### HADDOCK AT \$3 TO \$3.50—SCH. CATHERINE IN WITH HALIBUT FARE.

The Boston market opened this morning with most varieties of fresh fish in good demand and prices considerably higher than on Saturday's close. There were 34 vessels in the dock. Their fares aggregated 812,000 pounds of groundfish, 270,000 pounds of mixed fish, 35,000 pounds of halibut.

# HUB FISH PIER LANDINGS NEARLY SEVEN MILLION

Receipts of fish at Boston for the week ending April 24, amounted to 6,948,450 pounds. There were 120 arrivals. In the corresponding week of 1929, there were 116 arrivals and receipts of 4,255,000 pounds.

From January 1 to date, there have been 2152 arrivals with 97,969,225 pounds of fresh fish. In the same period of 1929, 1825 arrivals brought in 85,224,225 pounds of fresh fish.

Prices have ruled low as a result of the heavy supply.

### N. F. Codfish News.

There is said to be no change for the better in the codfish markets this week. In fact many of them are reported in worse shape as far as consumption is concerned than was thought could be possible at this season of the year. Brazil is also in bad shape and we understand will only take 13,000 drums by the steamer to leave here around the end of this month. The outlook is certainly not very encouraging and is thought to be a reaction of the general world conditions over which we can have but little control. The continued increase in Icelandic fishing has created serious competition to the export cure to competition to Portugal, which must be taken into consideration this season. Icelandic cure has established a reputation for fine quality and suitable cure which has been the result of much care by experted shipper. This has led to the Portuguese market becoming a stronghold for Icelandic fish. We may instance that during last week of March although stocks of Newfoundland and Norway cures were good, retailers reserved their orders for an expected cargo of Icelandic fish by S.S. Rensfjeil which was cleared at once between Oporto and Lisbon. With these facts in mind is it not therefore very necessary that exporters of this city and all along the coast give the importance of quality and cure serious consideration. The Trade Review exhorts all those who engage in the industry this year to cooperate as one, and pay the strictest attention to cure and cull of all fish for export in order that the serious complaints which have come from Portugal about the quality of our cure will not be repeated. We cannot afford to have the reputation of damning reports concerning our staple industry or of having to suffer declining prices. The fish business will not be put on an even keel only when it is realized by the powers that control the export end of it that every attention must be given to the shipment only of the finest cure of the size suitable to the market it is intended for. Once this is accomplished the greatest bugaboo of our fishery will be lifted. —St. John's Trade Review.

## Fulton Market Had 150,000 Pounds and Cape May 120,000 Pounds Up To Noon Time Today

Six seiners were reported at Fulton Market, New York, this morning, with 150,000 pounds of fresh mackerel. Yesterday afternoon, 13 vessels, mostly netters, brought 120,000 pounds into Cape May.

Four hundred barrels came over the road to Boston this morning and the fish brought 9 cents per pound. The New York price was reported to be 10 cents per pound.
