Such a race would have the cooperation of the tercentenary commission and the Legion convention committee and would bring anywhere from 50,000 to 100,000 Legionnaires to Gloucester. The national convention of the American Legion will open in Boston on October 6 and the committee is extremely desirous of having the race as a part of their entertainment program.

The matter was discussed at a preliminary meeting at the Master Mariners' Association on Saturday night when the leaders in local racing conferred with Theodore M. BOSTON PRICES MOVE HIGHER

HADDOCK UP TO \$5.50 TODAY— RECEIPTS TOTAL ONLY ABOUT 500,000 LBS.

A fleet of 17 vessels furnished the supply to the dealers on the Boston fish pier this morning. Receipts aggregated 438,000 pounds of ground-fish, 125,000 pounds of mixed fish, 29,000 pounds of fresh mackerel, and 7000 pounds of halibut. One fare, that of the Cornell, was not reported.

The market opened strong with prices higher than they have been for some time. Haddock started at \$5.50; large cod, \$5 to \$5.50, and markets, \$4.
