### N. F. Cod Liver Oil.

The market is weak and unchanged with only a limited demand, says the St. John's Trade Review. Contrary to expectations there has been no tendency towards higher prices, which may improve later on in the season. The competition feared from artificial vitamin preparations has fallen down. Neither Great Britain or the United States have been satisfied that these substitutes for medicinal cod liver oil are reliable. Germany is also stressing the same point. It is well known that the D. or anti-rachitic vitamin has been produced by this artificial manner, the other vitamins, including the A or growth promoting vitamin which also prevents eye disease, cannot be so produced. Cod liver oil contains the natural A and D vitamins in such quantities as to make it prized for its preventive and therapeutic effects. Three thousand two hundred and forty-eight gallons were exported last week.

# PRICES SURGED UPWARD TODAY

## BOSTON RECEIPTS TOTAL ABOUT HALF MILLION POUNDS—\$3 FOR HADDOCK.

The fleet at the Boston fish pier this morning numbered 14 craft when the opening bell rang. Total receipts were 383,000 pounds of groundfish and 115,000 pounds of mixed fish. Prices all moved upward. Haddock sold at \$7.50 to \$8; large cod, \$9 to \$10; markets, \$5 to \$6.

### N. F. Codfish News.

Fish markets are usually quiet after the holiday season and so immediate activity is looked for. Stocks have been ample and the consumption has been disappointing with large carry-over into the new year. Exporters would like to see some improvement in value for Newfoundland cure between now and the opening of the new fishing season. Too much inferior and intermediate fish has been allowed shipment for which lower values will likely result. Iceland is becoming a very important factor in the imports of Oporto and many other European markets each season; Iceland is filling the wants of particular customers in handling their fish under very strict regulations in so far as quality and the grade of suitable size fish is concerned. ### Canning Experiment.

A most interesting experiment is being made in Norway, which has possibilities of revolutionizing the canning industry, inasmuch as it has as its object the replacement of tin with aluminum. At present the experiment is limited to canned fish. Fifty thousand aluminum cans have been made up and used for canned fish balls and other fish products, part of which has been exported. The present most serious objection is the price, which is considerably higher than tin, but to offset the difference it is pointed out that possibly the expense of the printed label may be done away with, as aluminum may be embossed because it does not rust. If the question of cost can be satisfactorily solved, there is no question that aluminum for the canning industry has possibilities, it is said.
