MONITOR LOST-- CREW ALL SAVED

Gorton-Pew Craft Dashed on Rocks at Codroy, N. F., During Heavy Gale— Was Partly Loaded With Salt Cod.

Another craft of the local fishing fleet is ashore and a total loss, word being received here Saturday afternoon that sch. Monitor, Capt. Robert Diggins, had driven on the rocks at Codroy, N. F., Friday night, during a gale. Capt. Diggins and crew were saved.

The Monitor was formerly one of the Whorff Provincetown fleet and was purchased by the Gorton-Pew Fisheries Company several years ago.

The craft left here November 9 in quest of a cargo of salt cod and had on board about 140,000 pounds at the time of the accident.

She was valued at about \$12,000 on vessel and cargo, which is covered through insurance in the office of John A. Johnson. The Monitor measured 110.02 tons gross and 78.88 tons net and was built in Essex in 1886.

A telegram is expected today from Capt. Diggins with more particulars concerning the accident.

LOOKS BETTER AT BAY OF ISLANDS

Several Crafts on Way Here With Salt- ed Cargoes—Others Near Ready to Sail—Big Lunenburgers Fit- ting to Go Now.

Good news comes to the Times this morning from the Bay of Islands, N. F., where herring are reported in good quantity and several of the fleet have done well during the past few days, so as to complete their cargoes and have started for home.

The vessels on their homeward way are schs. Lottie G. Merchant, Arkona, J. J. Flaherty and Flirt and the Lunenburg schs. William McKay, W. C. Smith, Assurance and Gladys Smith. All are bound here with full cargoes of salt herring. Sch. William McKay is for Capt. George Peeples of this port.

The Times is informed that there is also quite a number nearly ready to sail. They include schs. Regina, Ar-

bitrator, Vera Hemmelman and one of the Zwicker fleet. Sch. Judique is also nearly ready and is expected to take her cargo to Eastport, Me.

The outlook at the Bay of Islands is now very good. It blows very hard about every other day, but when the fishermen haul their nets, good catches result.

A number of Lunenburgers are now fitting, mostly for frozen fares. They included several of the tern vessels. Some of the crafts going are schs. Mary Young, Benjamin Smith and the Alexandra.

At Bonne Bay, herring are now scarce, although some catches were made the latter part of last week. Sch. Senator Gardner was lucky to get there while the spurt was on and filled her fore hold.

TWO MACKEREL FISHERMEN ARE LOST IN BLOW

Capt. William Holly in Sloop Malicia Enos Vainly Searched All Night in Gale For His Missing Men, William Tarr and George Tibbets—Started to Underrun Their Nets About 15 Miles Off Shore and Never Seen Again— Captain Hopes They Have Been Pick- ed Up.

With her colors at half mast, the Rockport sloop Malicia Enos, Capt. William Holly one of the fleet of mackerel druggers arrived at Rockport, Wednesday afternoon and reported the loss of William Tarr of Rockport and George Tibbets of this city, two of her crew, who were parted from their boat during the heavy weather, Tuesday night.

The craft was fishing about 15 miles southeast of Rockport when the accident happened. One of the crew was unable to go out that night and Capt. Holly sailed with but two of his men, Tarr and Tibbets besides himself.

Tarr and Tibbets each took a dory about 7 o'clock, Tuesday night, and started to underrun the nets. They had been gone some time, when Capt. Holly who remained aboard started to look for them, but they were nowhere in sight. Quite a heavy sea was running at the time and Capt. Holly alone in the craft, sailed about the vicinity all night long, but no traces of his crew could be found.

At daybreak he resumed the search with renewed hope but with no better results than before. Later in the day he reluctantly headed for Rockport harbor, where the sad news was

imparted. A little daughter of Tibbets, one of the lost men was at the wharf to greet her father, only to learn that her father had not returned. Heartbreaking Thanksgiving in the Homes.

The families of the two men were notified were grief stricken upon learning of the affair and it was a sad Thanksgiving yesterday in the households. Hope has not been abandoned, however, that some tidings of their safety will be brought that men have been picked up by a passing vessel or steamer.

An unfounded report was spread last evening that the men had been rescued by a Yarmouth steamer, proved incorrect, as no such message was received by the party, who credited with receiving the message.

Capt. Holly feels the loss of the men keenly. He says that he saw the apparently undisturbed Wednesday. This affords grounds of hope to the fishermen, who say that it blew heavily Tuesday night, a dory could have survived the element and may have been blown out to sea. Tarr has a wife and two children residing on Mt. Pleasant street, Rockport. Tibbets who has been fishing on the craft about 10 days resided with his wife and family on Harold street in this city.

BIG DAYS FOR GILL NETTERS

Only two cargoes of Bank fish have been sold within the last month at \$6 and the freight delivered in Halifax, the remaining catch still being in the hands of the fishermen, and the outlook at present is not very bright for making sales, as the markets owing to war conditions, etc., are very dull and some practically closed.

During the month some half a dozen of our vessels have left for Newfoundland to load herring, chiefly for the American market. So far none of them have returned, although it is reported that one has secured a load, and has sailed or is about sailing for her destination.—Canadian Fisherman.

Canadian clams seem to be in no demand this fall in United States markets. Many shipments arriving in New York had to be dumped. Reports from the Annapolis Basin state that only 300 barrels have been shipped this season compared with over a thousand barrels last year.—Canadian Fisherman.
