

SWORDFISH WAY UP TODAY.

Brought 16 Cents Per Pound,
the Highest Price of
the Season.

This morning's market at T wharf started off firm, prices on all grades of fish taking a jump over yesterday's figures and there was considerable activity among the buyers.

Among the fresh groundfish fares were schs. Frances V. Sylvia, with 50,000 pounds; Frances S. Grueby, 41,000 pounds; Rose Cabral, 72,000 pounds; Mary DeCosta, 55,000 pounds. In addition to the two trips of mackerel reported in another column, there were three trips of swordfish in, with a total of 54 fish among them. Swordfish was in good demand and sold for 16 cents a pound, the highest price of the season.

Haddock sales were at \$1 and \$2 a hundred pounds, large cod, \$3.50 to \$4.75; market cod, \$1.75 to \$2.50; hake, \$1.60 to \$3; pollock, 1.59 to \$2 and cusk, \$1.75.

SALT TINKERS ARE BRINGING \$15.

Fish in Good Order and
Running Larger Than
Month Ago.

Salt tinker mackerel have taken a rise, yesterday's sales being at \$15 a barrel, an advance of \$1 over the last sales. The fish are running larger than a month ago, counting about 320 to 360 to a barrel salted.

The fare of sch. Pinta, comprising 86 barrels sold to the E. K. Burnham Fish Company, and 123 barrels, the fare of sch. Marguerite Haskins to William H. Jordan & Company, each at \$15 per barrel.

Sch. Saladin which arrived Sunday with 75 barrels of salt tinker mackerel sold her fare to the Cunningham & Thompson Company at \$15 a barrel.

Sch. Saladin Doing Well.

One of the gilt edged stocks of the present season's mackerel fishery is that of sch. Saladin, Capt. John Matheson, the craft having landed three trips within a period of two weeks, from which a stock of \$4592 was realized. As the result of their good fortune, the crew shared \$99.72 to a man.

Will Make Good Trip.

Sch. Lucania, Capt. Martin L. Welch, brought down her salt fare of 206 barrels of tinkers yesterday afternoon, which sold to Sylvanus Smith & Company at \$15 a barrel.

More Fares In.

Mackerel prospects are looking better each day and the fleet still continue to find the fish which are hanging on the Rips.

This morning, sch. Constellation is at Boston with a fare of 20,000 pounds of tinkers, while steamer Bessie M. Dugan, Capt. Jerry Cook, is also in with 12,000 pounds. Mackerel was in big demand by the dealers who paid eight cents a pound for both trips.

Salt Mackerel.

The catch of salt mackerel by the fleet to date is 2461 barrels against 6200 barrels in 1911.

Imports of salt mackerel received at Boston to date are 6672 barrels, as compared with 2874 barrels for the same period of last year.

A total of 19,780 barrels of fresh mackerel have been landed to date, against 38,165 barrels in 1911.

Imports of fresh mackerel received at Boston to date are 3492 barrels, while for the same period of 1911 it was 3870 barrels.

Portland Fish News.

Blueback herring are showing up again, and the fishermen are greatly pleased thereat. Several good catches were brought in at Portland Sunday last, and the probability is good for extensive hauls this week. Among those reported yesterday were the steamers Joanna with 150 barrels, Alice, 115; Carrie and Mildred, 80, and the Trident, with 60. The fish are of good size, just what is wanted for bait, and the cold storage plants on Central wharf stand ready to take all that may be brought in.

Squid at Burgeo.

Squid has struck in at Burgeo, Cape La Hune and Seal Cove, N. F., but not a sufficient quantity to bait many vessels. At almost every port schooners were still hung up waiting for bait. Fish is fairly plentiful at Rose Blanche, but the scarcity of bait prevents any being caught. At Cape Broyle there are 40 bankers awaiting some news. A couple left during the past week for Conception Harbor, but squid is not very plentiful there.

SOME MORE GOOD MACKEREL TRIPS.

Dory Handliner Reports Rafts of Fish Near Bank Bradley.

Good news continue to come from the mackerel fleet cruising down off Chatham for several of the fleet took fish there yesterday and were at T wharf, Boston this morning with their fares for market.

The fish are of the tinker variety but running good size and sold at six cents a pound this morning.

Sch. Monarch, Capt. John Vautier, hails for 15,000 pounds of fresh ones, besides 30 barrels of salt tinkers, while sch. Clintonia, Capt. Ralph Webber, has 25,000 pounds of tinkers, 1000 large and 1500 mediums, 22 cents apiece.

Sch. Lucania, Capt. Martin J. Welch has a big fare, 25,000 pounds of tinkers, besides 200 barrels of salt ones, from which he will realize a nice stock. Steamer Bethulia is also in with 1000 large fresh mackerel which sold with this morning's lot.

In here is sch. Pinta, Capt. Douglas McLean with 5000 pounds of tinkers and 90 barrels of salt tinker mackerel. Capt. McLean tore both of his seines which are being speedily repaired, so that the craft can get away again.

Saturday steamer Scout brought in

150 large mackerel among her bluebacks, which were taken out in Ipswich bay. The fish were purchased by Lufkin & Tarr at 37 cents a piece.

Big Rafts of Mackerel Sighted.

Capt. Robert Winslow of sch. Flirt which arrived home Sunday from a dory handlining voyage, reports fine prospects in the North Bay. Capt. Winslow says that about two weeks ago, while coming down between the Bank Bradley and Entry Island, he sighted no less than 14 schools of mackerel. "They were immense rafts of fish," says Capt. Winslow, "and I wish we had only had a seine."

Skipper of the local fleet are optimistic over the outlook for a fall catch, and believe that some good catches will yet be made.

Seiners Made Port.

All the seining fleet that has been making Portland their headquarters were forced back into Portland harbor Friday by the heavy northwesterly gale that has been blowing during the past few days. The boats, steamers, sloops and gasolene craft, tied up on the easterly side of Central wharf and were there in the lee of the wind.

BIG FLEET AT T WHARF TODAY.

No Less Than 32 Crafts
Bring in All Varieties
of Fish.

After the holidays, T wharf was naturally a busy place this morning, a total of 32 arrivals being on hand for the opening trade of the week.

Mackerel was in lively demand, and the fresh trips were quickly snapped up. Trade on groundfish was also good, the fleet including four of the steam trawlers, together with several off shore trips from the sailing fleet, some of whom are reported with good sized fares.

Three swordfishermen had 56 fish among them, which sold at 13 cents a pound. There was also one trip of halibut, sch. Elk having 12,000 weight besides some cod.

Fulton Market Fish Notes.

Smacks landed nearly three-quarters of a million pounds of fish at the Fulton Market, N. Y., last week, of which nearly two-thirds was bluefish. There was a heavy demand for that variety of fish and as the supply was about 25 per cent. short of what it should have been to meet the calls of the trade, prices were high, though not unusually so.

Of the 48 smacks that reached the market, 31 carried bluefish. Catches were not by any means as heavy as usual. The biggest catch, 5000 fish, was made by the Benjamin M. Wallace. The Vincent had the smallest lot, 300 fish.

Codfish—Market cod sold at 2 1-2 to 3 cents and steak cod at 4 to 6 cents.

Haddock brought 2 to 3 cents.

Both eastern and western halibut were high in price. The former sold at 13 to 16 cents and the latter at 11 to 12 cents.

Hake brought 3 to 4 cents.

Tinker mackerel sold up to \$14 per barrel this week. On Saturday last the quotation was \$8 to \$9 per barrel. Boston mackerel brought 38 to 45 cents each.

Pollock sold at 3 1-2 to 5 cents.

There was no eastern or western salmon in the market.

TALK ABOUT BIG SWORDFISH!

Twelve swordfish, weighing about eight thousand pounds, formed part of the cargo of the steamer Aspy at North Sydney, C. B., one day last week. These fish were consigned to parties in Boston by Mr. Joseph O'Brien, of Bay St. Lawrence, and make a total of twenty-six shipped by him this season to the American market. The fish weighed on an average of 700 pounds, and are worth in the vicinity of twenty-eight cents a pound, so that it can be seen Mr. O'Brien, who is the pioneer in this particular class of shipments, is netting pretty good profits. Swordfish are reported plentiful in Northern Victoria County waters, but is was not until recently that fishermen paid any attention to this branch of the industry. In fact no person knew the value of the fish until Mr. O'Brien opened up a market in Boston. Next year swordfishing will receive more attention at the hands of our local fishermen, as a great demand is always made for them in the United States, and now that a beginning has been made there is every reason to believe our fishermen will take advantage of their opportunities.

Considerable schools of herring have appeared in most of the harbors of the east of Yarmouth. The traps are making few stops and the nets for the past week have been well filled.

Picked Up Boat and Seine.

The commander of the revenue cutter Aoushnet has notified the Board of Trade of picking up a seine boat and seine, adrift in Nantucket Sound last Friday. The boat had no name and with the seine was towed into Wood's Hole where both will be delivered to the owner upon furnishing sufficient identification of the property.

It is thought the boat and seine was either that of the sch. Shenandoah which was recently sent to bottom in a collision with a six master, or to sch. Lucania which craft also lost her seine and boat in a collision, a few days previous.

The Newfoundland Cure.

A few small cargoes of new fish arrived in the city during the week, principally from the west and south coasts, says the St. John's "Trade Review." We note one cargo from Trinity Bay, which arrived Wednesday. Most of the western fish, especially a cargo from Burgeo, is early spring catch, and is fairly well cured, but the later caught goods show evidence of absence of sun, and is not so well cured. It is almost impossible to get a definite price for this goods. After throwing out West India, there is a lump price offered, based on general appearance, for the lot. If fish is clean, fairly large and well made, the price reaches \$5.50, but one or two poor looking lots have been closed out as low as \$4.50 per quintal.

Schs. Viking and Angie B. Watson were at Portland, Tuesday, the former with four swordfish and the latter with 31.

Sloop North Star also arrived on the same day with 20 barrels of large sea herring.
