

# FRESH MACKEREL LANDINGS 144,000 POUNDS TO NOON

## Netters Had Bulk of Fares at New York and Cape May—Price at Boston 4 1-4 Cents

Fifteen vessels brought mackerel into Cape May and New York yesterday. Total receipts aggregated 144,000 pounds and they were mostly net fish. The price at Boston this morning was 4 1/4 cents per pound for net fish. No arrivals had been reported up to noon today.

## LARGE AMOUNT FISH WENT TO CAN AND SALT

Groundfish have been in good supply and considerable fish disposed of for salting or canning. For the week ending May 2 there were 141 arrivals at the Boston pier with 6,863,800 pounds of fresh fish. In the corresponding week last year there were 174 arrivals and receipts of 5,304,600 pounds.

From January 1 to date there have been 2293 arrivals and receipts of 104,833,025 pounds of fresh fish as compared with 1999 arrivals and receipts of 90,528,825 pounds in the same period of 1929.

## SEINERS BACK FROM THE SOUTH

### DRAGGERS BROUGHT FARES DOWN FROM BOSTON YES- TERDAY TO SPLIT.

Ten of the southern mackerel fleet, running out of fishing weather, returned last night to re-fit for a second trip to the Jersey coast and perhaps to the Cape Shore.

None of the fleet returning here brought mackerel, although two of the local Italian boats landed fares at Boston. Local flounder draggers finding a glut on the Boston market, landed fares of fresh haddock here yesterday for the splitters. Gill net receipts amounted to about 50,000 pounds.

## TWO SEINERS AT BOSTON TODAY

BRING 10,000 POUNDS EACH—GROUND FISH RECEIPTS LIGHTER AND MARKET FIRMER.

First mackerel trips of the season were landed direct at the Boston fish pier this morning, the Fannie Powell and the Antonia bringing 10,000 pounds each. There were 15 other arrivals with 505,000 pounds of groundfish, 21,500 pounds of halibut and 72,000 pounds of mixed fish. Mackerel brought 5 cents for net fish and 7 cents for seine fish. Groundfish prices were firmer with haddock at \$2.50; large cod, \$2.50 to \$2.75 and markets, \$2.

## MORE SEINERS AT BOSTON PIER

MACKEREL RECEIPTS OF 189,000 POUNDS—GROUND FISH ARRIVALS LIGHT—PRICES UP.

Eight mackered seiners headed the list of arrivals at the Boston fish pier this morning. They brought in 189,000 pounds which sold from 5 to 6 1-4 cents per pound. There were 19 other arrivals with 368,000 pounds of groundfish, 19,000 pounds of halibut, 177,000 pounds of mixed fish and 32,000 pounds of saltfish. Groundfish prices opened higher and the market was firmer today. Haddock opened at \$4.50; large cod, \$3 and markets, \$2 to \$3.
