LATE HERRING NEWS.**Bad Weather and Herring Scarcity Report Is Confirmed.****Nova Scotia Salting Fleet All Loaded and Sailed.**

The herring situation continues to be the all-absorbing topic of conversation in fishing circles, and the dealers clearly do not like the present situation. They figure that the salt herring supply, even if all the vessels which went for these goods get full cargoes, will not be any too large for their wants, and here it is December 22 and quite a number of them are not yet loaded.

They figure, and rightly, too, that frost is now due, and realize that when it does strike in, the frozen herring vessels will have the call and the herring that will go to salt will be few and far between. The herring fleet is small this season, the frozen section especially so, coming no where near the big fleet in this line last season.

Late advices to the Times from Bay of Islands, dated Saturday, stated that schs. Alice R. Lawson and Oregon are ready to sail. During the past few days the fishery has been very poor, principally on account of the condition of the weather, which has been very stormy. When the letter was written it was blowing heavy from the northwest, accompanied by snow. More snow has fallen this season thus far than has been seen there for many, many years, in fact it is coming down most of the time.

The Atlantic Fisheries Co.'s steamer Atlantic is waiting for a chance to sail, Mr. Acker having given up the fishery after a successful season, the company having put up 4000 barrels of ripped salt herring and sent them along.

The Lunenburg schs. Minnie M. Cook and Lila B. Hirtle are loaded with salt herring and probably sailed yesterday. Schs. Colonial and Palatia sailed some little time ago. As they all had split herring and cleared for Lunenburg, they will not affect the American market.

SPLENDID TRIP.**Sch. Aloha Stocked Nearly \$12,000 on Dory Handline Trip.**

One of the finest trips of the year was that made by sch Aloha, Capt. John McInnis, in the salt bank dory handline fishery. Capt. McInnis came home and took his fish out quietly and hustled off on a Newfoundland herring trip without making any talk about his big fare. It was a good one, however, the vessel weighing off 334,000 pounds of salt cod, on which the splendid stock of \$11,712.07 was made, the high liner of the crew taking \$233.51 as his share of the proceeds.
