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# SCH. ELK BRINGS HALIBUT FARE.

Also Has Lot of Large Fresh Cod Running 50 Pounds Each.

A pretty quiet morning was the report from T wharf, Boston, today, the only arrivals since yesterday being two off shores and one of the beam trawling fleet.

Sch. Elk, Capt. Charles Colson arrived during the night from the eastward with 15,000 pounds of halibut, 12,000 pounds of fresh cod and 7000 pounds of salt cod. The cod fare were all large fish, some of them weighing as high as 40 and 50 pounds each. Sch. Margaret Dillon arrived yesterday afternoon with 30,000 pounds of fresh fish and the steam trawler Foam, 6500 pounds.

Haddock sold at \$3 a hundred weight, large cod, \$4 to \$6; market cod, \$3 to \$4 and pollock, \$3. The halibut fare of sch. Elk was not sold up to 9 o'clock this forenoon.

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# DORY HANDLINER IS HOME TODAY.

Sch. Lottie G. Merchant Brings 150,000 Pounds of Salt Cod.

Sch. Lottie G. Merchant arrived here yesterday noon from a dory handlining trip, after an absence since May 10, with 150,000 pounds of salt cod.

Two halibuters are in this morning schs. Hope from the Cape Shore and Rena A. Percy from Georges. The former has 10,000 pounds of halibut and 15,000 pounds of fresh fish, while the latter, Capt. John G. Stream, hauls for 12,000 pounds of halibut and 8000 pounds of salt cod. The Percy was gone 20 days and the Hope, one day short of a month.

Down from Boston is the Harriett with 40,000 pounds of fresh fish, Frances V. Sylvia, 40,000 pounds and Edith Silveria, 30,000 which sold to split.

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# LUNENBURG FISHERS FIGHT.

The vessels of the Lunenburg fishing fleet are returning from the banks and a great many men are ashore. The catch has been on the whole below the average. A few of the vessels have full catches, but many of them have not more than half.

There has been the usual trouble on the streets when big crowds of men are about. A fisherman was summoned to appear in court on a charge of resisting the police.

Saturday afternoon there was a series of fights on the street, and big crowds of people got mixed up with them, more as spectators than as combatants. The chief fight was between 5 and 6 o'clock, and the crowd between the postoffice and the Bank of Montreal made the street almost impassable. There were a number of black eyes and broken heads, but no serious casualties. It looks as if a stronger police force were needed at this time of year anyway.

Another Lunenburg correspondent says that policemen and constables were unable to quell the mob. They fought in front of the stipendiary magistrate's office, and although he was among the combatants, no heed was paid to his authority. One man was compelled to take refuge in his office.

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# ONE SWORDFISH TRIP AT T WHARF.

The Week Closes Quietly With But Four Groundfish Fares at Pier.

The week closed quietly this morning at T wharf, four arrivals of groundfish and one swordfisherman being reported at the dock.

There was but little activity in trade, as is generally the case at the week-end, while the total receipts were less than 40,000 pounds. The crafts in were Schs. Mina Swim, Klondike, Georgiana, Frances P. Mesquita and Eva and Mildred, the latter with 27 swordfish.

### Talk About Fish Stories!

Not all the fish prevaricators live in the United States. The following is a letter to the editor of the Montreal Star:

"Recently I read an interesting account of the singing fish in your paper. It recalled to me the memory of a rather remarkable fish we have here in Nova Scotia. It is known as the 'Frost Fish,' because it may be frozen like a lump of ice, but if put in water in that condition it soon thaws out and swims around as vigorously as ever.

"The natives make use of this property to make ice cream.

"The fish is caught, frozen, and placed in the cream, thawing out it freezes the cream, and its movement at the same time stirring mixture, making it smooth.

In commenting on the above the New York Sun says: "Taking them by the large, from Moosehead lake at Puget Sound and from the Upper Mississippi to the Gulf, we have some very capable and industrious fish lars in this country. But we should hand the reel and rod over to Nova Scotia."

To which the Coast Guard says: "We have talent in this country. But Nova Scotia is the abode of genius."

### Mackerel Catch and Imports.

The catch of salt mackerel of the fleet to date is 6207 barrels against 6449 barrels for the same period in 1911.

Imports of salt mackerel received at Boston to date is 8947 barrels as compared with 6967 barrels in 1911.

The catch of fresh mackerel by the fleet of 1912 is 30,500 barrels to date. Last year up to the same period it was 41,611 barrels.

Imports of fresh mackerel received at Boston up to date is 5723 barrels, while in 1911, 4430 barrels were brought in.

### More Mackerel From Nova Scotia.

The steamer from Yarmouth brought 500 more barrels of fresh mackerel to Boston this morning, which were taken by the trap and shore fishermen around Yarmouth.

Beavy, has 150 barrels of salt mackerel, which will be taken by William H. Jordan & Company, it being the first salt mackerel arrival since Wednesday.

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# THE SALT FISH CONDITIONS.

Says the Fishing Gazette:  
A prominent New York house reports as follows:

Continued unfavorable reports from curing centers, both as to the catch and weather for curing, together with an improved demand from foreign markets, have had the natural result in our local market so that stocks are well cleaned up here and higher prices asked and paid. This seems to apply not only to dry stock, such as codfish, pollock and haddock, but mackerel also are materially firmer, and present advices seem to indicate that the catch in Norway either is not as large as was reported, or is held in very firm hands there. Higher instead of lower prices being now demanded.

Added to the temporary scarcity of stock comes the unfortunate news of the loss of the brig Sceptre, with about 500 casks of fish, bound to Porto Rico, undoubtedly causing in that market a temporary and extraordinary shortage of stock which has led to exaggerated advices, particularly in the form of cablegrams, tending to excite local and producing markets still further, and unwarrantably so. Norway advices in regard to codfish continue firm.

Hake is the only variety of dry stock that is depressed at the moment. The export demand is very light, indeed, and with some old and exceptionally heavy stock of new, the outlook for hake is not at all favorable, as the markets are limited, and consumption up to the present time is way below normal.

An improvement in the prices of dried fish has set in at Lunenburg and \$5 is now looked for as a probable figure for the summer run of fish.

All the West India markets show an improvement in prices compared with a month ago, Porto Rico particularly, says the "Maritime Register." This is due to two causes, (1) the clearing up of stocks of old fish that had been sent forward both on order and on consignment, and (2) the shortage at this end in the newly cured supplies. It is said that quite heavy losses were made this spring by those who sent shipments of old fish to Porto Rico on consignment and it is to be hoped they will be able to get back at least some of their money on the present turn of the market. The greatest difficulty at the moment is to get enough fish to keep up with orders, but this condition would speedily be relieved if we were to have a few weeks of good weather. There is no outlook, however, for lower prices, as it is said the total quantity to be marketed is not more than West India consumers will require.

A considerable quantity of dry codfish found its way into St. John's, N. F., last week, but most of it was brought in the outports by agents of St. John's firms and sent in for re-packing and transshipment, says the "Trade Review." This means that the fishermen themselves have not, as yet, brought along much of their voyage to the city. By staying at home they have shown considerable wisdom, because the completion amongst agents in the outports has enabled the fishermen to get prices for their goods that they could not get in St. John's at present for the same article. The price given by outport agents on the ground has not been, by any means, too high, if the fish were first class quality, but unfortunately, most of it is poorly cured owing entirely to the absence of proper weather. The most of the fish merchants in St. John's are not displaying their usual keenness to buy. They have evidently decided to go slow till the first fish (most of which is poorly made) is absorbed by somebody else before entering the market for their requirements. Though the whole of the summer season was extremely bad for fish curing, the latter caught article had a little more sunshine during its cure, and will be good, sound and well-made goods when it comes to hand. The basis of purchase at present is neither equal nor cull. Every parcel that comes along is taken on its individual merits and no two houses are giving exactly the same figures. Undoubtedly, the talqual system has broken down, and we'll have to get back to culling again.

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# FOUND FISH VERY SCARCE.

## Capt. Clayton Morrissey Home With But 50,000 Pounds Salt Cod.

Arrivals at this port this forenoon consisted of sch. Yakima from halibuting, sch. Benj. A. Smith from haddocking and three of the seining fleet with salt mackerel.

Sch. Yakima, Capt. Robert Wharton, is home from the Gully with a fare of 15,000 pounds of halibut and 30,000 pounds of salt cod. The halibut was purchased by the New England Halibut Company at 13 1-2 cents a pound for white and 10 1-2 cents a pound for gray.

Sch. Benj. A. Smith from Cape Shore has 100,000 pounds of fresh fish, while schs. Lucania and Aloha and steamer Bessie M. Dugan are the arrivals from seining.

Saturday forenoon, sch. Arethusa, Capt. Clayton Morrissey arrived from a salt shacking trip with 50,000 pounds of salt cod. Capt. Morrissey has been gone since August 17 and he found fish pretty scarce. During the latter part of the trip, fishing was little more plentiful, but Capt. 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# BIG FLEET IN AT T WHARF.

## Steam Trawlers Surf and Crest Have Large Catches of Haddock.

Business at T wharf this morning opened with a rush after the comparatively quiet spell of the last two days of the preceding week, a fleet of 28 sail being at the dock when the gong sounded.

Haddock, cod and hake were in abundance several of the off shores having big fares. Among the largest trips of the morning are schs. Conqueror, 53,000 pounds; Jorgina, 80,000 pounds; Mary, 77,000 pounds; Belbina P. Domingoes, 48,000 pounds. Three of the steam trawlers are also in, the Surf having 83,000 pounds; Swell, 53,000 pounds; Crest, 71,000 pounds.
