Gill netters hit very good fishing Saturday and yesterday, their hauls reaching over 80,000 pounds of fresh fish which was shipped outside to buyers.

BOSTON MARKET WELL SUPPLIED

THIRTY-THREE ARRIVALS THIS MORNING HAVE OVER 1,400,000 POUNDS.

Receipts at the Boston fish pier this morning aggregated 1,180,000 pounds of groundfish, 270,000 pounds of mixed fish and 13,000 pounds of sole. There were 33 arrivals and the most of the boats had pretty good fares. The market opened fairly firm, although haddock was off some from Saturday. Haddock sold at \$3.50 to \$4.75; large cod, \$7 to \$7.50, and markets, \$4.
