ANOTHER QUIET DAY IN PORT

ONE TRAWLER ONLY BOAT TO LAND FISH HERE TODAY.

Again receipts of fish were almost nothing at this port, for the only fare to be taken out this morning was the shore trawler Catherine C., hauling for 3000 pounds and selling to Murray & Farr. Because of the high wind yesterday, nearly all of the boats remained in port, and even the gill netters were hard hit, only four of them lifting and bringing in very small fares.

NINETEEN FARES AT BOSTON PIER

TOTAL OVER A MILLION POUNDS AGAIN TODAY—MARKET SAME AS YESTERDAY.

The supply of fresh fish at the Boston pier was large again today when 19 vessels brought in 982,000 pounds of groundfish and 100,000 pounds of mixed fish. The market held to about yesterday's level.

TOTAL RECEIPTS TODAY ARE 437,000 POUNDS—MARKET IS STILL FIRM.

At the Boston fish pier this morning things were pretty lively for a week-end. MacCuish leaves to supervise the final touches to the craft, which will be placed in commission the first of June, and will probably take part in the great ocean yacht race from New York to Honolulu.

TWO PROVINCETOWN FISHERMEN RESCUED

Two leathery tanned, hardy Portuguese fishermen last night received the congratulations of the fishermen at Provincetown as a result of their harrowing experience in being adrift on the heaving Atlantic a day and two nights, exposed to the cold and high winds in a 30-foot boat, open power type, before they were picked up by a passing coast guard boat. They were Dione Joseph and Manuel Azil of the Mary Virginia. The engine of the craft broke down as the fishermen were homebound with a 500-pound catch. The breakdown happened on shoal grounds, 20 miles off Race Point at 3 o'clock Wednesday afternoon.
