ONLY TWO SMALL MACKEREL FARES

BRITISH CRAFT BROUGHT SALT FISH FARE FROM PROVINCES TODAY

Only two small fares of blink mackerel were reported here this morning; one arrival coming through the night and the other this forenoon. The fares totaling 10,500 pounds, went to the splitters. The haddock Squanto, arrived this morning direct from the grounds with 160,000 pounds of fresh fish for Davis Brothers, and the Nova Scotian freighter Philip J. arrived from the Provinces with 130,000 pounds of salt fish for Frank C. Pearce Company. The only other arrival up to noon was a small shore trawler with 7000 pounds of fish.

THIRTY-ONE IN BOSTON FLEET

RECEIPTS MOSTLY GROUND FISH THIS MORNING—NO SWORDFISHERS ON HAND.

Over a million pounds of groundfish and a few small lots of mackerel were brought into the Boston fish pier this morning by 31 vessels. Receipts totaled 1,155,000 pounds of groundfish, 1000 pounds of halibut, 137,000 pounds of mixed fish, seven swordfish, 26,000 pounds of mackerel, 31,500 pounds of blinks. Prices were a little lower on everything except mackerel.

Groundfish prices sagged while the few swordfish sold at seven to 13 cents per pound. Mackerel soared to 13.50 to 13.70 cents per pound, the highest in weeks.

A record number of mixed fish single trip was landed at the Fish Pier yesterday, when sch. Irene and Helen, Capt. Matthew Sears, arrived in from Georges with a catch of 287 fish, representing a three weeks' cruise.

The sch. Edmund F. Black, was the holder of the largest trip landed previously, and her achievement of securing 267 fish on one trip has stood nearly 16 years. It was on August 4, 1913, that this huge haul was received here. The record established by Capt. Sears bids fair to stand for a long time. Because of the fact that swordfish were abundant in the market yesterday, the Irene and Helen will not stock a sum corresponding to the size of her catch, although she will do extremely well.

BOSTON FLEET SMALLER TODAY

SUPPLY IS MODERATE AND MARKET REMAINED STEADY WITH FAIR PRICES.

A moderate supply of groundfish, swordfish, mackerel, flat fish and a few halibut were brought into the Boston market this morning. There were 17 vessels at the pier when the opening bell rang. Receipts aggregated 556,000 pounds of groundfish, 257 swordfish, 6000 lbs. of halibut, 81,000 pounds of fresh mackerel; 10,000 pounds of blinks; 1000 pounds of salted blinks and 14,000 pounds of mixed fish.

Mackerel prices held up, groundfish market was higher while swordfish still brought 7 to 13 cents per pound.

RECORD FARE FOR SWORDER AGAIN BROKEN

Belleoram Fishing Poor.
 Reports from Belleoram show a poor fishery to date, in that vicinity. There was a good sign of fish around the latter part of May, but this did not hold, and since then the catch has been small especially for traps. All bankers have arrived from their second baiting. They have averaged about 800 quintals each on their second baiting, or a little more than 1000 quintals each for the spring trip. Owing to the lateness of the arrival of caplin this year, many of the bankers had not baited up to June 22d, since then caplin have struck in Placentia Bay and around Dantzic, and it is thus hoped that all bankers will make a record showing on their third trip to the banks.—St. John's Trade Review.

LABRADOR PEOPLE. Unable to Launch Boats Owing To Winter Conditions.

The S. S. Kyle arrived in port on Sunday night from the first trip from the Labrador for the season. Drift ice was met going north and ship reached Hopedale on June 20. The inhabitants were still living in winter quarters and no boats have been launched owing to many of the bays being frozen solid. Trappers have had a poor season. Cod-fishing is good at Square Islands, Fox Harbor and Battle Harbor and salmon plentiful at Sandwich Bay. Schooners in the vicinity of Pack's Harbor reported only a sign of fish. Caplin had struck in at that point. The trawler Agulhas lost her propeller and sustained some damage to her hull by contact with ice and was taken in tow by the Kyle at Battle Harbor and brought to St. Anthony to be placed on the marine slip.—St. John's Trade Review, July 12.

VARIED SUPPLY OF FISH TODAY

SEINERS LANDED SOME 43,000 POUNDS OF BLINK MACKEREL.

Local dealers found themselves supplied with a small but varied assortment of fish this morning, including Canadian and down East salt fish. The British boat Radio with 200,000 pounds of salt fish picked up along the Nova Scotian coast put in late yesterday afternoon for the Gorton-Pew Fisheries Company, and the down East packet Mattie from Maine ports arrived with 1700 quintals of salt fish for C. F. Mattlage & Sons Company. General Seafoods took two off shore druggers with 130,000 pounds of mixed fish between then, and fresh fish shippers took in four trips of mackerel. The boat Virginia landed a fare of bluebacks, shad and mackerel.

TRAWL BRINGS UP SKELETON OF MARINE FREAK

On the deck of the fishing schooner Corinthian, moored yesterday at the end of the Fish Pier at South Boston, was part of the skeleton of some marine monster, which was dragged to the surface while the crew was hauling trawls on the fishing grounds. Some of the old fishermen who viewed the skeleton said it was a monster whale, while others expressed the opinion that it was some prehistoric monster whose bones had rested on the bottom of the ocean for years before it was hauled up by the crew of the Corinthian. Capt. Leo Doucette, the skipper of the schooner, said that the skeleton was brought up from a depth of 55 fathoms of water, while some of the crew were hauling trawls on Georges Bank, about 220 miles southeast from Highland Light, Cape Cod. The skeleton is about seven feet in width and 10 feet long. It probably will be presented to Harvard University or some marine museum.
