# DRAGGERS DOWN FROM BOSTON

### THREE GOOD SIZED FARES SENT FROM PIER TO LOCAL CONCERNS.

Two of the off-shore flounder draggers, finding too much fish at Boston to dispose of their catch, came down here to fillet their fares yesterday afternoon and this morning.

Late yesterday the dragger William L. Putnam arrived with 75,000 pounds of haddock, which went to the new filleting plant of the Gorton-Pew Fisheries Company, and this noon the dragger Ruth Lucille arrived with 60,000 pounds of haddock for the General Seafoods corporation. Sch. Corinthian brought 10,000 pounds yesterday for the Gorton-Pew canning factory and overland receipts of 18,000 pounds were received by the same company. Gill netters landed about 40,000 pounds yesterday. The only other receipts of the morning were two small trawlers, which went to the Commercial Fish Company.

**Pier Landings.**  
The weekly report of fresh fish receipts landed at the Boston pier, shows that for the week ending April 10, there were 127 arrivals with 6,101,100 pounds of fish, against 112 arrivals with 5,424,900 pounds for the same period last year. Arrivals from January included 1857 craft with a catch of 299,457,925 pounds against 1643 arrivals in 1925, a 77.5 per cent increase for the corresponding period in 1925.

# THIRTY IN FLEET AT BOSTON TODAY

### HADDOCK DROPPED TO \$1.75—GLOUCESTER DEALERS TOOK SOME FOR SPLITTING.

Thirty fishing craft dumped over 2,000,000 pounds of fresh fish on the Boston market this morning, and coming so close to the end of the Lenten season the dealers were not in a position to take all of the receipts. Some of the fleet went to Gloucester during the forenoon or will be sent this afternoon, where splitters will get their fares.

Seven of the fleet in this morning were beam trawlers with fair-sized catches. Prices went down, haddock being quoted at \$1.75 to \$2.50 and large cod at \$3.50. Flat fish prices also slumped, lemon sole dropping two cents a pound and blackbacks one cent.

# TWO HADDOCKERS DOWN TO SPLIT

### SCHS. LAURA GOULART AND LOUISE B. MARSHALL EACH BROUGHT 100,000 POUNDS.

Two good splitting trips came down from Boston at noon today for the Gorton-Pew Fisheries Company, both vessels being unable to take out their fares at Boston on account of so many vessels being tied up at the Fish Pier, which was glutted yesterday and today.

Sch. Laura Goulart went to the splitters at the Pew wharf, while the Marshall was taken out at the new filleting plant at the Gloucester Cold storage wharf. Sch. Mystic arrived direct from the grounds at 11 o'clock this morning to land the engineer, who was taken ill. The craft has 50,000 pounds of haddock and will probably sell to Gorton-Pew.

Yesterday the Pew filleting plant took 85,000 pounds from sch. Killarney and about 18,000 pounds came overland from Boston from sch. Catherine Burke. Aside from 65,000 pounds landed yesterday by gill netters, the only other arrivals were the dragger Clarence B. Mitchell and the trawler Pauline S.

# ANOTHER GOOD DAY AT BOSTON PIER

TODAY'S RECEIPTS AMOUNTED  
TO NEARLY ONE MILLION  
POUNDS.

Boston had another good fish day today, for there were 27 arrivals waiting when business opened up this morning. The total receipts reported from the Pier this morning amounted to 986,000 pounds.

Several vessels which arrived yesterday were unable to get room at the pier to take out, so had to lay over until this morning. Others, because of conditions, went to Gloucester with their trips for filleting, while some fish also went overland to the same place. Prices today were a little better than yesterday, haddock jumping to \$2 and \$2.50. Large cod also showed an increase over yesterday.

and the west wharves are still carrying large stocks of Norwegian cure. Supplies of Brazil fish are still held awaiting more favorable news from that market. Little activity has been shown in Spain and Portugal and no further improvement has been shown on the Italian market. The situation at the present time looks anything but good, which may lead to the curtailment of supplies in outfitting for the new season's fishery. The high prices paid to fishermen last fall has caused a lot of trouble in consumers' markets, and the fact of our cure being criticised has not improved condition. This sort of thing cannot go on indefinitely. Unless we resolve to improve our cure and sell to our customers the quality they desire we are bound to lose out to our competitors who seem to be able to give every satisfaction. Is it too much to expect our fishing interests to profit from the mistakes of the past, by resolving to ship nothing but the genuine article that always finds favour with the consumer?—St. John's Trade Review.
