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MACKEREL AGAIN GLUT THE MARKET

After a few days lull, the seiners have landed on the mackerel again and Boston and Gloucester dealers today were swamped as a result.

At Boston when the bell rang for the opening of trade, 19 craft reported with a total haul for 896,000 pounds. A large part of the fish went to storage while other trips would be sent to split, it was said.

Nine local seiners, eight coming direct from off the Highlands, and the other from Boston, landed over a

half million pounds of fresh mackerel here last night and this morning. Splitters, canners and the freezers took care of the fish, which sold for 2½ cents a pound.

At the Producers Fish Company, the gang worked nearly all night taking out 81,000 pounds from the Italian seiner, Linta, and the same was true of both Cold Storages.

The smallest fare landed was brought in by sch. Nyoda, her haul being for 32,000 pounds. The others ran from that up to 81,000 pounds.

MACKEREL GLUT AT BOSTON PIER

NINETEEN SEINERS ON HAND THERE THIS MORNING WITH 900,000 POUNDS.

Mackerel price slumped to 2 to 3 cents per pound at the Boston fish pier this morning, when 19 seiners brought in fares ranging from 15,000 to 80,000 pounds. Total receipts were 896,000 pounds, and constituted one of the biggest mackerel days this season. There were only five other arrivals, two steamers, two from offshore, and one sworder. Receipts comprised 202,000 pounds of groundfish, 99 swordfish and 9300 pounds of mixed fish.

Groundfish prices remained about the same as yesterday, and swordfish sold for 12 to 21 cents.
