WASHAKIE'S MEN NOW ALL SAFE

All of the missing men of sch. Washakie have been accounted for, yesterday sch. Harriett landing Capt. James Nickerson, Thomas Brophy, Simon Landry and John Surret at Boston, who had been picked up 40 miles off Highland light, after having drifted about for 48 hours.

The men immediately joined their craft at Boston, and a little while afterwards, the Washakie sailed for the grounds again.

Ackerman, the cook, who brought the Washakie to port, did not return with the craft, having gone sword-fishing in sch. Flavilla.

Bound Here With Herring.

Sch. Arkona sailed from Wood Island, N. F., for this port, June 4, having on board 1225 barrels of herring, 20,000 pounds salt cod for the Cunningham & Thompson Company.

MARSHAL SELLS VICTOR AND ETHAN

The halibut fishing schooner Victor and Ethan, formerly of Boston, was sold on the steps of the federal building in Seattle on May 29 by a deputy United States marshal. The vessel was bid in by the firm of King & Winge of West Seattle, at \$6,050. The bidding started at \$2,000.

The Victor and Ethan and the Athena, it will be remembered, were two of the Boston market fishing fleet and sailed for the Pacific coast about two years ago "to make the fortunes" of their captains and crews. Boston and Gloucester are not such bad places to fish out of after all.

ARCHIE MCLEOD TO HAVE NEW ONE

Capt. Archie MeeLod of sch. Bay State has contracted with Arthur D. Story, the Essex ship builder, for the construction of a new craft, for the local fishery. The vessel will be of the knockabout type and will be nine foot longer than the Bay State, or about 130 feet over all, 25 1-2 feet beam and 12 feet depth of hold.

MAKES TWO TRIPS TO CAPE SHORE

Sch. Rob Roy at Boston Today, 30,000 Fresh Mackerel—Left Here Wednesday Night—Unknown Craft Made Catch Off Cape Negro.

For the first time in several seasons, the returning fleet to the Cape Shore have taken fish. At Boston this morning is sch. Rob Roy, Capt. Lemuel Firth with 30,000 mixed fare, which were taken off Liverpool N. S., last Friday morning.

A Despatch from C. D. Mulhall at Liverpool, N. S., to the Times yesterday states that a seiner captured a big school off Cape Negro, Saturday afternoon. Who the vessel was, or whether she was a "second tripper," could not be ascertained. "Mackerel continue to school plentifully," the despatch adds.

Capt. Robertson Giffin of sch. Conqueror arrived here from a fresh and salt trip reports lots of mackerel on the Cape Shore. He reports sighting sch. Arabia headed towards fish, two days ago.

One Fare at Halifax.

Mackerel arrivals to the National Fish Company Thursday were small, the only fare in at Halifax being the schooner D. C. Mulhall. This fare contained 15,000 mackerel and was taken just off-shore, near the harbor entrance. They were of medium size. Arrivals Wednesday amounted to about ten thousand, about seven thousand to Watson's Fish market and the balance to the National Fish Company, all taken off-shore.

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BIG FARES AT BOSTON TODAY

Boston fresh fish receipts started off with several trips in this morning, including one mackerel arrival from the Cape Shore.

Some good trips reported, sch. James and Esther having 100,000 pounds, mostly hake; Robert and Arthur, 75,000, mostly hake; Jeanette, 120,000 pounds fresh cod. The steam trawlers Foam and Surf had 100,000 pounds mixed fish, 40,000 of which were scrod haddock.

Dealers paid \$1.50 a hundred, wholesale, for haddock, \$3.50 to \$4 for large and \$1.75 for market cod, \$1.50 to \$3 for hake, \$1 for pollock and 10 cents and 6 cents a pound for fresh halibut.

PRINCE RUPERT HITS KETCHIKAN

Citizens There Petition Government to Go Into the Fish Business.

That the citizens of Ketchikan are taking a deep interest in the efforts being made by the Canadian government to divert the shipping of fresh halibut from Alaska and Washington points through Prince Rupert has been plainly evidenced lately, says the Pacific Fisherman. The success of these efforts would mean much to the merchants of Ketchikan, who now derive a considerable profit from the sale of supplies, etc., to the fleet, nearly all of which would be lost in that event. While the Alaskan legislature was in session an effort was made by

certain of the citizens to get it to adopt a memorial to Congress which, among other things, suggested that our shipping laws be so amended as to "require all vessels engaged in the catching of fish for the American markets to land the fish caught, purchased or otherwise procured, at an American port," the idea being that with such a law in existence the transcontinental railroads, and particularly the Grand Trunk Pacific, would have to give Ketchikan terminal rates, together with a service from Ketchikan to Prince Rupert for the purpose of handling the shipments of fish.

Recently some of the citizens have petitioned Secretary of Commerce Redfield that the government go into the fish business itself, a suggestion which we think will not meet with much approval in Washington. Their plan is that the federal government should appoint a purchasing agent to buy and receive the fresh fish at Ketchikan, and a distributing agent to be stationed at Chicago, and should also require cold storage facilities in both places for the accommodation of fish handled by these agents.

TWO SHACKERS HAVE DONE WELL

Schs. Conqueror and Thomas S. Gorton Both Home With Fine Catches.

Schs. Conqueror, Capt. Robertson Giffin and Thomas S. Gorton, Capt. William H. Thomas, of the fleet that went to Cape North are here this morning. The former from Grand Banks hauls for 110,000 pounds salt and 75,000 pounds fresh cod besides 3000 pounds fresh and 4000 pounds flitched halibut, while the Gorton brings 140,000 pounds fresh and 100,000 pounds salt cod.

Sch. Flora L. Oliver brought her salt and fresh fare down from Boston to take out here, while sch. Annie F. Kimball from Maine ports has a cargo of cured fish for here.

The herring fleet landed more fish Saturday and yesterday, while with continued good weather of the day other trips are expected.

To Have Two Halibuters.

It is reported that the North Fish Company, of Portland, Ore. will place the power schooner Decatur, 26 net tons, in the halibut fishery the Oregon and Washington banks. This vessel was formerly a member of the Seattle halibut fleet, but was sold to her present owners last year, for a time operated on the above banks. The power vessel Gazelle, 10 net tons, belonging to the same company, will also go into commission as a fish craft.

To Freeze Halibut For North.

Early in May the New England Fish Company towed a large house scow from its Ketchikan plant to an anchorage back of Pigeon Island, about a mile east of Cone Island, on the coast of Prince of Wales Island, Southeast Alaska, and will use it as a station for the purpose of buying fresh halibut for freezing purposes. A stock of groceries and fishing gear for the convenience of the fishermen is also carried aboard the scow.
