TWO MORE CRAFTS HOME WITH CARGOES OF SALTED HERRING.

Two more of the Newfoundland herring fleet are in port, sch. Oregon from Bonne Bay having 1200 barrels salt, and 90 barrels pickled fish for Davis Brothers, and sch. Arcadia from Bay of Islands, 1200 barrels salt and 150 barrels pickled for Sylvanus Smith & Company.

Sch. Harvard, from an eastern deck handlining trip, has 28,000 pounds of salt cod, while sch. Arabia, which arrived during the forenoon, also from eastern deck handlining has 15,000 pounds salt cod.

The total catch of the gill netters yesterday was about 60,000 pounds.

FROST SET IN BONNE BAY.

HERRING ARE STILL RUNNING PLENTIFUL AND OF GOOD SIZE.

Advices from Bonne Bay state that herring are still running plentiful and of good size, with good frost the past few nights.

A despatch from the Bay of Islands states that schs. John J. Flaherty and Annie M. Parker have arrived there to load herring.

Schs. Aloha, Ralph L. Hall, Gov. Russell and Blanche had completed loading and were ready to sail.

ARE PLENTY AT BAY OF ISLANDS.

BUT VESSELS GO TO BONNE BAY TO LOAD HERRING AT LOWER PRICES.

Advices from the Bay of Islands state that the weather there remains clear and cold and herring still plentiful. It is stated by captains and fishermen that the bays and arms are filled with them.

The fishing boats are full, wharves covered, many nets sinking and no place to dispose of the fish. Such a state of affairs has not been known to exist for many years and notwithstanding that herring are so abundant, several vessels have gone to Bonne Bay to load.

The price of 25 cents extra on a barrel of herring coupled with 10 to 15 cents additional for food consumed is an item worth considering and the only way to escape paying this is to load at Bonne Bay, where the fishermen remain at home nights, which is most satisfactory to all concerned.

Last Sunday's information says the weather remains unchanged. The previous day, Capt. Norman Ross met with an accident, caused by some part

of the machinery of a gasoline boat striking him on the left knee and inflicting a wound which will keep him confined on board his vessel for a few days.

On Monday there was a considerable quantity of frozen herring spread along the wharves, but what disposition is to be made of them is difficult to state.

The Aloha sailed Monday for home.

Newfoundland Cod Shipments.

The shipments of fish from Newfoundland during the past three months have been the largest ever known, says the North Sydney Herald. Recently in conversation with a gentleman closely allied with the fishing industry, the Herald learns that from the districts of Placentia Bay, Burin and Fortune Bay and the West Coast, over seven millions of codfish were caught by the local fishermen and sold to the big Gloucester firms, who have representatives on the ground. In money this bulk of fish meant to the local fishermen of the above districts at least \$210,000, and it is a moderate calculation to say a like sum will be paid the same fishermen for their catches between now and the spring.

Besides the salt codfishery the Newfoundlanders are experiencing equal success in the salt herring business. At Fortune Bay herring a week ago struck in in immense quantities, but as American vessels are not allowed to load there, as the place is not within the treaty coast, and the duty is almost prohibitive, all the vessels take cargoes at Bonne Bay and Bay of Islands. At these two latter places schooners are being loaded every 24 hours, and the month or so it is plied is between \$60,000 and \$70,000.

FIRST LOT OF FROZEN HERRING

SCH. MASSACHUSETTS FROM BONNE BAY TODAY HAS A CABIN LOAD.

Schs. Sylvania and Massachusetts are here this morning from Bonne Bay, with full cargoes of salt and pickled herring, the latter also having a cabin load of frozen herring, the first to arrive this season.

The Sylvania hails for 1325 barrels salt and 80 barrels pickled herring for Sylvanus Smith & Company. The Massachusetts in addition to her frozen fare has 1300 barrels of salt and 120 barrels of pickled herring for the Gorton-Pew Fisheries Company.

Schs. John Hays Hammond is also in port with a small fare of 10,000 fresh and salt fish and 500 pounds of halibut.

The British sch. Carrie L. Hirtle, one of the Lunenburg fleet has a cargo of 380,000 salt cod, mostly cod for the Gorton-Pew Fisheries Company.

The gill netters did well yesterday and brought in about 60,000 pounds of ground fish.

Shelburne Fishermen See Value of Cold Storage.

The past season has easily proved the great value of the cold storage plants to the fishermen at Shelburne, N. S., and vicinity, and also has brought about a new era in the disposal of the catch. Where, formerly, the fishermen had to take care of their own catch, at much labor and expense now ready market is found at the end of their day's work, and a good cash price received for every fish caught. The result is that a splendid feeling exists between the fishermen and the buyers. The two firms doing business on McNutt's Island, for instance, have the confidence of the fishermen, and in return have a fine lot of men regularly engaged in supplying the plants with the results of their catches.

STRUCK GALE AND SNOW STORM.

Sch. Margaret Obligated to Seek Sheltering Port Under Short Sail.

Sch. Margaret, bound from here, for Bay of Islands, N. F., for a load of frozen herring, encountered a heavy gale and snow storm off St. Paul's about midnight on Friday of last week and sought shelter at a Cape Breton port, coming in under short canvas.

Capt. Millin Laid Up.

Capt. William E. Millin, for years the master of the Boston harbor tug James Woolley, is ill and confined to a hospital, and his place is being temporarily filled by Captain Frank C. Pierce. Captain Millin is the oldest towboat captain in active service at Boston, a picturesque and interesting mariner of the old type. His many friends along the water front hope for his speedy and complete recovery.

Will Work With Local Hatchery.

The United States Fish Commissioner steamer Gannet, Capt. Greenleaf, which operates along the Maine coast in connection with the Boothbay station is here and will collect cod and pollock eggs for the Ten Pound Island hatchery during the winter months.

Receipts for Week at T Wharf.

The fish receipts at Boston for the week ending December 8, included \$1 arrivals or a total of 1,287,550 pounds against 111 arrivals or 956,600 pounds for the same period of 1910.

Sardine Steamers to Lay Up.

The sardine tank steamers Kingfisher and Osprey, engaged in sardine catching along the coast of Maine, arrived yesterday from Jonesport and will lay up here for the winter.

Salt Mackerel Imports.

Imports of salt mackerel at Boston to date are 26,289 barrels against 27,030 barrels to date in 1910 and 22,588 barrels to date in 1909.

Had Fine Lobster Season.
Since the opening of the lobster season fishermen of Grand Manan have been making fine catches, according to J. F. Calder, fishery inspector for St. John and Charlotte counties.

The lobsters being taken are of unusually large size, and are bringing good prices. A part of the catch is being sold in Upper Canada, and the rest finds a good market in the United States. There are no lobster canneries in St. John or Charlotte county.

The action of the department of fisheries in allowing the fishermen to start taking lobsters earlier than usual has been much appreciated by the fishermen, and they believe that the size and number of lobsters on the fishing grounds warranted them in making the demand for a longer season this year.

STEAM TRAWLERS LAUNCHED. Hulls Were Constructed at Fore River Works in Six Weeks.

Two steam trawlers, built for the Bay State Fisheries Company of Boston, were launched at the Fore River Ship Yards at Quincy Saturday afternoon. The boats were called the Surf and the Swell, but there were no ceremonies attending their launching. The Surf was launched at 1.15 and the Swell at 1.30.

These boats, in most respects, are like the Spray, Ripple and Foam, already in commission. Work on the new boats has been remarkably rapid. The keels were laid only about six weeks ago, and it is expected that one of them will be ready for service before the end of the year.

Pulled Up Big Casting.

The fishing schooner Edith Silveira arrived in Boston, Saturday, with a large iron casting, weighing several tons, on her deck. The casting was pulled up with the anchor off Deer Island Light early yesterday morning, and is supposed to have been part of the old Tug Bessie B., which sank 20 years ago.

The schooner was coming in with a large cargo of fish, and in the dense fog Captain Silveira ordered anchor to be dropped. Some time later the 15 men in the crew attempted to haul in the anchor, but they were unable to get it aboard. After several hours' hard work the anchor came up with the heavy casting fastened to it.

Newfoundland Bankers to Start Early.

The next season will see the banking voyage of the Newfoundland fleet opened earlier than heretofore owing to the demand for "green" cod. The owners of the bankers on the southwest coast are already looking for crews to fill their vessels, and big wages are being offered. It is expected that the voyages will begin in February or a month earlier than formerly. A big catch of squid was "salted down" during the past fall for spring bait, and in this respect the vessels will be better supplied than heretofore on the spring trip.

Herring on Maine Coast.

Herring have not entirely disappeared from the Maine coast for all the season is so late. According to information received here Saturday, the small fish are being landed in good sized numbers at Georgetown in the Sheepscot river. The weirs of Levi Powers are catching the fish and they are said to be just the kind that are wanted for smoking. It is probable that a large number of them will be sent to the eastward, for the supply for smoking has not been nearly large enough as yet.

Nova Scotia Craft Given Up.

It is feared at North Sydney, C. E., that the schooner Florence M. Smith, which has been unreported for three weeks, has gone to the bottom with her crew of six men.

The Florence M. Smith left North Sydney, C. E., Nov. 18, for Chatham, N. B., in command of Capt. Strickland. During the week following her departure this section of the North Atlantic was agitated by severe storms and it is feared now that the Florence M. Smith and her crew must be added to the storm toll.

Pensacola Arrivals.

Two of the Pensacola fleet arrived Wednesday, one to the E. E. Saunders Company and the other to the Warren Fish Company. They were the schs. Seacomet and Chicopee with catches of 20,000 and 23,000 pounds of snappers respectively. The Seacomet is a Saunders Company vessel, while the other plies under the auspices of the Warren Fish and Ice Company.

Had Close Race Home.

The Bangor schooner Lizzie Griffin has arrived in port with a full fare of herring, defeating by two hours and a half the Bucksport schooner T. M. Nicholson in a 600-mile race down the coast from Bonne Bay, on the west coast of Newfoundland. Both schooners left there within a few minutes of each other a week ago Friday.
