TWO CRIPPLES AT FISH PIER

MARKET OPENED TODAY WITH A
FAIR SUPPLY OF
FISH.

Two of the Boston fishing fleet limped into the pier this morning in a disabled condition, one with engine trouble and the other having unshipped her rudder.

The beam trawler Sea Hawk developed engine trouble and returned, in tow, with no fish, while the dragger Fannie F. Hickey unshipped her rudder and came back with a small fare.

Seiners brought 130,000 pounds of blink mackerel, a few large mackerel and some salt. Only one trip of swordfish was landed, this being the Gloucester schooner Albert D. Willard with 132 fish which sold for 10 and 18 cents a pound. There was also a fair amount of fresh fish from beam trawlers and draggers. Haddock jumped to \$2.50.

FEW ARRIVALS REPORTED HERE

ONE SEINER BROUGHT 50,000
POUNDS OF BLINKS TO
SPLIT.

Things were quiet in the fish line this morning and when the market opened, not an arrival of any kind was reported. During the forenoon the Italian seiner Linta, hailing for 50,000 pounds of blinks, pulled over to the Gorton wharf to take out her trip for splitting. The seiner Hoop-la landed 730 pounds of large fish at the Producers' Fish Company. The only other arrival was the trawler Angelina with 1500 pounds of fresh fish.

New Maine Laws.

Two important changes in sea and shore fisheries laws, made at the last session of the Maine legislature, became effective July 15. One measure reduces the length of time within which a license may be renewed after being forfeited for conviction of violation of the lobster fishing law.

The new law requires a six-months' lapse before a renewal in the case of a first offense; one year for the second offense; and three years for the third offense. Under the old law the license could not be renewed for one year under any circumstances.

The other law makes a three-year residence in Maine a requirement for a fisherman's license of the first class. One year's residence was required under the old law.

Portland Fishing Notes.

The first trip of swordfish taken out at Portland in several days was brought in Wednesday by the schooner Lochinvar. The vessel hailed for 147 fish which were discharged at the Portland Fish Company's plant. The schooner Alice M. Doughty arrived the previous day with 142 fish but later went to Boston where the fish were sold. The crew of the Lochinvar shared \$200 a man for the two week's trip. The schooner stocked \$3200.

BOSTON SUPPLY STILL HOLDS UP

TWENTY-FIVE ARRIVALS HAVE
USUAL VARIETIES THIS
MORNING.

Receipts at the Boston fish pier this morning comprised 630,000 pounds of groundfish, 301 swordfish, 108,000 pounds of fresh mackerel, 72,000 pound of blink mackerel, and 30,000 pounds of mixed fish. There were 25 arrivals. Prices remained about the same. Haddock brought \$2; large cod, \$3; markets, \$2.10; mackerel 5 60 to 5.65 cents per pound. Swordfish prices have straightened some and today's fares started at 12 to 19 cents.
