Digby Fishing News.

The sch. Dorothy G. Snow, Capt. William S. Murphy, which for several weeks past has been tied up a Laurence Sweeney's wharf, Yarmouth South, sailed on Wednesday afternoon on the first fresh halibut trip of the season and is probably the first of the Nova Scotia fishermen to make a start in that branch of the spring fishing, while, to date, only one is reported to have sailed from Boston or Gloucester, Mass. This trip is looked upon more or less anxiously by many concerned in the fisheries and will be watched with considerable interest, due to the persistent reports given out by several masters of ocean liners to the effect that following the earthquake shock of last November, the bottom of the ocean in the vicinity of the halibut grounds, fished in the early spring, had sunken to depths, practically unsoundable. It is generally conceded, however, that if there is any bottom to be found and the halibut are there, why Capt. Murphy will locate both the ocean bed and the fish and will return with a good fare. His schooner is fitted with 10 double dories and he has on board a crew of 23 all told of the best fishermen, who have ever walked a fresh halibuter's deck. The return of the Dorothy C. Snow will be awaited with much interest.

The sch. A. W. Longmire sailed on Wednesday on its last fresh haddocking trip of the season. On the return of the vessel it will be stripped of all gear, used for such fishing and will fit out for the halibuting. Capt. Simon Muise, who so successfully sailed this vessel last season, is again at the wheel.—Yarmouth Telegram.

N. S. Pickled Fish.

From inquiries among the trade, we find there is very little new to report regarding No. 1 large grocery herring. Sales are about average for the time of year and stocks normal. The price is steady at \$5.50 ex boat.

The export demand for spring herring is quiet. Nova Scotian September herrings are practically all in from the fishermen, and are now in exporters' hands. The last price quoted was \$5.25 ex boat.

The market continues strong on spring mackerel. Prices hold firm at \$10 to \$10.25 ex boat. Several hundred barrels reached the local market this week from outports. Quantities held in fishermen's hands are reported to be very light. Fat mackerel are unchanged, No. 1 selling here at \$21 ex boat.

The demand for alewives is a little more active; the export demand showing signs of improvement. Prices are steady at \$5.75 ex boat.—Maritime Merchant.

NEW SEAFOODS TRAWLER READY

Another new Diesel beam trawler, the Dartmouth, built at Quincy for the General Seafoods Company of this city, made her first appearance at Boston yesterday. She tied up at the Fish Pier, later going out in the bay for a trial spin, after which she returned to complete outfitting. Capt. Iver Carlson, of this city, has been engaged to take command of the Dartmouth. He has in the past commanded the schooners, Progress, Acushla and William L. Putnam, and in the halibut fishery, especially, made a notable record as a highliner. The same concern has the Cornell, Andover and Amherst, of the same type as the Dartmouth, which will be commissioned within a few weeks.

Irish Mackerel.

Official statistics just received from Ireland gives the catch of mackerel in the month of December, 1929, as 94 hundred weight as compared with 4210 during December, 1929. The total catch of mackerel for the year 1929 amounted to 81,133 hundred weight as compared with 71,300 hundred weight in 1928.

PLENTY OF FISH IN PORT TODAY

BEAM TRAWLER AND DRAGGERS BROUGHT TOTAL OF 135,000 POUNDS.

With a beam trawler, several of the off-shore druggers and shore druggers and shore boats unloading this forenoon, more fish has been landed here today than at any time within the past few weeks. From the grounds came the new trawler Princeton with 47,000 pounds for the General Seafoods Corporation, and the off-shore dragger Beauty St. Joseph docked with 42,000 pounds. The Producers Fish Company got seven druggers and trawlers, Murray & Tarr took out a couple of fares and the other arrivals went to Powers & McDonald and the Cape Ann Cold Storage. Gill netters landed 47,000 pounds of fish yesterday afternoon, the hauls running mostly to large cod.
