ONLY TWO IN AT NEW FISH PIER

Two arrivals looked small enough at the Boston fish pier this morning, but that was all that had reported up to 9 o'clock.

They were the beam trawler Billow with 34,000 pounds fresh fish and sch. Buema with 8800 pounds. Prices were good, but notwithstanding the few arrivals did not aviate. According to the dealers, the fresh fish market has been inactive for several weeks, which they claim is responsible for the low prices.

Wholesalers paid \$5 to \$5.50 a hundred pounds for haddock, \$5.50 for large and \$3.50 for market cod, \$3 to \$5 for hake, \$3 for pollock and \$2 for cusk.
