HALF DOZEN IN LOCAL FLEET

United States and Canadian Associations Co-operate.

Plans are announced for a fisheries convention of unusual importance to be held September 11, 12 and 13 next at Montreal, where the United States Fisheries Association and the Canadian Fisheries Association will meet at the same time and place. Fisheries Association, was enthusiastically approved by the Canadian committee and preliminary arrangements have been made to make convention headquarters at the Winsor Hotel. BIG FLEET AT BOSTON TODAY

THIRTY-THREE ARRIVALS BRING
1,250,000 POUNDS—PRICES
ARE LOWER.

A large fleet and heavy receipts caused a dip in the market for fresh fish at the Boston pier this morning. There were 33 vessels in the dock when the opening bell sounded and fares amounted to 1,184,000 pounds of groundfish and 128,000 pounds of mixed fish. The market sagged some. Haddock opened at \$4 to \$4.50; large cod, \$6 and markets, \$4.

SALT STEAMER HERE FROM SPAIN

The German freighter Slottbeck of Hamburg, Germany, arrived in the outer harbor yesterday from Terravieja, Spain, with 2700 tons of salt for the Gorton-Pew Fisheries Company and this morning pulled into a berth at the Pew wharf to discharge her cargo.

Fish Leather Shoes.

Women may soon be wearing shoes made from the skins of cod and other fish, if experiments conducted by the Scottish fishery board meet with success. Two men have shown that it is possible to transform fish skins into excellent leather by the application of a solution of alum. At present the process of manufacture is rather costly, but it is hoped that, by using some of the cheaper by-products of seaweed as a substitute for alum, the process may become cheap enough to make fish-skin leather practicable.
