SCH. CLAUDIA HAS A FINE TRIP.

IN FROM GEORGES HANDLING THIS MORNING WITH 50,000 POUNDS SALT COD.

Fish receipts here this morning are quite plentiful, consisting of two Georges handliners, one from off shore, and two down from Boston with their fares to split.

Sch. Norma, of the straight handliners has 20,000 pounds of salt cod and 2500 weight of halibut, while sch. Claudia also has fine trip, her haul being for 50,000 pounds of salt cod and 2000 pounds of halibut.

Sch. Walter P. Goulart is here from Brown's with a mixed fare of 105,000 pounds of fresh fish.

From Boston are schs. Manhasset with 50,000 pounds left over from yesterday and the sch. Fannie E. Prescott with 75,000 pounds.

The gill netters brought in about 75,000 weight yesterday, mostly haddock. The fish run good size throughout, the largest fare being taken by the steamer Geisha which came in late yesterday afternoon with 16,000 pounds.

WILL LAUNCH THIS WEEK.

Fishing Steamer For Capts. Barrett and Geary Is Named Joanna.

The new steamer building at A. D. Story's shipyard, Essex, for Capts. John F. Barrett and John Geary has been named the Joanna. The craft will be launched the latter part of the week and will fit for seining under command of Capt. Barrett.

The craft measures 57.1 feet long, 16.4 feet beam and 6.6 feet in depth and is 34 tons nets. She will be equipped with two 24 horse power engines.

Fulton Fish Market Notes.

There was plenty of fish in the market last week, says the Fishing Gazette. Trade was light and prices in most cases low. Buyers could not be induced to buy heavily. The result was that much stock was carried over on Friday.

Some of the bluefish arrived during the week were to Cheseboro Bros., Wilton & Barry, S. L. Storer & Co., Caleb Haley & Co., and Burnett & Keeney.

Mackerel receipts this week were fairly light and prices varied from 45 to 60 cents each.

There were porgies in the market from Monday on. Prices the first day were 18 to 20 cent per pound. They kept declining until yesterday, when the quotation was 15 cents.

Codfish was in good supply the early part of the week, sales of market fish being made at 1 1-2 cents a pound. The top price during the week was 4 cents on Thursday. Steak cod brought 3 1-2 to 6 1-2 cents per pound. The price went above 6 cents only on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday.

Haddock was quoted at 4 cents on Thursday and 6 cents on Friday. The supply was short on both days. On Saturday week fish was practically a-begging, sales being made at 1 1-2 cents per pound. It was not until Wednesday that the price went above 3 cents.

Three cents per pound was the quotation on hake every day of the week, with the exception of Saturday, when some sales were made at 2 cents.

South Sealers Doing Well.

Word has been received from South Seas that the Halifax sealing sch. Hilda R. has taken 2,100 and the Ida M. Clark 500, off Cape Horn. The skins approximately are worth \$12 apiece, so the Hilda R.'s catch is worth \$25,200 and that of the Ida M. Clark \$6,000. The Halifax schs. Agnes Donohoe, Ysobel May and Village Belle have not yet been reported.

Lots of Spanish Mackerel.

Fresh mackerel is plentiful at some Southern ports. From Fort Pierce, Fla., for instance, more than 100,000 pounds of Spanish mackerel were shipped North in two days, some fish dealers handling from 12,000 to 25,000 pounds. Estimates place the catch for the two days at 200,000 pounds. This would bring to the fishermen of Port Pierce for those two days between \$5000 and \$10,000.

NETTERS LAND SOME MACKEREL.

A despatch from New York this morning states that 60 barrels of large fresh mackerel arrived there yesterday from the south which were taken by the traps and netters. The fish were selling at 37 1/2 cents apiece and part of the catch would be shipped to the Boston market.

A telegram yesterday says that a total of 7940 fish were landed at Chincoteague Saturday. Among the netters reported were the Gem with 250 large fish, the Priscilla with 152; the Sister with 1200; the Grace with 500; the Nema Roland with 150; the Petta with 300, and the Bertha with 300. Altogether Sunday 2852 large fish were landed there. The fish weighed three and four pounds each.

PREMIER MORRIS COMING TO CONFERENCE ON FISHERIES ISSUES.

Following these fisheries conferences the premier will proceed to London, there to dispose of other colonial business.

Flounders Line Beach.

Beaches along Cow Bay in Long Island Sound are filled with large numbers of dead flounders, providing a feast for sea gulls. It is believed the cold waters of the sound cause the flounders to come up into shoal water of the sandy beaches, where the water is warm, on a sunny day, and in their benumbed condition are left there, when the tide recedes, and thus die by the hundreds. One fisherman reported seeing men on the beaches scooping up the flounders with nets as they came close to shore.

Trying New Buoy.

The Canadian Marine and Fisheries Department are experimenting with a new cigar-shaped metal buoy to aid winter navigation in the St. Lawrence. This buoy is hollow, but strong enough to resist floating ice. It is anchored to a 4,000-pound weight by a chain, and whenever struck disappears under the surface, only to bob up again in clear water.

Halibut Sale.

The halibut fare of sch. Rena A. Percy sold to the New England Fish Co. this forenoon at 9 cents a pound for white and 6 1-2 cents a pound for gray.

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SHOWS LITTLE IMPROVEMENT.

FIFTEEN FARES AT T WHARF TODAY STRUCK A LITTLE BETTER MARKET.

Arrivals of fresh fish at Boston this morning comprised 15 fares, including two of the beam trawling fleet.

The market shows but little improvement over yesterday, although there was not an over supply, this morning, as most of the fleet are in from the shore with moderate fares.

Portland Fish Notes.

Fishermen arriving Monday afternoon at Portland report seeing great schools of pollock in the vicinity of the lightship, with quite a number of the fishing fleet at work among them. The sloop Isabel Parsons brought in about 2000 pounds of pollock, but reports that the fish were very wild and hard to catch. The fishing steamers Pet and Elthier which have been hunting for pollock at the eastward with indifferent success, were heading this way yesterday and if the weather outside today is any way decent there will be a large fleet at work. Reports from the westward are of the same nature, large schools having been seen in the vicinity of the Isles of Shoals and several good sized catches have been made within the past 48 hours.

Monday proved another good halibut day for Portland, though but two trips were taken out there. They did, however, total 39,000 pounds between them.

Of these, the Edmund F. Black, Capt. Nehemiah Orchard, arrived Sunday with 25,000 pounds of halibut and 8000 pounds of salt fish. Just three weeks ago yesterday she left for LaHave. Capt. Orchard reported pretty bad weather, but for all that, the schooner stocked in the neighborhood of \$2000.

The Mertis H. Perry, Capt. Harry Wilson, hailed for 14,000 pounds of halibut and 3000 pounds of salt fish. She, too, had been three weeks fishing on LaHave. Both fares sold at 8 cents for white and 5 1-2 cents for grays. The fare of the Black went to J. W. Trefethen and that of the Perry to the New England Halibut Co.

For about the first day this season, practically all the netters got outside the harbor and set their nets Monday. But the catches were in all cases small and ran almost wholly to haddock. Even the Carrie and Mildred, which usually has a large fare brought in but 3000 pounds.

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ANOTHER QUICK HALIBUT TRIP.

Sch. Rena A. Percy, Capt. John Stream, arrived yesterday from a quick halibut trip being only two weeks out with 8000 pounds of fresh halibut, 9000 pounds of salt fish and 8000 pounds of fresh fish.

When it comes to quick trips and good stocks, Capt. Stream appears to be there most every time. This is the fourth trip in the craft, since purchasing her and he is certainly making a good start.

SITUATION ON SALT MACKEREL.

The market appears to be entirely cleaned up, says the Fishing Gazette. There were only from 3000 to 4000 barrels packed last year—not enough to supply the demand which forced consumers to draw upon the stock of foreign mackerel. The catch also fell off considerably which stiffened prices.

The Gloucester catch was largely bought up by local firms and sold to family trade. Very little doing in foreign and the stock on hand is drawn upon by consumers of the domestic.

Advices from Dingle, April 13, states that there were about 14,000 taken there, of these about 10,000 were cured, the remainder being sent to fresh fish markets.

The cured mackerel is expected to count about 430 to the barrel.

The quantity and value of mackerel landed on the Irish coasts for the month of March was four barrels, valued at \$20; for the same month in 1911, 93 barrels.

To Command Shelburne Fleet.

Ross Locke of Jordan Bay, will command the fleet of fishing steamers to be built by the recently incorporated Roseway Fish Co. of Shelburne. The company is receiving much encouragement, and prospects are good for a live concern that should mean much for the development of the fishing industry in that district.

While the concern is capitalized at \$20,000, it is to be co-operative so far as possible. That is why the shares are placed at \$10. The first vessel will be launched about the last of June, and another in the early fall. The first call for \$5 will be made for the building of the first vessel and the remainder called for in time for the building of the second vessel.

The Irish Fishing Fleet.

There were 5652 vessels actually engaged in sea fisheries in 1910, in Ireland, compared with 5976 in 1909. Twelve of these were steam trawlers, of which eight were 20 to 71 tons net register and the others smaller. The total number of motor boats in use at the end of the season was 36, of which eight were 25 tons. The demand for large fishing vessels has been unable to keep pace with it, and more first-class boats have been built in the last two years for East Coasts ports than during the previous 15. With one exception, all have had motors installed.

The Biggest Porgy Boat.

The largest steam craft ever constructed for the menhaden fishery has been launched recently at Rockland, Me., and has been named the William B. Murray. She will hail from Greenport, N. Y.

She has a capacity of 6000 barrels of fish, one-quarter more than the capacity of any other menhaden steamer in American waters. The Murray has a gross tonnage of about 400 and a net tonnage of about 250.

The principal dimensions are: Length of keel, 169 feet; beam, 24.1 feet; depth of hold, 13 feet. The hull is constructed of oak, planked and ceiled with Oregon fir.

The steamer will carry a crew of 35, but has accommodations for 55 men. Capt. M. J. Marran of Patchogue, L. I., who has been in command of the steamer of that name, will command the Murray. The craft was christened by Miss Therese White.

The steamer's machinery will be installed at Portland. Two steamers, which are duplicates of the Murray are on the stocks and will be pushed to completion, impetus having been given the industry by the appearance on the Maine coast last season for the first time in many years of immense schools of menhaden.

Fish Generally High There.

In Omaha, Neb., the home of the beef and pork packing industries, for the first time in years fresh fish are selling cheaper than fresh meats. Beef steaks, pork chops and other cuts are nearly 50 per cent. higher than 30 days ago. Fish are selling at from 12 1-2 to 20 cents per pound, while steaks are worth from 15 to 25 cents.

Fish Have to Learn to Swim.

Director William E. Meehan, of the Philadelphia, Pa., Aquarium, says fish are not born swimming but have to acquire the art. To prove this point, he took as an example a number of baby trout. Hundreds of these youngsters were just learning to swim at the time. Their efforts to keep their noses towards the inflow pipe and off the bottom of the tank were very amusing. Within a week he declared the entire 15,000 or 18,000 would be full-fledged swimmers.

A Fish Story.

At Jacksonville, Fla., the other day a kingfish weighing 23 pounds jumped out of the water opposite the P. & O. dock, hit the building just below the roof and landed on the dock. It was captured by the watchman, says the "Times Union."

Steamer Nomad Gone Home.

Steamer Nomad has abandoned the gill netting fishery until the fall and returned to her home port at Stonington, Conn.

Lobsters Are Down.

Lobsters are really within reach of the average person just now, though there is no chance that they will ever be as low as they once were. Still the price has declined, and this too on both the live and the boiled varieties. The influx of the Nova Scotia lobsters has been the cause of whatever drop has taken place. They are arriving by the hundreds of thousands in Boston, and some of the Maine dealers have already received shipments which have been placed in the pounds where they will be kept for the time being. But actual lobster arrivals in Portland have been few and far between lately. Boston has held the center of the market and a good part of the big buying has been with the Boston dealers.

Pensacola Arrivals.

Few arrivals were noted last week at Pensacola. For the Warren Fish Co., the Clara P. Sewall landed 18,000 pounds of red snappers and 4000 pounds groupers. The Oriola had 12,000 pounds red snappers and 26,000 pounds of fresh mackerel. For the E. E. Saunders Co., the Favorite landed 17,000 pounds red snappers, 5000 pounds groupers; the Albert Geiger, 16,000 pounds red snappers and 4000 pounds groupers; the John M. Keen had 22,000 pounds red snappers; the Flora J. Sears had 25,000 pounds red snappers; 10,000 pounds groupers; the Dorothy had 19,000 pounds red snappers, 10,000 pounds groupers and 5000 pounds mackerel.

First of Fitchers.

Sch. Maxine Elliott, the first of the fitched halibuters to get away, sailed this forenoon.

POLLOCK ON MAINE COAST.

It may now safely be said that the pollock have really struck in. Tuesday the Portland steamer Elthier was at Boothbay with 20,000 pounds of the fish. This is the biggest single trip yet taken on the Maine coast, but it is no more than Capt. Reed deserves. He has been looking for the pollock for a month along with other captains, but later than usual they have just struck in. Other netters and seiners may now be expected to land some good fares.

About the only sizeable trip of fish landed at Portland Tuesday among the shore fishermen was the James & Esther of the Cape Porpoise fleet. She had 20,000 pounds.

Another halibut fare was landed Tuesday at Portland by sch. Yakima of this port, which has been fishing for several weeks on the Quereau banks. She brought in 15,000 pounds of halibut, which were sold to Capt. Harty of the New England Fish Co., at 5 1/2c and 8 cents, and had in addition about 20,000 pounds of shack fish which she brought here.

SOLD HALIBUT AT PORTLAND.

SCH. YAKIMA BROUGHT HER FRESH AND SALT FISH TO THIS PORT.

Fish receipts here this morning consist of two Georges handliners, one from Boston and one from Portland.

Sch. Pauline arrived this forenoon from a handling trip with 20,000 pounds of salt cod and 5000 pounds of halibut.

Down from Boston is sch. Belbina P. Domingoes with about 40,000 weight of fresh fish left over, which will go to the splitters.
