from Cape Henry.

A special to the Times last night reports small pods of big mackerel showing off Fire island and Barnegat. As this is the netters stamping ground, some of them should soon be heard from.

The steamer Lackawana, which arrived at New York yesterday from Shields, England, reports large schools of mackerel outside Sandy Hook lightship.

The arrival of these four small fares has renewed the hope that the southern season may amount to something after all, although the wise ones do not like the report of the fish in small pods and the presence of the big body of bonitas on the grounds. As one owner said, "We would rather hear of somebody bursting a seine on a big school and losing them than to hear of a few of these small pods being taken."
